Dear Father Sampon,

I am writing to you in response to the August 13th letter I received from the Due Process Office. I understand that you received a copy of the communication and according to the letter the matter is now back in your hands.

I would take issue with several of the statements of the Fact Finding Committee which I will proceed to enumerate.

#1 I was not given a choice as to whether I was to remain at St. John de Nepomuc after the rehabilitation of ██████████ That was a bilateral decision between the Personnel Board and a counselor at De Paul Rehabilitation Center.

#2 My departure was made known before the fact and was a bilateral decision (Fr. Frank Wirz of the Bethlehem Fathers being the second party). He had previously discussed his part in the matter with Fr. Don Reiff then serving on the Personnel Board. Our decision was printed in the Sunday Bulletin at St. John's prior to our departure.

#3 Some parishes pay their employees on the 1st of the month, some on the 15th, some at the end of the month. If there is a standardized procedure now, there was not in 1970 and I was informed that the reason why a first of the month payment was to be observed was to insure a salary payment if and when a man was transferred during the month.

- #4 The date of February 14th was chosen since I was entitled to vacation time. The Board was informed where I could be reached during that time and I was in direct communication with them.
- #5 The help-out assignment at Rubicon was as a favor to the Board. I was not informed that this was in lieu of a salary payment.
- #6 My assignment to Holy Family was not the most desirable assignment and I doubt whether too many priests were fighting to go there in view of the newspaper publicity. For the record I did not choose to leave there in June of this year, but again that was a decision unilateral made to pacify the current pastor.

In conclusion I am seeking an equitable financial settlement at this time.

Your Excellency:

I am writing to you as the Ordinary for Father Franklyn Becker to inform you that I have asked for Father Becker's resignation from the Department of Campus Ministry at Saint Louis University.

Father Becker came to work at Saint Louis University under certain restrictions and with clear directives as to his job. I explicitly cautioned him against relating to homosexuals as he had previously. We do not accept or permit the moral liberalism espoused by the homosexual group called "Dignity." Father Becker has celebrated Mass for this group in his apartment and has encouraged practicing homosexuals to attend services at the University. He also maintains that these men may receive the sacraments without regard to the present moral teaching of the church.

Since his arrival Father Becker has been a difficult person to work with. He does not accept authority, prefers to go his own way, and is not responsive in his reporting on a weekly basis as he is required to do. He has attributed remarks to the Campus Ministry team to support his own distorted views and has lost acceptability with all of us here.

I personally think that Father Becker is not a malicious priest, but is misguided and intellectually shallow and naive. He does not seem to have any insight as to why he must not continue here. He really believes that I have over reacted. This decision was a unanimous decision of the Campus Ministry team in consultation with the President of the University. I have given Father Becker the option to leave on the ground that he would like to be closer to his mother who is aged.

If there are any further comments or discussion on this matter, I will be most happy to talk to you.

With Father Sampon not being available for a couple of weeks, the Vice-Chancellor has forwarded your February 1st letter to the Personnel Board Office. This response is made in an attempt to honestly respond to you in a way that will allow you to make a next step concerning Father Franklyn W. Becker.

Father Becker was ordained over twelve years ago. During this time, he has been an Associate Pastor in four places. A little over two years ago, he requested permission from Archbishop Cousins to seek involvement in Campus Ministry in some place other than the Milwaukee area. Following such permission, he has served at Marshall University and St. Louis University. With the continuing blessing of the Archbishop to pursue another location, he has come to you.

The willingness of Father Becker to serve as a campus minister in this Archdiocese has been expressed by him. Up until now and for the foreseeable future, there does not seem to be a situation calling for his being accepted; therefore, to evaluate the level of his performance, you might be served well in your decision to consult with the two colleges mentioned before, since he has only served in a parish here.

Should such investigation continue your interest in his being released, you could almost presume permission be granted to facilitate his coming to Los Angeles. Should that step be completed, a recontact of Father Sampon, who is being sent a carbon copy of this letter, could negotiate the permission requested.

Your Excellency:

I would like to take this opportunity to extend my belated congratulations on your appointment as Archbishop of Milwaukee. While I have not met you personally, through your column in the Catholic Herald and through my Milwaukee contacts I feel that the Spirit has indeed favored us with a most beautiful and benevolent bishop.

The second reason for this letter is an appeal to your benevolence. I am one of your priests working outside the Archdiocese of Milwaukee with the permission of your predecessor, Archbishop Cousins. In his wisdom he allowed the restless spirit within me to pursue a ministry that led me to West Virginia for two years where I served as chaplain to the Marshall University Catholic Community and then a brief time at St. Louis University. Finding the latter rather unfulfilling, I was led to California and my present position. All this after serving ten years as an associate pastor in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee.

At St. Brigid's I have found a warm and loving community, headed by a man whom I love and respect. The California climate is agreeable and I feel a renewed sense of mission. The ministry is varied enough to provide the challenge I need and I would very much like to remain in my present position.

It has been several months since I have corresponded with you, but I was grateful for your kind reception at Bob Deahl's ordination as I was for your sympathetic column in the Herald dealing with the gay issue.

As you know I have held several short term assignments since I left St. Margaret Mary Parish in the spring. I feel that I have cooperated well with the Personnel Board including my willingness to meet with [REDACTED] on a regular basis. All of this does not seem to have bettered my bargaining position for an assignment in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Having spoken to Fr. Hornacek today and Fr. Janicki earlier this week it would seem that I am somewhat a persona non grata when it comes to placement. It is for that reason that I am writing to you. I still believe that I am called to serve as a priest and if not in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, then hopefully somewhere else. I do not know where that somewhere else is and I am hopeful that you might lead me in the right direction. If possible I would like to return to the west coast, if you could steer me to a benevolent bishop. After my San Diego experience I do not feel I could return to either San Diego or San Bernardino, but perhaps you could direct me elsewhere. I have considered the Diocese of Phoenix as a possibility and have addressed an inquiry to Bishop Rausch. I do not have any other leads.

I am not trying to run away, but perhaps a geographical change outside of the Archdiocese is what is needed at this time.

I am beginning to feel that my presence here at St. Eugene Rectory is becoming a bit burdensome and that is why I feel a bit of urgency at this time.

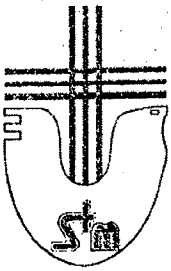


I merely wanted to confirm what we agreed to at our meeting with the Archbishop on 1/29/97. It seemed to be a profitable meeting. I was pleased to hear you acknowledge that you do reflect on your actions and are beginning to realize and accept that each has consequences.

The Archbishop was clear in pointing out that the insurance risk for your conduct is totally an Archdiocesan responsibility. He stated that the only time he would be willing to risk was when a person developed a certain amount of self knowledge together with the recognition that amending one's ways was absolutely essential.

It was agreed upon that you could continue to do help-out ministry as in the past in the Rubicon area. You are required to continue to see Dr. [REDACTED] weekly, as well as report to Tom McGuine, your monitor, monthly. It is presumed you will continue to make progress and when you begin to see your therapist only once weekly, at that time you will also join "group". You were encouraged to develop a circle of mature friends, people who are not lonely or angry, who can give you appropriate feedback.

I hope you felt the meeting was as productive as I did. You cleared away a lot of suspicion in your relationship with the diocese and the Archbishop. Continue to make progress and work on those homilies.

A man came to see him recently, and told him that as a teenager he worked in the parish rectory in the late 70s. As a teenager he was beginning to wonder whether his orientation was homosexual. He was invited to the home of a parish choir member, a gay man. The choir member introduced him to the choir director, also gay. The choir director introduced him to Father Franklyn Becker, who apparently was in residence at the parish. There were sexual encounters with Father Becker. They stopped when the guy's younger brother started working in the rectory, and he warned Becker to stay away from his brother.

The guy wants to be assured that others are not at risk and that Becker is not active in ministry. The Kenedy directory lists him as on leave. What is Becker's status?



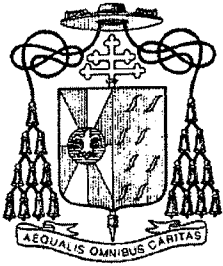

PRECEPT


In response to the pastoral needs of this Christian community, in virtue of my authority as diocesan bishop (c. 381, §1), and in accord with the provisions of canon 49, I formally place upon Reverend Franklyn Becker the following obligations:

- 1) To refrain from all contact with minors, vulnerable adults, and other persons or categories of persons who have proven to be occasions of temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 2) To cease until further notice all public ministry including the celebration of Eucharist; Eucharist may be celebrated in a private setting alone or with only another priest or priests in attendance; the celebration of any other sacraments will require explicit permission of a local ordinary in each case;
- 3) To avoid all places and situations that, from past experience, have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 4) To cease any and all activities and relationships that may be described under the broad category of pastoral counseling;
- 5) Until further notice the faculty to hear confession is revoked.

The reasons motivating this decree are the allegations of sexual activities in violation of the obligation of clerical celibacy (c. 277, §1). These restrictions are seen as necessary and prudent precautions and will remain in effect for three months from this date or until notice of their revocation. Any violations of this precept could result in penal action and this decree shall serve as canonical warning to that effect.

This decree shall be executed by means of its communication to Reverend Franklyn Becker by Very Reverend Joseph Hornacek.

Dear Franklyn,

Thank you for your letter of July 18, 2002, in which you express your concerns over the salary package that you are receiving for the current fiscal year. I acknowledge your gratitude for the small increase in salary, though this does not include an increase in the living allowance.

During the past several years you did not have a formal assignment in the Archdiocese. This was due to some confusion and doubt resulting from allegations of sexual abuse in the past. Given the number of allegations that have been reported in recent months you would never have been allowed to serve even as a helpout priest had all of this been known to Archdiocesan authorities prior to the spring of this year.

Compensation items such as retirement supplement, professional reimbursement, retreat fee and continuing education fee are all based on a person's assignment to a parish or some other institution in the Archdiocese. I consider it generous on the part of the Archdiocese to have given you some retreat fee or continuing education fee and retirement supplement during the years in which you were not formally assigned to any parish. Therefore it is certainly not with any sense of arbitrariness that such compensation items are withdrawn at this time when you are considered unassignable for any future ministry.

Let me also take this opportunity to report that Barbara Anne Cusack, Chancellor of the Archdiocese, is currently preparing the statement for publication in the Catholic Herald that will report you as one of the originally six priests whose files were being reviewed by the Special Commission established by Archbishop Weakland for this purpose. I will make every effort to make sure that you have a copy of that statement before it is given to the Catholic Herald.

Thank you for your prayers for my speedy recovery. I am happy to report that surgery went well and the recuperation period should end within the next week or two. Hopefully your vacation time in Canada provided the kind of relaxation and renewal you hoped for.


Dear Franklyn,

As I continue to adjust to my role as Archbishop, I am undertaking a review of files of priests. I note that there have been problems in your past of which you are well aware. Father Hornacek will be contacting you for a personal meeting in the near future to discuss this situation with you on my behalf. If you want to meet with me personally at some point after your conversation with Joe, I am certainly open to that possibility.

In the meantime, I see that a precept restricting your exercise of ministry is in place. I would like to confirm those restrictions: You are to have no unsupervised contact with minors and no public exercise of ministry; Private celebration with only another priest or priests in attendance is permitted, but no other sacramental ministry. Given the current state of matters, I would also ask that you not wear your collar in public settings, nor present yourself in public as a priest. This is for your protection as well.

I regret that my first formal correspondence with you needs to be on such a delicate and painful matter. I am sure you understand that the scope of my responsibilities in caring for the flock entrusted to me and for you requires that I do so.

October 29, 2002 Franklyn Becker is phoned by Dave Zimprich to change date of a monitoring appointment. Becker reported reading the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel article about the listening session on 10/26/02 during which a sexual abuse was reported taking place in Lyons, WI at the time Becker was assigned there. Zimprich did not share any info about the intent of another victim to file a formal complaint against Becker for abuse in CA. JFH
120. Franklyn Becker
February 4, 2003 Franklyn Becker meets with Vicar who further explains content of the Archbishop's 2/3/03 letter. Becker admits to some but not all of the detailed abusive behavior outlined by a victim-survivor now residing in California. Becker is taken aback by recommendation that he move to Cousins Center for purpose of more realistic monitoring. He cites need to find new nursing facility for 98 year old mother in Milwaukee and lease on apartment till November of '03 as reasons for hoping a different monitoring strategy could be employed in Mayville. April 24, 2003 Dave Zimprich phones Vicar to report on his monitoring meeting with Franklyn Becker on 4/23. He is depressed over his mother's failing health and hopes he does not need to change residence before she dies. He is concerned about smaller amount of financial support from diocese 7/1/03 and has asked for assistance with prescriptions from St. Michael's Priest Fund. JFH

May 5, 2003 Franklyn Becker is called by Vicar to inquire about his mother's health status. Vicar assures Franklyn that he will not need to change residence at this time but that his participation in a group for priest sex offenders is urged. He is willing to do so. He reports he was phoned by [REDACTED] former priest and canon lawyer from San Diego who is organizing priest perpetrators. Becker found him obnoxious and did not cooperate. JFH

Hornacek obtains info from Cusack showing Becker to have been there from June of '97 until sometime between January and May of '99. Barb and I agreed that we could wait until next week when Bishop Sklba returns to discuss whether or not any action needs to be taken.

April 14, 1998 - Dr. [REDACTED], Franklyn's therapist, who had been trying several times but unsuccessfully to talk with Tom Kerstein since early March, and who had been informed by me of Tom's death, left a voice mail message that, since she will be in Birmingham, Alabama, with the Red Cross, she will contact us after 5/1/98. She wanted us to know that she is pleased with Franklyn's progress and that she advised Franklyn that if he has any psychological problems during her absence, he should call Dr. [REDACTED], in Dr. [REDACTED] office, at [REDACTED]. Franklyn was also encouraged to stay in touch with his monitor.

The last communication we received from Dr. [REDACTED] was on 3/19/98 when she was asking Fr. Tom why Fr. Yockey hadn't seen Fr. Becker since their first meeting, and wondered if Fr. Yockey is too busy or if their schedules are so different. Since Fr. Tom had never received that message, I called Tom McGuine on 4/9/98 and informed him of Dr. [REDACTED] call and concern and I asked Tom McGuine to follow up on that question. He agreed to do so.

126. Becker, Franklyn

On April 24, 1996 I talked to Dr. [REDACTED] who is Franklyn's psychologist. She felt that each week there was a little movement forward. She spoke of issues such as, assertiveness, self esteem, guilt, anxiety, anger, passive aggressiveness, negative feeling and denial. All of these need to be dealt with in the context of Franklyn's therapy. We had a lengthy discussion. I felt she had an excellent focus on where Franklyn is at.

On August 23, 1996 [REDACTED] called to complain that Fr. Becker is a public nuisance in the Woodland area. He calls the DNR, the police, then he uses these issues in his Sunday homilies. I asked Tom McGuine to speak to him this afternoon in his monitor session.

On August 30, 1996 in a meeting with Len Barbian by way of response to Lynn's request for permission to go on another cruise, I shared Carroll's hesitation, since Lynn had excused himself from treatment programs on the basis of need to care for his mother. We acknowledged the possibility of giving such permission after further conversation with Lynn's therapist, whom Len promised to call.

25. Becker, Franklyn

On January 29, 1997 the Archbishop, Deacon Tom McGuine, Dr. Elizabeth Piasecki and Dr. [REDACTED] met with Father Franklyn Becker to discuss his future. Dr. [REDACTED] indicated that Franklyn was beginning to reflect on his conduct and is developing a realization of consequences for his actions. After a lengthy discussion, the Archbishop explained to him why he continued to be a risk for the Archdiocese. It was agreed that he could continue to do help-out ministry with Fr. Wenig in the Rubicon area provided he continues to see Dr. [REDACTED] and provided Tom McGuine continues to monitor his conditions for ministry. It is presumed he must continue to make progress. It was also agreed that when he begins to see Dr. [REDACTED] once weekly, he will join a group. Franklyn also was encouraged to develop a circle of mature friends who would be able to give him appropriate feedback.

On February 19, 1997 Dr. [REDACTED] called relative to Franklin's progress. She promised she would arrange group for Franklin. She finally got in contact with Dr. [REDACTED] in Madison who referred her to another therapist, Dr. [REDACTED]. So at this time she is having Franklin make an appointment with Dr. [REDACTED] for group, after which she will spend a little time with him relative to the folks who made allegations against him. This she will do only after Dr. Piasecki has given written permission. I believe this will conclude Franklin Becker's therapy sessions with Dr. [REDACTED]

57. Becker, Franklyn

On February 8, 1996 I met with [REDACTED], Rev. Dismas Bonner, and [REDACTED]. We met with Franklyn Becker for feedback session at the St. Louis Consultation Center. This was relative to the evaluation of Franklyn Becker. [REDACTED] did the initial interview. Dismas gave the Spirituality summary and [REDACTED] gave the psychosocial history. The center is located at [REDACTED] St. Louis, MO [REDACTED]

Franklyn has had no spiritual director since 1988, again he relies on his own resources. He sees opposition between life in the spirit and the secular rather than having a wholistic incarnational spirituality. Celibacy has to be seen as a positive way of living out sexuality, which is essentially mystery.

[REDACTED] was tough, hoping to get Franklyn's attention. He asked, Do you want to change this in your life? Places recommended for therapy: 1) St. Luke's, Washington - long term like 8 months, 2) or New Mexico, 3) another alternative would be an intensive outpatient care where living in is monitored.

Franklyn stated he is willing to go for treatment, but not as long as his mom needs care. We agreed to continue conversation on this point.

I asked Franklyn Becker

1) to consider how sometime in the future he might get a county nurse in twice a week to look after his mother and maybe some neighbor on a daily basis, so he might consider this 8-months residency.

2) to find a spiritual director like Laurin Wenig who he can trust to talk to on a monthly basis about the matters we covered in this evaluation summary on 2/8/96 in St. Louis.

3) I asked him to reflect on boundary violations in his life several times each week. He and I spoke of examples of such boundary setting.

On March 6, 1996 I called Franklyn to request that he call Dr. [REDACTED] and set an appointment for therapy. He agreed to call for the appointment on Monday, March 11, 1996. He asked about the allegation that brought him to this point. I told him I didn't have that information, since it is kept by Dr. Elizabeth Piasecki.

On April 19, 1996 I talked to Franklyn about his progress in therapy with Dr. [REDACTED]. He has received permission from Bishop Skiba to go on a cruise as Chaplain on April 20, 1996, but will return for the Spring Assembly. On March 7, 1993 I met with Franklyn Becker at Cascade to discuss his recent letter regarding his choices for assignment. Franklyn recalled [REDACTED] as a very disturbed person from a very disturbed family. Franklyn denies that he ever had any inappropriate sexual behavior with [REDACTED]. He recalled [REDACTED] tried to get some money from him by claiming he hit the windshield in a minor accident while Franklyn was driving him home. I informed Franklyn of [REDACTED] conversation of wanting to kill Franklyn and his story of the FBI contact in West Virginia. Franklyn was unaware of that and questions if it is true. Franklyn knows our concern. He still would like to be able to continue his priestly ministry.

On June 18, 1993 we received a letter from Franklyn Becker notifying us that beginning 6/22/93 he will be living at [REDACTED] Woodland, WI 53099-0040 [REDACTED]. He will be available for help out work.

On July 8, 1993 I spoke with Franklyn Becker regarding his compensation. Clarification was needed for the \$650.00 living allowance. Franklyn determined \$450.00 for rent and \$200.00 for food. Franklyn asked about Professional expenses and I told him that was not an included benefit when someone was not assigned. He will receive retreat and continuing education.

On February 1, 1994, I called Franklyn Becker in response to his letter about Retirement Supplement and his future by way of an assignment. I told him the Retirement Supplement had been approved. He asked about his future for assignment. I told him his status would not change. Any change would be determined by Archbishop Weakland, and he would have to speak with him about any questions he had regarding the future. He said as long as he is caring for his mother he would continue as he is doing.

On April 18, 1994, I received a letter from Franklyn Becker with questions regarding his compensation. He was concerned that he was not getting a monthly food allowance. I told him that he was getting \$200.00 a month for food but it is included with his salary. The \$450.00 for housing is separate because it is not taxable. He also asked that, if not assigned, he be listed in the Directory with his mother's address and not listed as "not assigned".

On December 7, 1992 I received calls from [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] from St. Mary's, Cascade supportive of Franklyn Becker's ministry. A person from the parish is calling parishioners to sign a petition to have Franklyn removed. They said Franklyn is getting people back to Church including young people and wish he could stay. I told them we appreciate their supportive comments and that Franklyn is only there temporarily because of other plans for him in the future. On 12/8/92 [REDACTED] from St. Mary's, Cascade also called to express her support of Franklin Becker.

On December 11, 1992 we received a letter from Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED] from St. Mary's, Cascade. The finance committee held a general meeting for the parish and it was very favorable for for what is being done at the rectory and that there was general agreement to have Franklyn Becker remain as pastor. A meeting with their Parish Council President was recommended.

107. Becker, Franklyn

On February 24, 1993 I received a call from [REDACTED] who alleges inappropriate sexual behavior on the part of Franklyn Becker. The alleged behavior happened when Franklyn was assigned to St. Margaret Mary Parish. [REDACTED] believes it was in 1977 shortly after he graduated from High School. [REDACTED] also alleges abuse by a priest in Northern Wisconsin and a Franciscan priest in Kenosha. [REDACTED] was aware that Franklyn was in West Virginia and California and that he goes on cruises and lives with his mother. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] He also said he is working with an attorney in Chicago, a Mr. Dempsey. I made an appointment for 3/1/93 with [REDACTED], Dr. Liz Piasecki and myself.

On March 1, 1993 Dr. Elizabeth Piasecki and I were present for an appointment with [REDACTED] [REDACTED] did not come, so I called the phone number he gave me. A woman who spoke on the phone identified herself as [REDACTED] mother. She said that he left the house on 2/28/93 after a disagreement, and she did not know when he would return. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] She said that she was sorry she did not believe him in the beginning regarding his allegations. She felt that the priest was responsible for his condition, but she did not mention the name of the priest. On Monday, October 21, 1991 I met with Franklyn to review his compensation while on awaiting assignment. Franklyn is part of the Pilot Compensation Plan this year. Compensation will be given according to this Plan with the regular deductions from salary as listed in the Clergy Manual.

On Wednesday, May 20, 1992 I met with Franklyn to discuss his sabbatical and his financial arrangements. There is some confusion on the exact time of the sabbatical because of the cruise, Louvain and the Archbishop's tour group. I shared with Franklyn the guidelines from the Continuing Formation Handbook. He agreed that we will consider the months of June, July and August as his sabbatical time. He had already received his monies from the sabbatical fund. He will receive only 50 percent of his salary from Account 46 and no room and board during those months since it is part of the sabbatical funds. Lyn will return on August 9, 1992 following the Archbishop's tour and be ready for assignment.

On August 14, 1992 I received a letter from Franklyn Becker stating that he is available for help-out and reassignment. He asks for a meeting with Archbishop Weakland and Bishop Sklba to discuss his future assignment.

On September 25, 1992 Archbishop Weakland, Bishop Sklba and I met with Franklyn Becker to discuss his future assignment. He also mentioned early retirement as a possibility. He is now 55. He was thanked for his honesty and Archbishop Weakland told him we would need time to discuss all these concerns in deciding on his future assignment.

On September 25, 1992 I joined the Archbishop and Tom Venne in meeting with Lyn to discuss future options. I noted the many reasons which counseled against his assignment to parish ministry at this time.

On Monday, October 8, 1990 the office learned of a volatile confrontation between Franklyn and [REDACTED] at West Allis Memorial Hospital. Although [REDACTED] is willing to discuss the matter with me and Franklyn, Franklyn does not seem willing to do so. Tom Trepanier will continue to press for a resolution/reconciliation meeting including himself as well. Tom agreed to visit the Hospital in order to determine if there are any issues present from the hospital staff. [REDACTED] came forward on Tuesday, October 9, 1990 to express his general unhappiness with the lack of availability on Franklyn's part during times of night emergency.

853. Becker, Franklyn

On Monday, October 22, 1990 the office received a memo from Tom Trepanier reporting on his meeting with six nursing supervisors of West Allis Memorial Hospital regarding performance issues of the chaplain. In summarizing the concerns, the general issues seem to fall into three categories:

1. the perception that Franklyn does not respond pastorally or sensitively to emergencies or needs beyond sacramental celebration (repeatedly saying things like "I don't give last rites", or "this is a waste of my time", or "I'll talk to the family by phone");
2. arriving approximately 8:00 - 8:30 a.m. and leaving the hospital by 1:00 - 1:30 p.m. claiming that he must allow time for emergencies; thus, resulting in the fact that many patients are not seen or visited except by Eucharistic ministers, even though approximately 60 percent (110) patients are Catholic on a regular basis;
3. the general perception that Franklyn possesses neither the personality nor interest to be an effective chaplain at the hospital.

On Wednesday, August 21, 1991 Franklyn requested that I review the 1983 Wausau report. Lyn also gave me permission to speak with his therapist, [REDACTED] if needed.

896. Becker, Franklyn

On Wednesday, August 21, 1991 Tom Trepanier and I met with Lyn in order to review the recommendations gathered from West Allis Memorial Hospital administrators and priests of the district, concluding that it was time for another person to be assigned to that ministry. He concurred, and we agreed upon September 15, 1991 as the final date for his work at the hospital after which he would go on awaiting assignment. I privately explained my hesitation regarding a parish assignment in view of historical circumstances. I agreed to seek clarification for salary and benefits of someone in the current priest compensation pilot program (at the September 6, 1991 Temporalities Committee meeting), and to see if a sabbatical opening might be possible this fall. Franklyn will draw up a list of possible ministerial interests and will contact [REDACTED] as well. We also spoke of some of his own fears as a result of the past experiences.

On Friday, August 23, 1991 Lyn called to request that he receive full salary through the month of September in order to cover his expected vacation time, which I approved. He also asked if he might apply for a part-time position at St. Francis Hospital which I also endorsed. In response to his request for the sum of approximately \$3,000 which had been placed in an account for help out services at West Allis Memorial Hospital, I indicated that the auditors would probably not approve the redirecting of such funds contrary to their designated purpose

On Thursday, April 21, 1988 I received a phone call from a nurse at West Allis Memorial Hospital, [REDACTED] who requested special assistance in regard to the way in which Father Becker was responding to a dying Lutheran patient's request to see a priest. I called Franklyn at home and reported the phone call expressing my willingness to accept his judgement in the matter. On Monday, April 25, 1988 I received a phone call from [REDACTED] the Senior Vice President at West Allis Memorial ([REDACTED]) indicating that the entire matter had been finally resolved and that nurses and chaplain had probably said inappropriate things to each other during an argument over pastoral responsibility and care. The matter seems to be properly handled.

On Tuesday, February 28, 1989 [REDACTED] called to say that [REDACTED] is greatly concerned about Franklyn's unavailability at West Allis Memorial Hospital. A copy of the job description was requested (none current, but only a document arranged for Father Mueller in 1982). The matter will be discussed at the next district meeting, and I encouraged them to make sure that Franklyn was invited to be present.

On Friday, March 10, 1989 [REDACTED] reported a request from Franklyn that his monthly help out allowance be increased from \$250 to \$300. Since there has been no recent review of this financial and pastoral arrangement, [REDACTED] accepted responsibility to bring the entire matter to the next District meeting on March 17, 1989 and to ask the 13 parishes for some type of consensus in this regard. The entire plan for pro-rated cost sharing needs review and updating which [REDACTED] will take care of.

On Friday, September 15, 1989 I met with [REDACTED] regarding Franklyn's accreditation through NACC. [REDACTED] agreed to inquire of both Franklyn and the NACC offices regarding the reason for the discontinuation of efforts for full accreditation.

173. Becker, Franklyn

On Monday, February 19, 1990 the Archbishop received a phone call from Franklyn, claiming that he in turn had received a call from Dick Godin in Austin, Texas, who allegedly gave the documentation to [REDACTED] A later conversation with [REDACTED] suggested that Dick still lives in Rockford, Illinois.

190. Becker, Franklyn

On Monday, February 19, 1990 I spoke with [REDACTED] who expressed his serious unhappiness with the style of work performed by Franklyn at West Allis Memorial noting that one of his parishioners had been very seriously ill for 24 days without any evidence of sacramental administration on the part of the chaplain. I reminded [REDACTED] of the recent evaluation on the part of the entire district and encourage [REDACTED] to speak with Franklyn himself.

600. Becker, Franklyn

On Thursday, July 26, 1990 I received a phone call from [REDACTED] indicating concern on the part of [REDACTED] ([REDACTED]) regarding the seemingly intensive pastoral care devoted to her son, [REDACTED], at West Allis Hospital. I immediately called Lyn at his home in order to bring this issue to his attention and to receive his explanation which sounds logical. He denied any riding through the neighborhood of the family and stated that he had discussed the entire matter with his supervisor, [REDACTED] at the hospital.

820. Becker, Franklyn

He called to say that Father Rich O'Donnell has offered to let him into the next CPE course at the hospital. This course will take up his time on Saturday mornings. He wanted to know if he could proceed along this line. I told him that I thought we were coming close to an assignment for him and that I wanted to talk to the Personnel Board about this. Becker will call me next Wednesday for further direction.

8/21/84

874. Becker, Franklyn

He heard of Father Ries's death and wondered if it would be possible for him to apply for the position at St. Mary Hill Hospital. I put him in touch with Father John Nesseth about this. Later Nesseth called me to say that he thinks it is too early to look into this matter but suspects that Sister Ellinda may be interested in going back to the original plan of having one priest between St. Mary's Hospital and St. Mary's Hill and using a number of the religious women to do pastoral work. Becker also asked about the availability of \$200 for a CPE course at St. Joseph Hospital. I told him that he could get the money from his continuing education fund (he told me it was all gone) or from Father Nesseth's budget if there was any left (Nesseth told me there was none left) or I suggested that he ask Father O'Donnell at St. Joseph's to let him work off the money in some way. I told Becker there simply wasn't any money around for this purpose.

966. Becker, Franklyn

He called to discuss the financial arrangements with regard to his forthcoming job at West Allis Memorial Hospital. He would like to be placed on Salary Plan B and also wishes alternate residency. He told me he would be willing to live in a rectory but he checked with St. Jude's but they are looking for a priest who will do more for the parish than he could do. He has an apartment spotted but said it would cost more than the present ceiling allowance would provide and wondered if that could be negotiated. I told him it definitely could not and that he would have to find something cheaper or go back to the idea of living in a rectory. He is going to check with a couple of more parishes to see if this would be possible.

994. Becker, Franklyn

Father Paul Esser called to express his concern about the assignment of Father Becker to West Allis Memorial Hospital. Esser worked on the Personnel Board at the time when Becker was having problems in California. Therefore, he knows his condition. I told Esser confidentially that Becker has been under psychiatric care for the last couple of years, has done CPE work, has gotten good recommendations from St. Joseph's Hospital and the approval of his psychiatrist to be in ministry once again in this type of setting. Esser felt much relieved about this and concurs that Becker needs to have a chance at reestablishing his reputation once again.

37. Becker, Franklyn

On Friday evening, April 19, 1985, while presiding over a confirmation at St. John Parish in South Milwaukee, I noted that Father Franklyn Becker acted as sponsor for a young man being confirmed.

Father Tony Karls, pastoral director at St. Mary's Hospital in Madison called to say that Becker had applied for a chaplaincy there which is currently available and had given my name as a reference. I told Karls that Becker had permission to seek a chaplaincy job, that we would offer him one in Milwaukee if one were available and that there was no reason why Becker could not do an adequate job given the experience he had at St. Joseph's Hospital and the recommendation he got from them. Karls was glad to hear this and said that he would send Becker the rest of the applications. I did not mention any of Becker's difficulties to Karls but I will now talk to Bishop O'Donnell. I was not aware that Becker had made application for this position.

832. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to Bishop George Wirz (608-257-5000) about Becker's application at St. Mary's Medical Center. Wirz was extremely negative toward the idea of Becker becoming a chaplain there when he heard the story. [REDACTED]

I told him that I understood and that I would ask Becker to withdraw his application. I told Wirz that I did not want to discuss this matter over the phone directly with Father Karls and Wirz understood my reason and position.

841. Becker, Franklyn

He and I met at my request and I discussed the contents of Dr. [REDACTED] letter with him. I made it clear that while I could go along with Dr. [REDACTED] recommendation that he not be assigned to the convent over here, he definitely would not be assigned to a parish at this time. He is somewhat disappointed about this and mentioned that there are a number of other priests in the Archdiocese, e.g., [REDACTED], who have become pastors with similar backgrounds. I pointed out that maybe an incident or two occurred in the past but they did not have bad reputations that Becker has. I also pointed out the legal ramification and some of the law suits that are currently going on in the United States. I also asked him to withdraw his application from St. Mary's Medical Center in Madison and requested that he not apply for any position outside the Diocese without first talking to me so I can approach the local bishop before he makes application. We had what I thought was a very positive conversation in general. I told him that he had been very cooperative and asked him to be patient now as we "go the last mile". I also told him that we were going to assign him to West Allis Memorial Hospital as soon as that position opened. He seemed agreeable to this and said that this month and next he is working part time at St. Joseph's Hospital. I told him to inquire there as to whether a position will open in the future.

7/18/84

887. Becker, Franklyn

He called to say that he has been offered part-time work for the month of September at St. Joseph Hospital and wondered if that would fit in with our plans for him. I told him to take the job at St. Joe's for September and that the position at West Allis would open up when we found a place for the present chaplain. I told him the position was his when it opened up.

8/10/84

ADOM025895

544. Becker, Franklyn

He called to see how things were going about getting approval for his new job. I told him of my discussion with Archbishop Weakland last Saturday in which the Archbishop told me that last Wednesday when he was in Green Bay, Bishops Maida and Morneau cornered him and gave him the impression that they did not approve of Father Becker becoming chaplain at the Winnebago Mental Health Hospital. Becker did not seem completely surprised at this although he said he needs an answer rather soon because he is scheduled for a physical exam on Wednesday and intended to look for an apartment at the same time. I told him that I would wait during this week to see if any word is forthcoming from Green Bay. In the meantime Becker intends to go through with the physical but not to do any serious apartment seeking. Becker told me that any negative reports on him in the Green Bay area could very well come from [REDACTED] in Bishop Maida's Tribunal. Becker said that he thinks [REDACTED] is under some surveillance in the Green Bay area.

4/23/84

564. Becker, Franklyn

I called Msgr. Roy Klister, the chancellor, to discuss what could be said to the Winnebago Institution about Becker turning down the job. I was surprised when Klister told me that he knew nothing about this. I told him that in my discussion with Bishop Maida, Maida had said that he was going to discuss this right away with Msgr. Klister. I then reviewed the situation and told Klister that I was quite sure that Bishop Maida intended to convey through Archbishop Weakland his decision not to allow Becker to assume that position and that the matter was settled. Klister is in the middle of this whole thing as I am with Mr. [REDACTED] from the State Hospital who hired Becker. Klister said that he wanted to talk to Bishop Maida and then would get back to me. Later he called me to say that I was right and that Bishop Maida would not change his mind on allowing Becker to take up the position even if it meant that he would be restricted to ministry only at the Winnebago site. I told Klister I would ask Becker to simply call [REDACTED] and to simply inform him that he has decided against taking the job. Later I did this and Becker said that he would handle the matter in that way. I told him that I would contact John Nesseth and see what other positions were open in the country for hospital chaplains. He said that his psychiatrist is encouraging him to go into hospital ministry or campus ministry and he is looking at a campus ministry position somewhere in another diocese.

4/30/84

ADOM025897

242. Becker, Franklyn
Father John Nesseth called to say that Reverend Stan Joergenson, Director of Pastoral Care at the VA Center, had just called Nesseth to say that he would not accept Becker as chaplain at VA. Evidently, Joergenson checked with one or more priests in the area and found out about Becker's past history. I told Nesseth to convey to Joergenson my own strong feeling that Joergenson should discuss this with Becker after leading him on all the way to thinking he had the position and also to ask Joergenson why he would not give a person who is trying to start over a chance. Later, I called Father Becker and told him the bad news. I asked him to contact the state hospital in Winnebago and nail down that position. Unfortunately, he told me that he has already told them that he would not be available. I had asked him to keep the lines of communication open in case the VA thing fell through. Becker said that he also has an appointment in Orange, California on April 1 for a interview in a hospital out there.

3/7/84

496. Becker, Franklyn
He told me that he was out to St. Joseph's Hospital in Orange, California to look into the position of hospital chaplain that was offered there. By the time he had arrived there, however, they had chosen another priest for the position. Therefore, he has accepted the position at the Winnebago Health Center in Oshkosh. He will begin there on May 1, 1984. The contact person for the position is [REDACTED] Winnebago, Wisconsin 54985. Telephone: [REDACTED] Becker asked if I would take care of the necessary follow-up and paperwork. I told him I would do that and be in contact with him.

4/11/84

522. Becker, Franklyn
I called Bishop Maida of Green Bay because it was impossible for me to get there to see him in person before Easter. We discussed the situation of Father Becker without my mentioning Becker's name. I gave him full disclosure of what the situation was and asked him if he would be willing to give the man faculties for work at the Mental Institution at Winnebago. Maida was quite understanding and said that he certainly would get back to me before Easter. He told me that he wanted to discuss this a bit further with Bishop Morneau and also with Msgr. Klister. I assured him that if Becker were to be accepted, I would see to it that he continues his psychotherapy and that if anything went wrong we would have Becker out of the Green Bay Diocese within 24 hours and that Becker would be suspended.

4/17/84

527. Becker, Franklyn
I spoke to [REDACTED] at the Winnebago Hospital [REDACTED] He expects Becker to begin work sometime between May 7 and May 14. He has already spoken to Father Mercatoris and Msgr. Klister in the Green Bay Diocese. Becker's starting salary will be \$17,780.63. In a couple of months that will increase to \$21,336. In about six months it will increase 2-3%. He will be given a state pension and the right to an insurance program which will be an HMO or Blue Cross/Blue Shield (with a slight additional cost). He will receive two weeks vacation per year and three weeks at the end of five years. I told him that I would go ahead and try to work out the ecclesiastical details with the two dioceses.

4/18/84

1183. Becker, Franklyn

Fathers Metz and Nesseth met with me to discuss Becker's recent evaluation at St. Joseph Hospital's CPE program. The evaluation was positive and showed that Becker had the capability of becoming a hospital chaplain. It also showed that there had been much personal growth in the last several months. It also indicated that Becker desired to work for about six months or more in a hospital setting before returning to a second course in CPE. It was agreed that I would contact St. Mary's Hospital in Milwaukee to see if they would give him a position (even unpaid) for about six months with supervision. If this does not work out, Nesseth will look into the situation at St. Michael's Hospital.

12/21/83

6. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to Mrs. [REDACTED] at St. Mary's Hospital and asked her to give consideration to Becker as a part or full-time chaplain for approximately six months. She said no position was available but would give it some consideration when she speaks to Sister Aurelia. It may be that Becker might be able to work there in an unpaid position.

1/3/84

29. Becker, Franklyn

Mrs. [REDACTED], pastoral director at St. Mary's Hospital, called to say that Sister Aurelia has decided it will not be feasible to offer a position to Father Becker at this time. The main reason they are giving is that they will not be able to adequately supervise him because their pastoral care department is in the process of evolution and they do not have a full-time pastoral care director. I thanked her for the consideration that was given and now will ask Father Nesseth to see what can be done at St. Michael's Hospital.

1/10/84

54. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to his psychiatrist, Dr. [REDACTED]. I explained that things were not going well in our being able to find a job for Becker. I wanted to know what [REDACTED] would think about Becker pursuing work outside the diocese in the health care field. [REDACTED] thought that if it were not too far away, Becker might be able to come in on a regular basis for the psychotherapy that he needs and which is the highest priority in his situation. He is going to discuss this with Becker on Thursday and I will talk to Becker on Friday. Later in the day I spoke to Father Nesseth and he told me that it looked like there was a place in Oshkosh opening up at the mental health center there. I asked him to pursue this and see if it might be available for Becker. In the evening Becker called to say that Father O'Donnell had offered him a help-out position for the month of February at St. Joseph Hospital and wondered if he could take it. I told him to go ahead. Becker said in passing that maybe this could lead to a full-time job at St. Joseph's which would be ideal.

1/17/84

60. Becker, Franklyn

He came to see me to discuss the possibility of a job in hospital ministry. I informed him that right now there was nothing available in Milwaukee but that a position, I am told, is available in Oshkosh. I pointed out to him that there is a CPE Program in Oshkosh that he could tie into down the line. He seemed to like the idea and agreed to make application next week for the position. It will allow him to return weekly for his appointments with his therapist. We then talked to Father Michael Newman and settled the matter of Becker's salary and benefits for the months of January and February. Hopefully, he will be located in a new job by March 1.

1/20/84

ADOM025900

1110. Becker, Franklyn

I met with him and his psychiatrist, Dr. [REDACTED] Street, Hales Corners [REDACTED] told me that he felt that he and Becker were getting into a very good type of trust relationship. [REDACTED] feels that Becker is being honest with him and that if the stress and tension of sexual problems becomes too great, he feels Becker will have the confidence to call him before acting out any of his urges. [REDACTED] reviewed Becker's request that he be given a chance to reenter parish ministry rather than continue in the health chaplaincy field. [REDACTED] concurs that the chaplaincy field could produce more stress and tension than would be good for Becker. Becker explained that this is due mainly to the fact that he is often on call at night and also finds it difficult to cope with the death and dying phase of his ministry. I reviewed for both [REDACTED] and Becker my own conviction that Becker should not go back to the parish ministry at this time. I pointed out to [REDACTED] the risks of personnel involvement and attachment to young men who are constantly around the parish. I also pointed out Becker's bad reputation among his fellow priests and the strong likelihood that it would be extremely difficult to find a parish that would accept him unless he would go outside the diocese which would also jeopardize the professional relationship he had with Dr. [REDACTED]. I think [REDACTED] came to see the picture a little more clearly as I explained some of the past situations that had occurred. He agrees that Becker needs a stable assignment in order to regain a good reputation. I asked that the health ministry be reconsidered and got Becker to admit that part of the stress he is involved in now centers around the fact that he is not only going to school full time but he is also working on a part-time basis at St. Joseph's Hospital. Following his CPE training, this particular work load would be reduced somewhat. I told them that I wanted to consult with Father O'Donnell at St. Joseph Hospital to see how Becker was doing and also with Nesseth to see just what would be involved in hospital chaplaincy as far as night calls, etc. [REDACTED] and Becker agreed to reconsider the whole thing and I told them that I would be in touch with them in the near future.

11/23/83

1142. Becker, Franklyn

Fathers Nesseth, Metz, and I met to discuss Becker's situation. I explained to them that his therapist and Becker have agreed to reconsider the idea of Becker working in the hospital ministry (for a while they felt that this ministry would not be what Becker needs at this time). Both Nesseth and Metz feel that it has to be told to Becker that there is no other choice in this Archdiocese but to comply with this type of ministry. Later on Nesseth contacted Father Becker and found out that Becker's evaluation in CPE this week went very well. Becker suggested that he would be willing to take another unit of CPE hopefully at a place like the hospital in Mendota, Wisconsin under the direction of Father Donald Shmauz. Nesseth was happy to hear about this and set up a meeting with O'Donnell, Becker, himself and myself for next week when we will discuss this further. It looks like Becker may have reconsidered and come around to our way of thinking.

12/2/83

1152. Becker, Franklyn

Father Nesseth shared with me and Father Metz Becker's CPE report (as reported by Becker). It is a good report in the sense that Becker retraces his personal history that led up to his CPE work rather accurately. It is also clear from his own statement that he understands that the alternatives for ministry have run out and that he is expected to make the best of hospital ministry. Now Nesseth and I will meet with Becker and with Father Richard O'Donnell of St. Joseph Hospital to discuss the CPE report from the standpoint of his supervisors.

12/5/83

ADOM025901

Becker, Franklyn

Father Nesseth called to see if I had any information, and I told him of my conversation with Mrs. [redacted] and that she would be getting back to me as soon as she spoke to Sister Aurelia about the possibility of Becker becoming part-time chaplain at St. Mary's and full time in CPE. Nesseth said that O'Donnell called him from St. Joseph Hospital and said they needed some help the first week in August. I told him to get a hold of Becker and have Becker do that work.

7/20/83

685. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to Mrs. [redacted] from St. Mary's Hospital who told me that Sister Aurelia, president, and she had decided that they would not be able to hire Becker even on a temporary basis even while he receives CPE. They still feel he was too apprehensive about all the duties that were entailed in their job description. She also sensed a personality problem with Becker of a non-descript nature. She said that his lack of training would be the biggest factor for him not being hired.

7/25/83

698. Becker, Franklyn

He told me that he has been accepted at St. Luke Hospital for CPE but Father O'Donnell at St. Joseph's Hospital is interested in him working there part time. It looks as though O'Donnell may be able to offer him a CPE course at St. Joseph's and some part-time work on the side. I told Becker that he should work this out with Nesseth and to let me know what has been decided. Becker also said that he had been talking to [redacted] at St. Michael's and finds out that the position there is still open but that they are probably looking for a religious order priest.

8/5/83

799. Becker, Franklyn

He told me that he is anxiously looking forward to CPE. He said that he never thought he would become interested in hospital work but finds it more and more interesting and enjoyable as he helps out at St. Joseph's and in the other hospitals. He thinks it will be a fine career for him in the future. He told me he would like to remain in residence at the Bethany House at least during his CPE. I told him that we would have to see about the availability but that I thought something could be worked out. I told him also that we wanted to work out a new status for him and figure out everything that had to do with his salary. I told him that he would be expected to pay room and board but that the diocese would cover his CPE expense. He seemed to be very cooperative and happy.

8/29/83

864. Becker, Franklyn

I discussed his salary and other temporal arrangements with Father Michael Newman. The arrangement that Newman will discuss with Becker is this: Salary, health insurance, room and board (Bethany House) from the Archdiocese plus CPE tuition. Becker will be on his own for car expenses. He will be permitted the \$125 per month he receives from helping out at St. Mary's Nursing Home but the amount he receives from his part-time work at St. Joseph's Hospital will be a component of the total salary he receives from the Archdiocese.

9/17/83

543. Becker, Franklyn

I told him that there quite likely would be a position for him at St. Mary's Hospital. He showed interest and so I told him that I would talk to Nesseth about further details on Monday. He will have to interview with Nesseth and with St. Mary's Hospital. Becker told me that he has been going to Father Jack Raynaldo, SJ for spiritual direction and finds this to be very helpful and productive. I asked Becker to see Dr. [REDACTED] next week about arranging for a weekly session of psychotherapy. I told Becker if this could be done by a psychologist, all the better. Becker has a psychiatrist in mind and I told him to check with [REDACTED] first. Becker seemed very cooperative throughout the conversation then he told me of his extreme anger with [REDACTED] who has had a couple of men sleep over at the residence when Metz was away. Becker claims that [REDACTED] meets these people at his AA meetings, and I told Becker that if this is going on, [REDACTED] will "hang himself." I told Becker it would not be good for him to let his anger get the best of him over this and so we talked it out and he felt better. I told him I will be happier when he has a psychotherapist that he can share some of these feelings with. Becker realized that he probably would not get the job at Divine Savior-Holy Angels because of his lack of qualifications. He seemed to be in an excellent mood, and he told me he was really working hard on his personal problems.

6/10/83

554. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to Father John Nesseth about Father Becker and a possible assignment for him at St. Mary's Hospital. Nesseth will now talk to representatives from St. Mary's about this before Becker interviews. Later on, I spoke to Dr. [REDACTED] and told him that we wanted Becker to undergo psychotherapy but only once a week. [REDACTED] said that he could take care of that for Becker if Becker was comfortable with him. I told the doctor of the possibility of him working at St. Mary's Hospital, and [REDACTED] has no problem with that. When I asked how the matter of the pediatric ward should be handled, [REDACTED] felt there would be no problem if Becker ministered to those people because they would not be there on a long-term basis to provide Becker with the opportunity of establishing a relationship with them. I told the doctor that when St. Mary's Hospital does some checking they may get some very negative feedback about Becker. I told him I thought it would be good if we could have St. Mary's talk to [REDACTED] if necessary. He is going to work that matter out with Becker so that he can be supportive of Becker to St. Mary's.

6/13/83

660. Becker, Franklyn

Father Nesseth called to say that St. Mary's Hospital reported that the interview with Becker for the chaplaincy position there did not go well. They got the impression that Becker was not all that interested in serious hospital ministry and the accountability that it requires. They thought that he was looking for something a lot easier. Nesseth asked me to pursue this with Mrs. [REDACTED] Director of the Pastoral Ministry Department [REDACTED] because I know [REDACTED] personally. When I spoke to her, she restated their position that they are having some difficulty with Becker's attitude. I told her that our plan would be to assign him part time with continuing education in clinical pastoral education. Following that a decision could be made as to his continuing at St. Mary's. She sounded willing to do this and said she would explore this further with Sister Aurelia, the hospital administrator. [REDACTED] will call me back.

7/19/83

ADOM025903

Becker, Franklyn

Becker and I met with Dr. [REDACTED] the psychiatrist, for [REDACTED] report and interpretation of the Wausau evaluation of Becker [REDACTED] liked the Wausau procedure. He said it was very adequate and accomplished what we wanted it to do. The only thing he would have preferred would be to have the actual results of the MMPI and the Rorschach test so that he could interpret them himself rather than have them computerized.). [REDACTED] told me that Becker is an ego-centric (verses ego-distonic), pedophile and homosexual. This means that he has no mechanism to stop once he develops the urge to act out these characteristics. Usually such action will take place under stress. In Becker's case due to a rebellion against authority. [REDACTED] said he is not pessimistic as the people at Wausau. He said there are a couple of ways this situation can be approached all of which depend, of course, on Becker's willingness to alter his behavior. The ideal way would be psychoanalysis approximately four times per week for the next four to five years. The second way would be through analytic psychotherapy which could occur about one hour per week. In both cases there is no guarantee that Becker will be cured. The key in all of this is Becker's desire to be cured. We then spoke about assignment possibilities. [REDACTED] said that in his opinion, parish ministry is out of the question. The best assignment for Becker would be to an all-girls' college or high school, e.g., Divine Savior-Holy Angels. The second best would be to a geriatric nursing home or hospital setting. The next possibility would be full-time campus ministry. [REDACTED] realizes the possibility of homosexual encounters but pointed out that these are consenting adults not children and it is their decision rather than a seductive process. I asked [REDACTED] what he thought about hospital chaplaincy. He said that he would have no problem with this because very few hospitals have large pediatric wards and with CPE and under supervision he did not feel that this type of assignment would be bad for Becker. Becker did a little bit of protesting throughout this session and his anger flared at times. Frequently, he would remind me of so and so, and so and so who is doing this and that and getting away with it. I finally told him very plainly that we did not intend to play any more games with him. The past is past. We know and have identified his problem, and it is up to him now to demonstrate whether or not he really wants to be a priest. I told him we would probably enjoin some sanctions on him, e.g., the next time we get a complaint he will be suspended. This external force or pressure should help motivate him, I thought, and Dr. [REDACTED] concurred. Becker was agreeable to all of this, and I told him that I wanted to discuss this further with the Archbishop and that when I got back from my vacation we would map out a program for Becker. In the meantime, I asked him to get under the direction of a spiritual director. [REDACTED] thought it would be best if that person were a male. I gave Becker the names of three priests and asked him to contact each one of them. Actually that was [REDACTED] suggestion. He wants Becker to see each one of them several times to ascertain which one he feels most comfortable with. These priests are Father Oesterhaus, Raynaldo (both from Marquette High School), and Father Francis Dombrowski of the Capuchins. Becker agreed to do this.

5/10/83

Becker, Franklyn

I told him to arrange for an interview with Dr. [REDACTED] at Divine Savior/Holy Angels High School to see how his chances stood for an assignment there. He agreed to do this. I told him if he received a position like that he might be required to take some courses to get some certification. He has no problem with that.

5/12/83

318. District Attorney

1. Without any names mentioned and off the record I described the situation regarding Franklyn Becker to E. Michael McCann, the District Attorney. His reaction immediately was that the priest has been given adequate warnings and enough chances and that he should not be assigned anywhere where he could come in contact with youngsters. This precludes practically any kind of assignment. His advice was that we restrict him from ministry for about five years and if no complaints come forth in that time then perhaps he can be given another chance.
2. He asked me about a situation at St. John de Nepomuc involving slot machines. I told him that [REDACTED] collected old slot machines and every Monday night at a gathering of priests (AA group) in for a meeting, following the meeting they all played the slot machines. McCann was relieved to hear this but wants to track down where the complaint came from because he feels this would be an unsavory news item if it hit the press. Although he does not know whether this is illegal or not.

3/15/83

346. Becker, Franklyn

I met with him to request that he see Dr. [REDACTED], a psychiatrist for an opinion about his recent evaluation. I pointed out that we have some problems to deal with in assigning him and we all need more advice from professional people. Becker was very cooperative, signed the necessary letters of release, and will make an appointment today. He restated the fact that he wants to work as a priest and feels that he can do so responsibly in parish ministry. He told me that he has been inquiring about campus ministry in Illinois and Michigan where positions are open at the present. He asked if I had any objection to this, and I told him that I thought it ought to be discussed in the context of the total situation for which he is seeing Dr. [REDACTED]. I told Becker that any priest who receives permission to work in another diocese needs to be recommended by the Archbishop and myself and that we feel very strongly about letting another diocese know if any problems are involved in a priest's situation. The next step is for Becker to see [REDACTED] and then I will meet with [REDACTED] and Becker.

3/23/83

366. Becker, Franklyn

He told me that he had made an appointment and will be seeing Dr. [REDACTED] on Wednesday, March 30.

410. Becker, Franklyn

Father Metz told me that yesterday he observed Father Becker coming out of the transitional residence for priests with a young boy. Metz recognized the boy as the same one Becker took on the Caribbean vacation late last year.

4/6/83

176. Becker, Franklyn
He and I received the report of his recent evaluation by the Wausau Mental Health Associates. The results are as follows:

1. In his spiritual assessment [REDACTED] OFM Cap. indicated the need for Becker to have a regular spiritual director. I told Becker that I would furnish him with a list of recommended spiritual directors in the Milwaukee Area.
2. The results of his physical examination were all normal except for some lab tests that showed a few abnormalities in the blood and urine. It was recommended to Becker that he have himself retested by his private physician in a couple of months to see if there are any fluctuations in these lab tests.
3. The psychological assessment shows that Becker is normal in every way. However, it did clearly indicated Becker's gay orientation and gay activity. The report forecasts that unless Becker is willing to control himself, there is a definite likelihood that the conduct of the past will be repeated. Dr. [REDACTED] said that their recommendation would be to have Becker assigned to a desk job somewhere where the temptations that would result from associating with young boys would not be present. I told him that there was little likelihood that this was possible to achieve. However, I said that a hospital chaplaincy where Becker would be under strict surveillance might be possible. Becker indicated that he was not interested at all in hospital work.

In the discussion that followed Becker continued to maintain his innocence claiming that all the accusations of the past were false and misinterpreted. [REDACTED] and I tried to point out to him that this is not the way others interpret his actions and behavior. He will never be able to succeed unless he does something to curb his associations with single males and also his lack of good judgement. [REDACTED] said that the report clearly showed that Becker has a need "to speak out on issues," particularly in the area of gay rights.

I pointed out the problem was the manner in which Becker had been speaking out which was not in conformity with the Church's rhetoric on the matter. Becker said he admired Archbishop Weakland very much for the strong stand he took for gay rights in his Catholic Herald article. I told Becker there was a world of difference between that and the way Becker has spoken out to the news media. I asked Becker what kind of counseling he would give a person who wanted to live a gay life style. Becker said he would have to judge each case individually and would probably refer the person to the local Dignity Chapter where Becker said he could get advice from 30 to 40 priests about this kind of behavior. Before the interview ended it was decided that I would study the report further and discuss it with the Archbishop, and then we would proceed to see what kind of an appointment we could arrange for Becker. I told Becker it might be important for him to meet together with the entire Personnel Board in the near future. He is willing to do this. It will probably be necessary for us to readjust his status now from sick leave to awaiting assignment.

2/14/83

310. Becker, Franklyn

He called me from Sienadale where he had celebrated the 8 o'clock Mass for the sisters. Both he and the sisters agreed that it would not be financially feasible to pay him to drive down each day for the celebration of Mass. They feel that they will be better off by driving to one of the parishes in the neighborhood. I told Becker that was fine and that the sisters should make their own arrangements from now on. Later I spoke to Father Nesselth. He is more convinced than ever that Becker should not be assigned to hospital ministry because of the potentially dangerous temptations that might present themselves.

3/14/83

2. Becker, Franklyn
I spoke to Father Terrance Flynn at the St. Luke Institute in Washington. He told me they would be willing to do a complete evaluation of Father Becker, but the earliest available date they have for this is March 7 - 10. Later I spoke to [REDACTED] and he agreed that this is too long a time to wait. I told [REDACTED] that I would look into some other possibilities and contact him again soon.
15. Becker, Franklyn
Mrs. [REDACTED] called to say that she simply wanted to put in a good word for Becker. She knows he is under some pressure at the parish and would like to support him. She sees him as growing, improving, opening up, something she feels others do not see. She describes him as shy at first but then warm, caring, and kind and gentle. I thanked her for her support for Becker. She assured me that she was doing this on her own and that no one had put her up to it.
33. Becker, Franklyn
I ran into him at the Marquette basketball game. He has already begun to move into the priests' residence on 35th Street. I told him that we had him tentatively scheduled for evaluation at the Wausau Clinic the end of this month. He is willing to do this. He and I will discuss this more in detail next Tuesday when I have dinner at the house.

1/3/83

1/5/83

1/11/83

112. "Father X"

Father X is Franklyn Becker for the purpose of this news note. I received a letter from Mrs. [REDACTED] Whitefish Bay, 53217, Telephone: [REDACTED]. It expressed her concern for Becker. She has known him for 11 years and has become a confidant of hers. She realizes his weakness and knows the situations which led to many of his uprootings. She now hopes that we will follow through with psychiatric or psychological help for him. I spoke to her on the phone, and she told me I could share her letter with Becker's doctors. She probably would be willing to be part of a confrontation with Becker if need be, but she is somewhat reluctant of my sharing the letter with him immediately. What is disturbing is the fact that Becker continues to associate with the young boy he took on the cruise from St. John's Parish in South Milwaukee. Most recently, they both attended the permanent diaconate ordination at the Cathedral. He is also seeing a boy from St. Eugene's Parish in violation of the wishes of the boy's mother [REDACTED]. I asked Mrs. [REDACTED] to have the mother of that boy contact me to discuss this matter further. Mrs. [REDACTED] thinks that Becker is going to go through motions with us only and that he feels he can continue living his present life style. She hopes he can be helped but is somewhat pessimistic. She is willing to cooperate with us in any way that she can. Right now Becker is angry at her because she has criticized him for hanging around with both of these young boys. She feels that he will be back to see her eventually. She is like a "confessor" to him.

1/29/83

1120. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to [REDACTED] who told me that Becker made an appointment with him for after the holidays. [REDACTED] feels that Becker is simply going through motions because I am asking him to enter psychotherapy. [REDACTED] wonders whether Becker is treatable in this state. Later I spoke to [REDACTED] DRE at St. John, South Milwaukee. He feels that Becker is a very sick person who needs some type of help. He talks about Becker tormenting the blind musician at the parish. Also, he mentioned the incident of the 7th grade student who accompanied Becker to the Caribbean. He said that for a while Becker was turning him and others against Father Bill Heffron. Now these people realize how Becker had manipulated them. He also stated that Becker had made some inappropriate remarks from the pulpit and in the sacristy. [REDACTED] said that I could use this information with discretion and that he intends to speak directly to Becker about these matters. I also spoke to [REDACTED] She is the [REDACTED] at the parish. She too spoke of her frustration with Becker. She mentioned the incident about the piano and claims that he manipulated her to getting more involved in that issue than she really wanted to be. Now he has hidden her microphone out of spite. She claims he works the staff against the staff in a very manipulative manner and that he has been caught time and time again in lies. Each time he gets very angry. He has called her a "two-faced SOB" in public. She feels pity toward him and thinks he needs some kind of help.

12/14/82

1131. Becker, Franklyn

When we met, he did not like my decision that he had to move from St. John's. He had hoped it would be possible to work with the next pastor, particularly if that were Father Anderson. I told him that our concern was that no pastor at this point will work with Father Becker. I told him we wanted to help him help himself and that I was not sure if [REDACTED] could provide the help that Becker needs at this point. Becker suggested that we let [REDACTED] be the one to decide that. I changed his appointment from January 4 to December 22. After he and [REDACTED] have discussed the matter for a while I will join in the discussion. I spoke to him about the possibility of a complete evaluation at a clinic in Washington, and he said that he would be very willing to cooperate with that. We spoke about him residing at the transitional priests' residence. He is willing to do that, but does not know what he will do with all his furniture at the rectory which he claims belongs to him. He also asked that he not be put on sick leave because this would be publicized around the Archdiocese. I told him I would talk to Derfus about it.

12/20/82

1140. Becher, Franklyn

He called to say that he had been thinking things over since our meeting yesterday. He now feels that he wants to see his personnel file, then he wants an appointment with the Archbishop, and then he wants to look into Due Process against [REDACTED] for the way he was treated at St. John's. I told him that I would let him speak to [REDACTED] about making an appointment with the Archbishop and suggested we talk about the other matters when we meet with [REDACTED] tomorrow. He seemed very agreeable to this.

12/21/82

1142. Becker, Franklyn

Due to unforeseen circumstances I did not arrive for the meeting with Becker and [REDACTED] until it was over and Becker had already left. I spoke briefly to [REDACTED] who told me they had a good meeting and that Becker is ready to undergo the psychiatric evaluation at the St. Luke Institute in Washington.

12/22/82

1104. Becker, Franklyn

Father Hornacek reported that Father Anderson is not sure whether he can assume the pastorate if he has to work with Becker. Later [REDACTED], the DRE at St. John's, called to express her grave concern for Becker remaining at St. John's Parish. She said that the piano incident is not over yet. Becker lied through this ordeal, she claims, and supposedly said that he would disband the parish council if ever he would get in charge. She does not trust him, but claims his initiative is good and his methods or approach are bad. The parish staff meetings have disbanded recently because of him. She objected to the fact that he took a Caribbean vacation at the height of the parish business. Worse yet, he took along a 7th or 8th grade child which has shocked many people. About three months ago, Becker told [REDACTED] and Tom Kalp, transitional deacon, that Becker is a homosexual. However, she quickly pointed out that she has never seen him make any overtures to others, especially children. He gave a retreat last summer to high schoolers and three times she was disturbed by his dwelling on the idea that people should be open to each other's sexual preferences. She claims Becker has gotten many negative letters about the piano incident. She strongly feels that he needs psychological help. I told her, confidentially, that we were working with him along these lines. She claims he has turned Heffron into a liar by his manipulative tactics. She claims that Becker harrassed [REDACTED] musician by following her and poking her deliberately in the back. This morning at the 8 o'clock Mass he spoke from the lectern about the piano issue trying to sway the people in that direction (On December 19 the parish council will decided on the piano--I told her about the need for a proxy). [REDACTED] hopes I will not have to use her name but she gave me permission to do so if necessary. Later on I spoke to Mr. [REDACTED], parish council president, at St. John's. He expressed his grave concern also for Father Becker. [REDACTED] feels that Becker is in need of psychological treatment. He said that the parish council is very disturbed about Becker, and I told [REDACTED] that Becker claims no one has ever confronted him about their feelings toward him. [REDACTED] said this simply was not true, but he agreed that in a very short time he and some of the other council members should talk to Becker about their concerns. I told him, confidentially, that I was working with Becker to get him treatment. I pointed out that I would follow through and that he could assure the people that even if Becker stayed for a little while longer, it would be under the supervision of the Archdiocese. [REDACTED] said he felt better about this, and I reminded him of the need for a proxy if the piano issue comes up. I told him we would have a temporary administrator there when Father Heffron leaves. This satisfied [REDACTED]. He told me that a few of the council members and he would confront Becker with their feelings toward him. This is to clear up any ambiguity in Becker's life about the people's feelings toward him.

12/10/82

1060. Becker, Franklyn

Father Heffron told me he is very upset because Becker has been acting very strangely since Heffron received his new assignment. There have been several incidents which exhibited Becker's extremely poor judgement. The most recent was Becker's acceptance of a chaplaincy for one week on a Caribbean cruise. Heffron did not object to this but later has found out that Becker has taken a 7th grade boy on the trip with him. Heffron has been in contact with the boy's mother who now realizes her mistake. I told Heffron that we were going to assign Becker to a sick leave and get him back into therapy with [REDACTED]. I spoke to [REDACTED] later in the day and he concurred that this is necessary procedure at this time.

12/1/82

1085. Becker, Franklyn

We met, but before I even said anything he knew that I was going to confront him about recent events that he was involved in at the parish. He had long explanations for the matter of the piano and tried to convince me that all the hubbub was not his fault but rather it was due to indecision on the part of Father Heffron and Heffron's vacillation. As regards taking a 7th grader on a Caribbean trip, he stated that he had just mentioned in passing that it would be good to have the boy as an altar boy. This was immediately picked up by the boy and his parents who arranged everything after that. Becker assured me that he had no physical contact with the boy although he admitted that they shared the same cabin (separate beds) and that they told the crew and passengers that the boy was Becker's nephew. When I showed Becker how both of these incidents looked to others, he admitted that in both cases he used bad judgement. I informed him that the Personnel Board has suggested that he be removed from the parish, and I expressed my own feeling that we would have a hard time getting the new pastor to work with Becker. He said that Father Anderson has looked at the place and has indicated to Becker that he would be willing to work with him (Hornacek met with Anderson who said that he could work with Becker until next spring). I told Becker that we were not sure that Anderson would be the pastor and that there could be problems for Becker if someone else is named the pastor. I asked Becker to see [REDACTED] immediately and discuss the possibility of the group therapy session that begins in January. Becker agreed to do this at once, and asked me not to remove him from the parish. Then he asked if he could be the temporary administrator in the interim, and I told him this would be impossible. I pointed out that if people are indeed afraid of Becker's indiscrete activity, they would be on the Archbishop's and my doorstep as soon as Heffron is gone to protest Becker's being named temporary administrator. I told him that this decision was in his interest as well as our own. He seemed to see the logic behind it, and when he asked whom we were considering and I told him it was Father Mackin, he was very pleased and released.

12/7/82

740. Becker, Franklyn

██████████ called to say that his brother and sister-in-law who live in St. John's Parish are worried about the relationship that exists between Becker and their teenage son. Becker is lavishing gifts and attention on the boy and the two are spending a lot of time together. I told ██████████ it would be helpful if the parents of the boy went directly to Becker and informed him they wanted this to stop.

8/17/82

806. Becker, Franklyn

Father Heffron came to see me today to say that Father Becker could no longer be the associate pastor there. He said the alternative would be that he himself would resign as pastor. I told him that was not acceptable because it would not be good for the parish. He claims Becker is lazy, causes trouble, and lacks common sense. It grates at Heffron to see someone receive a salary for doing nothing. The parish secretary and others in the parish are complaining about Becker. People are asking Heffron to have their weddings and funerals to avoid Becker. Heffron recalls that when Becker was sent there it was with the understanding that if things did not work out, Becker would go. It was his last chance. Heffron feels as though he has bent over backwards to help Becker but it is beginning to take a toll on him. Now he will confront Becker with this and tell him that he has seen me. Then he will write a letter to me about this and I will discuss the matter with the Personnel Board next week for a recommendation.

9/2/82

947. Becker, Franklyn

I spoke to ██████████ about the possibility of his being a part of the confrontation of Becker by me and Hornacek and Heffron. ██████████ feels it would be better for us to do the confrontation and then suggests that he follow up with Becker as his therapist.

11/1/82

32. Becker, Franklyn
Yesterday, Heffron contacted me with the information that the mother of one of the seventh grade boys told him that Becker was associating rather intimately with her son. The son claimed that he held is hand in the movie and touched him rather improperly in a swimming session. I told Heffron that we had to move on this immediately and decided to meet with him, Becker, and the parents of this boy on Saturday. When we met, Becker was completely floored at the accusation. He admitted that he had been rather closely associating with this boy, who was one of the very first he met at the parish. The parents commended him for taking some interest in their boy and they rather apologetically inferred to Becker about what the boy had said. Becker swore up and down that his motives were good and that nothing was out of order. The parents believed this, in fact the father of the boy apologized to Becker for even accusing him of this. There was little I could do at this stage but knowing Becker's background I am sure that his judgement was very poor. After the parents left, I asked Becker to get in touch with [REDACTED] I had spoked to [REDACTED] the day before and told him that I was considering relieving Becker of his job at the parish. After meeting with the parents, however, I decided to not press the issue at this point. Heffron seemed pleased with the outcome also.

1/10/81

414. Becker, Franklyn
I spoke to [REDACTED] about Becker's progress. He said that recently Becker has been avoiding him. He wants to see Becker once a week and Becker is making all kinds of excuses to get out of those meetings. [REDACTED] feels as though Becker is not facing up to his personal problems. I explained my fears to [REDACTED] that Becker is now grinding his ax in a public forum. [REDACTED] felt that Becker, himself, and I ought to sit down together and confront the implications of such a situation. I am going to ask Becker to meet at [REDACTED] office next week Wednesday at 4 p.m.

3/4/81

892. Becker, Franklyn
[REDACTED] reports that there is some progress being made with Becker. He finally is beginning to see that his biggest problem stems from his impetuosity under stress. [REDACTED] told me of a couple of instances recently when Becker was able to control himself. He continues to see [REDACTED] and I reminded him of the celibacy statement we are looking for. He said he has been after Becker to do this and will remind him of it.

6/8/81

711. Becker, Franklyn
I called him in because he wrote a nasty letter to the Personnel Board applying for Whitewater and at the same time derogating the characters of Wagner and Budzynski. He told me that he was in an angry mood when he wrote the letter. I told him how the new policy on open listing worked and we discussed Wagner and Budzynski briefly. I put him on the spot to produce evidence against the two but as I thought, it was hearsay and rumor only. He told me he is doing fine at the parish where he is stationed and enjoys it there. I warned him not to do anything rash or it could hurt not only others but himself as well. He seemed to take the warning well but one never knows.

8/9/82

ADOM025912

44. F. BECKER

Vint told me that he has things worked out so that Becker can stay until the June appointments. Wittliff has agreed to this.

3/27/80

121. Rev. Franklyn W. Becker

[redacted] called regarding a debt she claims Becker owes her. She was referred by Don Weber. I told her I would look into the matter and get back to her.

4/16/80

130. F. Becker

Discussed [redacted] complaint with Franklyn Becker. He regrets the fact she called the Chancery Office and asks to deal with her directly. I suggested only that his paying her \$25 00 a month will satisfy her. It might be the cheapest way around a potentially aggravating problem.

4/17/80

156. F. Becker

[redacted] called twice and I referred her, both times, directly to Becker for the purpose to resolve the financial bickering that exists between the two. I told her that the Archdiocese had no part in this and I could not take her place of Becker's. She still seems to think that I am favoring Becker.

4/22/80

675. Becker, F.

Becker will be going to St. Eugene's Parish as Temporary Associate August 12. He hopes to stay there eventually depending on the wishes of the new pastor. If that does not happen, he wants to talk about a year's leave of absence for study purposes. I discouraged that idea and told him that I would like to discuss it further with him next week when he is in town. The Personnel Board see him going to St. John Kanty as Associate after St. Eugene's. I will also talk to him about some of the problems he is getting himself into by the way he talks publically about his life style.

8/8/80

747. Becker, Franklyn

We met to discuss his recent letter in which he applied for the associate pastor position at St. Eugene's parish if the new pastor would be agreeable to this. Otherwise, he wanted to take some time off for continuing study. After some discussion about his personal life style, he agreed that the situation at St. Margaret Mary had taught him an important lesson. He must not talk openly about the gay movement in a militant way. He assured me absolutely that he would cause no more problems along this line in the future if he got a position. I emphasized that he was not eligible for a parish as pastor and he agreed. I told him no decision could be made at St. Eugene's until a new pastor was there but that if it were not agreeable at that place we would find him a position as Associate. I told him he was free to apply for a short sabbatical but that a longer leave of absence for studies would be out of the question. We ended on a positive note.

8/21/80

825. Becker, Franklyn

He called to see if I could tell him who the new pastor of St. Eugene's was and I told him not yet. He wants to know what his status is there so that he can begin to work with programs on the parish level if he is going to stay. I told him that by the weekend we ought to be able to let him speak directly to the pastor.

9/3/80

902. Becker, Franklyn

I discussed Becker's future appointment after I told him that Msgr. [REDACTED] did not want him to remain at the parish. I suggested he contact Father Stoll to see if the position of associate there would work out. He is also interested in development at St. Cecilia's in Thiensville. I told him that [REDACTED] called and wanted to contact him. She feels as though he still owes her money. This dates back to spring and the news notes can be consulted for more detail. Becker asked me to call her and tell her that he would definitely get in touch with her as soon as he gets a permanent assignment.

9/18/80

929. Becker, Franklyn

[REDACTED] has informed Franklyn Becker that [REDACTED] wants him to leave the parish by October 1 or 6 at the latest. I spoke to [REDACTED] and he does not want the people at the parish to get the impression that there is something wrong with Becker and, therefore, wants him to move as soon as possible. I told him that I had been working on this but that it might take some time. I will contact Becker to see if we can't speed up the process of his leaving St. Eugene's.

9/27/80

944. Becker, Franklyn

Father Stoll informed me that he would prefer not to have Franklyn Becker as an associate. He has talked to another priest who is willing to consider being associate there. I spoke at great length to try to convince him that Becker needs a position under the guidance of someone who can call him to accountability. Stoll is afraid that if Becker's problem manifests itself in the small community, the damage will be irreparable. I told him that Becker is now willing to settle down and needs one more chance. I told Stoll that we would help him work out a job description so that Becker would not be free to do as he pleases. Stoll's biggest worry is that if he leaves things up to Becker's initiative nothing will get done. Hornacek, Stoll, Becker, and I will sit down and discuss the matter further. I think it is time to make Becker aware of the fact that no priest wants to work with him.

10/3/80

1011. Becker, Franklyn

Yesterday I spoke to Hornacek about Becker's situation and suggested that we try to locate Becker at St. John Kanty Parish with Kazmierczak. Hornacek agreed to contact Becker to see if he would be willing to go there, then he will contact Kazmierczak. If this fails, we will have to do something about getting Becker off the scene at St. Eugene's before [REDACTED] explodes.

Dear Archbishop:

In view of what has been transpiring at St. William's during the past few weeks, I feel obligated to express my concern regarding the problems which seem to be worsening.

You are aware, of course, of the rift among people of this parish. Numerous families are now very much disturbed after having been held as a captive audience at two Sunday Masses during which the associate, Father Franklyn Becker, related his reactions toward living conditions at the rectory. Whether his recital of grievances had any basis or not, he surely did everyone a great injustice by speaking as he did about the parish's pastor on Vocation Sunday.

If a problem existed, I believe there are channels for recourse other than the pulpit where visitors and children are present along with parishioners.

Does Father Becker have a personal problem? If such should be the case, he surely cannot continue to take out his frustrations on the parish. After what has happened, it doesn't seem likely that so many words can be forgotten since they've reached so many people.

I hope that some action can be taken to remedy the present very unhappy situation.

Thank you for giving attention to this matter.



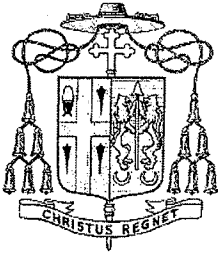

It has come to our attention during the past few weeks that Father Becker has been involved in an incident which could cause consternation in our parish. In talking with him regarding this matter we have been impressed with Father's knowledge of himself and his openness and honesty. The incident which occurred in December is an isolated one, an incident which perhaps was not so much an inappropriate act but a concern for a teenage boy who might be struggling with his own identity.

Further discussion of the actual event is unnecessary at this time. As a member of St. Margaret Mary Parish we would like to offer support for Father Frank and hope that the incident will not be cause for him to be removed from the parish. Many have grown to respond to him, to respect and trust him. It would appear to us that in seeking therapy he has taken the necessary step to prevent a recurrence of the incident.

Father Frank's continuation in the parish would mean to us that our parish is willing to support one another in whatever crisis each is experiencing. We could foresee much growth occurring within a parish which had come to grips with a problem and stood behind a fellow human being.

As we look at the total parish we can see other problems which exist and which have not meant a change in personnel. We ask that the same lenience and understanding be demonstrated in this case.

We have been Catholics all of our lives, have been closely and intimately connected with the Church for many years and now feel a real commitment to be actively and humanely a part of the Christian Community. We would like to see the Church (all of us) continue to live up to its standards, "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone."

When a member of a family is in error it is a sad and unfortunate turn when that member is rejected and turned away from the family unit. Surely the family name is tarnished, there is a certain amount of

embarrassment, but the family that stands behind such a person and works through the problem is to be admired and commended. If the priests in this parish were to stand together in support, it is our guess that the rumors would slowly dwindle and the incident forgotten.

Your Excellency:

I am writing to you on the advice of Fr. Joseph Hornacek regarding the matter I presented to him last Monday and which has been brought to your attention. I sincerely regret having to write this letter which is in the nature of an apology for my actions which are an embarrassment not only to me but to the priesthood in general.

You have been most kind to me since my return to the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and I am most grateful for your compassion and benevolence. When I spoke to you last year regarding the military chaplaincy, you were most cooperative even though that decision may not have been in my best interests. I accepted the assignment to St. Margaret Mary Parish knowing that there were some problems, not only with the pastor, but I was uncertain how I would get along with my classmate, [REDACTED]. As the months wore on the problems became more apparent. The lack of communication with Father Vint was certainly a contributing cause to my discontent, but perhaps equally disturbing was the lifestyle of [REDACTED]. With my orientation the frequent presence of teenage boys in the house at night was tantalizing to say the least. It was during that time that I met the boy with whom I became involved. There is much more that I could say about those evening sessions, but I do not wish to incriminate [REDACTED], as the boys refer to him at this time. I feel that he has his own problem to deal with.

I have been in communication with the mother of the boy involved and she is sympathetic and does not intend to press any charges. My concern is for the boy who has not dealt with the situation as I had hoped. Since he has chosen to share the incident with some of his friends, I have been cast in a bad light and the decision that I leave the parish seems to be a prudent one. I would be willing to stay on until June if that were deemed advisable. I have not discussed the matter with Fr. Vint, but will do so as soon as he returns from Florida.

I am grateful for the opportunity to meet with Dr. [REDACTED]. I have set up an appointment with him for this coming Thursday. I have also been in dialog with several other priests who have been supportive. I really see the need for a support group among priests of my orientation and have discussed the matter with Fr. Jim Arimond.

As to my future I see several possibilities. Since last December I have been thinking about a return to California and have been in communication with two Franciscan communities--the Capuchins in La Canada and the Franciscans in Oakland. I have long been attracted to the Franciscan way of life and have been inspired by my patron saint, Francis of Assisi. Periodically I consider joining a religious community. I hope this is not an unrealistic escape.

I have also spoken to Fr. Jerry Lanser about the Albuquerque Villa and he referred me to Fr. Michael Foley. I spoke to Fr. Foley on the phone as Jerry had mentioned the possibility of an opening in campus ministry at the University of Albuquerque. He thought that perhaps in the event that I chose that option I could be in touch with the Servants of the Paraclete and their program while serving the campus community. I do not feel that I need to go through the six month program with them, but would find their support group beneficial.

The other option I would like to explore is the possibility of campus ministry in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Since 1975 I have applied for a position in that area. In view of my background I believe I am qualified having attended Chaplains' School at Niagara University, two years as Catholic Chaplain at Marshall University in Huntington, West Virginia and a short time at St. Louis University. I have attended conventions and seminars dealing with Young Adult Ministry in Florida, Ohio, and California so I have kept in touch. I find this type of ministry far more fulfilling than general parish work and for this reason I am questioning my role as a pastor for the 80's in Wisconsin. I understand that there will be an opening at UWM and at Parkside and I have indicated my interest to Fr. Roy Mateljan.

For the present I plan to remain at St. Margaret Mary Parish until the end of this month. I am willing to remain into March, if Fr. Vint wants me to cover for Fr. Dick Mirsberger who is going to Florida for a vacation. On the 10th of March I plan to fly to Hawaii with Fr. "Bruno" Henke and Fr. John Richetta to spend some time with Fr. Richard Beck. Since lodging will be provided, my expenses beyond airfare will be minimal. Originally Fr. Dominic Roscioli was going to accompany them but due to the illness of his father I will be going in his place. Right now I need a vacation and time to sort out my feelings.

I will be in need of a residence when I return from Hawaii. Several possibilities have been suggested. I had opted for an east side parish--where I could be close to the University to spend some time at the Newman Center with Fr. Larry Dulek. I have known Larry for some time and have also discussed my interest in campus ministry with him. Holy Rosary Parish has been suggested as a possibility. I have also been in touch with Fr. Ron Crewe at

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St. Hedwig's. A residency there also seems a possibility, particularly during the time he plans to be in Rome. He indicated that he will be away over Holy Week and Easter and has made a request for someone to cover for him. If he has not made other arrangements I would be willing to supply for him at that time.

I would also feel comfortable living with Fr. Jim Arimond and Fr. Richard Liska at Sacred Heart. I feel that Jim could be a real support to me. An added reason would be that I would be close to St. Francis School of Pastoral Ministry and the Albert Cardinal Meyer Institute. If I have the time I would like to take advantage of the programs that are offered there.

As a last resort I would be grateful if you could put me in touch with a benevolent bishop in California where I might serve. Periodically I get nostalgic for California--Wisconsin winters last too long--though this has been a mild one. I place this request in last place because while my mother is alive I believe I should remain close to her. As you may recall she spoke to you at the Naim Conference luncheon here at St. Margaret Mary's. She and I were most edified by your homily and your references to your mother. She was widowed when I was five years old and is a great lady. She has been the organist at St. Mary's, Woodland since 1930. The parish will honor her this April. I do not wish to dishonor her any more so than I have already done. She is aware of my orientation.

This has been a long letter. I did not wish to bore you. I hope you can sort it out and that we can come to a decision which is best for me and for the Archdiocese. I do not enjoy being a "problem priest". I am grateful for a "benevolent bishop".

If you would like to meet with me at your convenience I would be happy to do so. I guess this is the "Bottom Line".

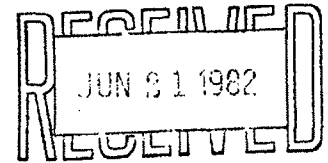

Training:

Franklyn always seemed to feel quite close to the church and to priests. Part of this might be due to the fact that his mother has been organist at Woodhull for many, many years. After graduating from Mayville High School in 1955, Franklyn entered Carroll College in Waukesha, but stayed only a few weeks. He stopped in to see the Pastor at St. Mary's Church, Waukesha, who took him to the Seminary, and that's where he remained. Fr. John Twomey was probably as big an influence as anyone during his seminary days. Franklyn did emphasize the intellectual considerably and still does today. This is evidenced by his reading and by the continuing education courses taken.

Family:

Franklyn's father [REDACTED], died about 40 years ago, when he was only about 4 years old. Consequently, Franklyn remembers very little about him. His mother is still living and is now 77 years old. He and his mother either get together or he calls her at least once a week. She, naturally, did play a big part in his life. Even today Frank is concerned about her reactions to any moves he might make, not wanting to upset or hurt her by them. He does not however, feel that she dominates him, as one of the comments said. Frank has a brother in Indianapolis. There seems to be a positive relationship here.

Health:

Frank's physical health seems good, and, apparently he does have adequate concern in this area. The respondents, too, found no problem in this area. He exercises quite frequently in the form of jogging, bicycling, and swimming. Alcohol is clearly not a problem; his weight too, seems pretty well controlled.

Assignments in Ministry:

- a) Past Assignments

ADOM026006

Frank has had nine assignments previous to his present position. He is now ordained 18 years. The longest assignment was four years. He most enjoyed the Campus Ministry work in Huntington, West Virginia. He also found this work most growthful and enriching. Frank seems to have a special liking to work with high school and college age young people. Frank prefers a Parish where he does have something to say and where he can make some decisions on his own. As far as why Frank had a considerable number of different positions since ordination, the reasons are hard to pin down. He seems to have left each one for a different reason.

b) Present Assignment

Frank is presently Associate Pastor at St. John's, South Milwaukee. The two priests he lives with, Frs. Bill Heffron and Vic Zwaska, are quite compatible for him. One of Frank's problems though, is that St. John's is really not his kind of parish, as Frank prefers the parishioners to be of a more "professional" bent. St. John's is primarily blue-collar. He feels his talents cannot be utilized as well here. Frank seems to relate quite well with the lay leaders, lay ministers, and the Parish School. He also feels that St. John's could nicely become a "team Parish". Frank would like to work in this situation, with more opportunity to make decisions. Frank is also reluctant to become too involved with the parishioners, for reasons which will be evident later.

Frank seems to prefer "one-on-one" work. An area which is not his favorite is hospital work. It is too depressing.

Spiritual Leadership:

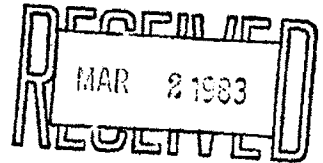
Frank, by his own judgment and that of the people, seems to do a more than adequate job in the various liturgical and sacramental functions. Also, his compassion, concern, sensitivity and understanding are seen and appreciated. The one point which surfaced quite often was that people would like to see Frank show a greater sense of enthusiasm and vitality as he goes about serving the people. Another comment coming through fairly often was that they would like to see him show more actual leadership in his ministry. Frank often feels ill at ease showing leadership because of the fact he is not the Pastor.

Lifestyle:

Two qualities which seem to be too strong in his life are fear and aloneness. Two fears are the fear of not being accepted by other priests, and the fear of the possibility of his homosexual orientation being found out by the people.

Frank has been hurt in the past by getting too close to people. Now he is hesitant and tends to withdraw.

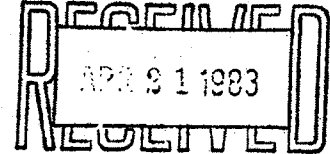

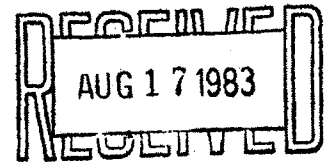

I preferred to issue a separate letter in reference to your assignment at St. Joseph Hospital. My purpose in writing this letter is two-fold. First of all, I want you to know that I truly wish you to be successful in your new assignment. You have been ordained 19 years now and I know you desire to be successful in priestly ministry. I also share that desire.

However, a second reason I have in mind for writing this letter is to caution you that, because of past personal problems, should further occurrences of this same nature arise, I will have no alternative but to take canonical steps that would bar you from exercising any of the powers of orders or jurisdiction which you have as a priest. In addition, you would have no right to any financial support from the Archdiocese.

I hope this admonition will not be seen as something altogether negative, but, rather, as a genuine concern for your welfare and that of the people we serve collaboratively. I and my staff stand ready to assist you in any way we can. I want you to be faithful to your weekly psychotherapy session for additional support, and I would ask you to authorize your therapist to be in contact with me and Father Janicki if your therapist feels this would be advantageous.

Dear Dr. ██████:

I appreciate the updated information on Father Franklyn Becker which you sent me within the past month. It is good to see that he is progressing under your care.

As you know, finding the right assignment for him continues to be problematic. I would concur with your observation that the assignment recently offered to him as chaplain to retired and physically ill sisters was less than ideal for him. As a last resort, however, I was hoping he might be able to work at it, even on a temporary basis, until the right assignment comes along.

A recent development seems to brighten the picture. There will soon be a chaplaincy available at West Allis Memorial Hospital that will be offered to Father Becker. I spoke to him today about it and he seemed to be interested. It may take a couple of months for this to transpire.

One thing that I must clarify is the matter of Father Becker being assigned to parish ministry. I can appreciate your recommendation along this line but in light of Father's problems in the past this would be impossible to effect at this time. This reason, quite frankly, is based on some pretty solid legal advice. This is not to say that Father Becker has exhausted his chances at parochial ministry forever. Establishing a stable record in a chaplaincy assignment ought to enhance his chances for a parish assignment in the future years.

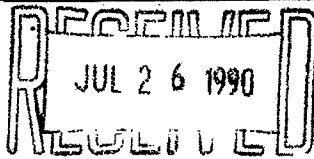

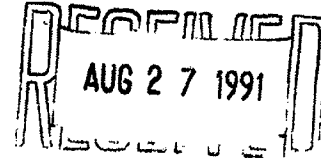

I am writing to you as a follow-up to our phone conversation of last Friday. In regard to the matter discussed I also received the packet from [REDACTED]. I sincerely apologize for the embarrassment this has caused you and the others involved. As you will note from the contents I am a prime victim of the exposure together with [REDACTED]. The only reason I can recall why your name ever appeared on the list was that I felt that you among the others might have been willing to discuss the issue. Many of the people on the list had been or were celebrants for Dignity Masses. It was not meant to be a declaration or admission of a stand on the issue of homosexuality in the Church. I do not know if you were ever contacted for an interview.

I did not come into the project willingly and I rue the day when I agreed to an interview. As you will note from the correspondence the whole thing surfaced over ten years ago. I am not the same person I was then. People do change. There is a lot of inaccuracy in the report. For one, I was never "banished" to California. I was released by Archbishop Cousins for the assignment. Archbishop Weakland was installed while I was in California. A lot of the stories got mixed up in the telling. When one does an interview with a journalist, one is at the mercy of the interviewer. All I can say is that I sincerely apologize for my involvement with the project. I have expressed this to Archbishop Weakland and Bishop Sklba more than once.

I am at a loss as how to deal with this latest bomb dropped on me. Perhaps it is best to ignore it. I have had no communication with [REDACTED] since 1987. There was never a love relationship between us. I often sign my letters "Love and blessings" implying nothing other than Christian love. If anyone were to deal with [REDACTED] I would think it should be Bishop Sklba since he was his classmate in Rome.

I met with Tom Venne this morning. Hopefully the matter of finances can be straightened out. In the matter of a future assignment I am not opting for a position in Hospital Ministry. I need to get away from the stress of that setting and carrying a pager. Hopefully you will find something else for me. I am available for help-out work and hope to remain here in the City until I am reassigned.

RESTRICTIONS AND CONDITIONS OF MINISTRY

REV. FRANKLYN BECKER

1. You will continue in individual therapy with Dr. [REDACTED] and will cooperate with the Vicar for Clergy in any other requests for continued treatment.
2. You will have no contact with minors. The only exception is permission to have minors serve when you preside at Eucharist.
3. You will have no overnight guests in your place of residence.
4. Your ministry is limited to help-out work only as directed and permitted by the Vicar for Clergy. Any other requests for ministry (e.g. cruise chaplaincy) must be cleared in advance by the Vicar for Clergy and the Chancery.
5. You will avoid all places and persons who have been sources or occasions of serious temptations to violate sexual morality. Culture events on university and school campuses may be attended without advance permission of the Vicar for Clergy, if you are accompanied by a mature adult.
6. You will engage in regular spiritual direction with an individual approved by the Vicar for Clergy.
7. You will be obedient to the directives of the Archbishop regarding any further specifications which he might impose or request concerning your participation in treatment, ministry, and/or your personal life.
8. You will refrain from any retaliatory action against those who have reported on your prior behavior, their families, or those whose duty it is to impose accountability. This includes no contact whatsoever with the media.
9. You will refrain from conversation about the sexual orientation of other priests both publicly and privately.
10. You will cooperate with the monitor appointed by the Vicar for Clergy regarding oversight of compliance with these restrictions and conditions for ministry.
11. Review of these restrictions will be at twelve-month intervals or as directed by the Vicar for Clergy. It is your responsibility to cooperate with that review.



Your Eminence:

In accord with the norms of *Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela*, I am submitting for your consideration the case of a priest of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Reverend Franklyn Becker has been accused of multiple acts of sexual abuse of minors. The summary of these allegations is enclosed. Father Becker has admitted that a number of these acts of sexual assault occurred.

Over the years, efforts were made to provide spiritual and psychological interventions that would rehabilitate Father Becker. None of these efforts have been successful as he reoffended after each intervention, often while still in therapy. Father Becker was diagnosed as an impulsive pedophile in 1983. At that time, it was thought that a non-parochial assignment might be possible. A further psychological assessment was undertaken in 1996, after an additional accusation of past behavior came forward. In that evaluation it was advised that the potential for future reoccurrence of past behavior existed. Even while in ongoing therapy, he was known to have obtained child pornography. With our current understanding of the nature of his condition, it is clear that he will never be able to assume any public ministry.

As we have reviewed the various files, it is clear that he consistently abused his office both to gain access to vulnerable boys and to elicit the trust of their parents. Both in his parochial assignments and in his temporary functioning as a cruise chaplain, he found opportunities to abuse his office in a flagrant and repetitive fashion.

The impact on his various victims has been significant. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee is paying ongoing therapy costs for several of them and has done so for a number of years. Our new found awareness of the severity of damage caused by sexual abuse at the hands of clergy makes it impossible for us to ignore this situation.

On May 10, 2003, Father Becker was arrested for sexual assault. The alleged offense took place in California in the 1970's but, because he left the jurisdiction of the state, it remains an offense that can be prosecuted. He will be extradited from Wisconsin to California for trial. The public display that will now take place in the criminal trial in California, to say nothing of the civil suits that could arise there, makes the potential for true scandal very real. The media reports on this case have already begun.


Given the nature and frequency of the alleged and admitted sexual abuse, along with the serious abuse of office, I have pondered long and hard to arrive at an opinion about the most appropriate action to be taken. In order that justice may be made manifest and healing of the victims and the Church may proceed, I am asking that Reverend Franklyn W. Becker be dismissed *ex officio* from the clerical state. Whatever financial needs he may have can be provided for from a special fund we will set up until such time as he is able to draw from the pension fund. Since it is conceivable that he will be spending some time in prison, he may be eligible for this pension by the time of his release.

If the judgement of Your Eminence is that this case should proceed to a dismissal by decree of your Congregation, I would cede to that judgement. Furthermore, if it is your judgement that this case should proceed through a canonical penal process, I humbly request a dispensation from prescription as well as a sanation of any procedural errors that may have occurred during the years this case was under investigation. The severity of the offenses is such that it is my opinion that these requests are justified.

I look forward to your further instructions in this matter.

CIVIL AUTHORITY'S ACTION: Franklyn Becker was arrested on May 9, 2003 in Mayville, Wisconsin. He is being extradited to California where he will stand trial for at least two counts of criminal sexual assault.

CURRENT STATUS: Franklyn Becker has been without a ministerial assignment since 1990. He was permitted to provide weekend assistance at parishes under the supervision of the pastor. He was also monitored by archdiocesan officials. He was indefinitely restricted from all ministry in July 2002.

RESIDENCE: Private residence in Mayville, Wisconsin prior to arrest. Unclear where he will reside after extradition to California.

SUSTENANCE: Since being unassigned, he has received monthly support from the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Currently that support is in the amount of \$25,633 annually with an additional housing allowance of \$9,355. He has been maintained on the archdiocesan health, medical and dental insurance as well. Since contributions to the priests' pension fund have continued, he will be eligible for pension funding when he turns 68.

STATEMENT OF RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS
INVESTIGATIONS INTO ALLEGATIONS OF MISCONDUCT

Whenever an accusation of inappropriate behavior is made, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee takes seriously its obligation to discover the facts, provide for protection of individual and communal rights, and encourage fulfillment of obligations. In that regard, whenever an investigation or evaluation is being conducted with someone accused of an offense, the following shall serve as guiding principles:

- 1) Professional evaluators conduct the evaluation using accepted evaluation tools of their profession;
- 2) The person being interviewed/evaluated is informed of the process to be used;
- 3) The person being evaluated/interviewed is informed regarding what information will be shared with whom and waives the expectation of confidentiality regarding the sharing of information with necessary persons.

Upon being notified that an investigation/evaluation is being undertaken the accused person should be informed of his/her rights. These rights include:

- 1) The right not to implicate oneself
- 2) The right to counsel, civil and canonical
- 3) The right to review the results of any evaluation
- 4) The right to know what has been alleged and to offer a defense against the allegations
- 5) The right to due process
- 6) The right to have the investigation conducted with discretion lest his/her good name be endangered by the investigation.

In addition to being informed about his/her rights, the accused person should also be informed of certain obligations such as:

- 1) The obligation not to interfere in the investigative process
- 2) The obligation to observe any special provisions imposed by the diocesan bishop.

Dear Lyn:

With many apologies and at long last, I write to thank you for your letter of April 23, 2003. So many things have occurred since that date shortly after Easter and I can only imagine the emotional roller coaster ride which you have been constrained to take as a result. When your communication first came to my desk, I was beginning the hectic cycle of daily letter reading and Confirmation celebration throughout the Archdiocese. So many issues of importance were relegated to some other moment when more attention could be given to the communication, rather than my being content with a pro forma acknowledgement. Since then your own judicial hearings and movement have, at times, left me a bit unsure of how best to be of assistance amid such shifting sands.

I understand your concern about financial questions because the impending change may have significant consequences, not only for yourself, but for your mother as well. Her advanced stage and deteriorating health undoubtedly make that a matter of concern for you, as well as your brother in Indiana.

I don't know the type of car you may currently lease, but I suspect that you are reviewing everything with an eye toward simplicity and good stewardship. I understand the personal need for such judgments since I have accepted a monthly salary of \$500, plus the social security supplement each year. My meetings on the national level, however, and meals hosted for local pastoral needs can and do come out of a professional allowance. I guess we both know what it is to be faced with major responsibilities and limited resources.

I continue to share your concerns with Joe Hornacek so that your basic needs may be met while awaiting further action with the District Attorney as the cases may require.

My prayers are certainly with you and my genuine interest in offering the emotional support, which may be especially necessary during this time of sadness and apprehension.

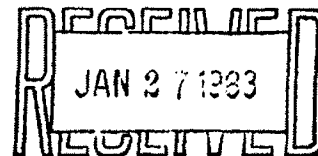

Dear Father Janicki:

I am writing this letter in regard to a priest who is, as of Sunday, "awaiting assignment" and is presently up in Wausau undergoing a series of psychological tests. I am referring of course to Franklyn Becker.

I have deliberated over the past few days as to the wisdom of writing this letter. However, since you seem to be the one who has taken personal charge of his case, I decided to go ahead and write you. Lyn has been a very close friend of mine and my family for over eleven years, ever since he was assigned to Holy Family parish in Whitefish Bay. I have tried over the years to be a supportive friend. At the same time I have not blindly condoned many of his actions and patted him on the head just because he was a priest. I have seen him create the situations which led to his many uprootings, from Whitefish Bay, to Waukesha, to West Virginia, to St. Louis, to San Diego and finally back to Milwaukee.

I summoned the courage to write you because I am genuinely concerned about him, first as a human being, and secondly, as a priest with a future here in Milwaukee. Since, as I understand it, you were a classmate of his, I am sure you are aware that Lyn has few, if any, really close friends of long duration among either his priest peers, or the people he has met through his various assignments. He withdraws from any intimate, close relationships that require any giving on his part. I am a tenacious, bull-headed German, however, and have managed to hang in there as his friend, stormy though the road has been at times. He is a very attractive, sensitive man, a person who can seem to take a real interest in people's problems and thus has no trouble in drawing an admiring group of supporters around him early in an assignment. As time goes on and people become more aware of the real Lyn Becker and his many problems, including those with young boys, his new-found friends either walk away and don't want any part of him or a remaining few continue to believe his "poor, misunderstood priest" story and are quite willing to feed both his and their egos by wining and dining him in the manner consistent with his lifestyle. It's relatively easy to "buy" your own personal priest, especially one with his tastes.

From lengthy conversations with him over the past few weeks, I get the impression that the Archdiocese is finally beginning to draw the net around him and take more drastic steps to deal with his problem, other than merely directing him to [REDACTED] I sincerely hope this is true. Anything less than this would merely be putting a bandaid on a bleeding sore to hid it from view without taking care of the sore. Therefore, my concern is that you might be misled by his "I'll play their game as long as it gets me a parish" attitude which I have perceived over the past weeks. While outwardly displaying acquiescence, I feel he is, on the other hand, still taunting you and others in authority. This was evidenced by his appearance at the deacon ordination

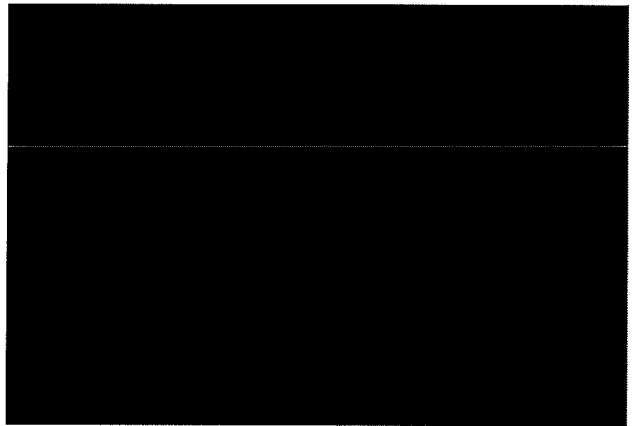

last Saturday at the Cathedral with the young boy he took on the cruise last November, which incident was partially responsible for his removal from St. John's. His sole reason for being at the cathedral was to witness the ordination of a friend and former parishioner from St. Margaret Mary, who was well aware of the circumstances of his removal from there. His appearance with the boy caused much comment. It again proved either his lack of judgment and discretion OR his intent to flagrantly wave his attraction to young boys in the faces of his fellow priests and/or former parishioners from St. Margaret Mary. I think this incident proves he is really back on square one as far as any self awareness or perception of his problems.

I would hope, and assume, Father Janicki, that the contents of this letter would remain confidential. I am sure that if he ever knew I had written you it would be the final termination of our friendship and I would hate to see that. I think he may in the weeks and months ahead, need a friend who is not only supportive but who can get away with slapping his hands and voicing disapproval of his acts of indiscretion. Our friendship has endured enough and is such that I can do that. It would be unfortunate, I believe, if this were taken away from him. My concern is that you do not turn him out into a parish as a pastor, or team member (which he seems to feel he has been promised by the Archbishop) until he is truly judged capable of handling it by very competent psychologists, psychiatrists, or whatever.

I'm sure you can recognize that Lyn can be a very creative, sensitive, caring and warm individual and can, on many occasions, function well as a priest. At present, however, he is incapable of doing this for any extended period of time on a consistent basis. And this he won't be able to do until he recognizes his problems and shortcomings and willingly takes steps to overcome them. He is far from this realization. Until then, any new assignment would be just another bandaid and an innocent parish could get hurt.

Thanks for listening. I am concerned about him.

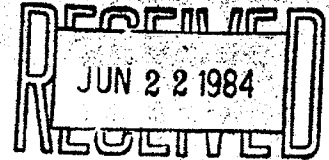

Dear Father Janicki:

This letter is to keep you posted on Father Franklyn Becker's progress and my current recommendations regarding him. I last saw him yesterday, June 19, 1984, after a two week hiatus in treatment due to my recent vacation. He has been doing very well in treatment and making much progress at recognizing and doing something positive about his passive/aggressiveness. He is becoming increasingly direct, and mature in his emotional responses and interactions. He is also finding it easier and more satisfactory to interact socially with those closer to his age.

However, as you know or suspect difficulty with dealing with either dominating or highly neurotic adult females (remindful of mother) can be an exhausting and stressful task for him. I fear that exiling him to chaplaincy for retired or physically ill nuns could lead to uncontrolled recrudescence of any or all of his problems. If the unconscious processes didn't get him, slowly increasing anger would almost certainly lead to a breakdown in the wellness he has begun to achieve relating to his passive/aggressiveness and manipulateness.

It seems to me that the very best type of placement for him at this juncture as he seems to be proving himself for quite some time now, would be to place him in a small to medium sized community, ideally as associate priest--in a community large enough to have two priests serving the same church yet small enough that he could be kept under sufficient scrutiny by the other priest and by the forces which naturally operate in a smaller community. I discussed this recommendation with him, and he seems very happy to accept such a position could one be found. It is my belief that he could even be trusted with a sole pastorate, but I understand how you might see that as too great of a risk.

I would recommend that you review the February 1983 reports from Psychology Associates in Wausau and that you consider my remarks and recommendations in light of the description of Lyn's psychological makeup contained therein.

Dear Archbishop Weakland:

I read with great interest your article in the November 13 *Milwaukee Journal*. While for many years I did not think that you or the Archdiocese was adequately dealing with the problem of clergy abuse, recently I have felt you had become more forthright in addressing the problem. However, several quotes from that article, "...I have never dealt with a pedophile." and "[I] know[s] of no local priests who are true pedophiles" make me wonder if you truly are confronting the problem.

I find those two statements of yours very surprising as I am the mother of a young boy who, as a [REDACTED] was abused by a parish priest in Whitefish Bay in the 1970's. As I later found out, this priest had a record in his previous parish and after leaving Whitefish Bay, continued on his merry way in parish after parish, both here and out of state. According to anyone's definition, he was a pedophile. And he is still one of your priests in the archdiocese.

At the time that his offense against my son occurred, I was [REDACTED] children, very vulnerable and very committed to seeing that my children be educated in Catholic schools. That's how he came to know my sons; we took him into our hearts and into our family.

I will not go into the details of this priest's relationship with my family over the years. I was very naive and flattered that he took an interest in my boys, particularly the younger one. Neither of these boys had "reached puberty," which age category you use to distinguish between pedophilia and ephebophilia.

You did remove this priest from parish work some years ago and persuaded him to go into hospital ministry. Accusations followed him throughout his stint in hospital work and he was abruptly terminated from his last assignment several years ago. He is now prematurely "retired," taking care of his elderly mother and helping out on weekends in neighboring parishes. For removing him from parish work, I commend you.

I was pleased to read your remarks indicating an understanding of the trauma and lasting effects such incidents leave on the victim's family, if your remarks were indeed sincere. It was many years before I realized the

seriousness of this problem in my family. While I was at some point aware of this priest's reputation, I thought he held my family in too high a regard to try anything with either of my boys. As I indicated above, he was literally one of the family, and I was from a generation that had great faith in the Church and its clergy and put priests on a pedestal. Looking back, I can see that I was in a state of denial while much of this was going on.

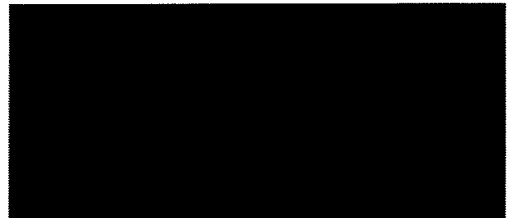
It wasn't until the Hlsly and then the Effinger matter made headlines in the newspaper that I grasped the seriousness of my son's abuse. At that time my older son made the remark that if his brother were living in Milwaukee, he would probably be leading the parade in suing the Archdiocese. I was shocked at his remark.

At no time did it ever occur to me to sue the Archdiocese or the priest.

[REDACTED] I believe we live in too litigious a society. Money could never heal the scars left by one priest's indiscretion. However, Archbishop Weakland, don't for a minute smugly think that the only cases of clergy abuse out there are the ones that sue and/or run to the media. All I really wanted over the past years was an acknowledgment by you and the Archdiocese that this problem existed and the seriousness of it. I still don't believe it would have caught your attention if various victims had not gone to the press. Therefore, I question whether your compassion is truly voluntary, but I do appreciate your efforts to make up for lost time.

In addition to a deep sense of guilt for allowing, or even encouraging, this to happen to my son some years ago, I have in the past few years experienced a loss of faith, an indifference to the Church I was brought up in, and now a real bitterness that this particular priest has been "rewarded" with early retirement for a lifetime of botched assignments due to his fondness for the altar boys. He is doing exactly what he has wanted to do for many years - live at home with mother and make a career out of being a cruise chaplain, even to the extent of having calling cards made up indicating such. I find this very hard to accept.

I would be interested to know if you have any support groups for the families of children abused by the clergy and if so, if you could send me information on them. I'm sure there are many good Catholic families out there trying to cope with this problem but too ashamed to discuss it with family or friends.

RESTRICTIONS AND CONDITIONS OF MINISTRY
REV. FRANKLYN BECKER

1. You will continue in individual therapy with Dr. [REDACTED] and will cooperate with the Vicar for Clergy in any other requests for continued treatment.
2. You will have no contact with minors whatsoever. There are no exceptions.
3. You will have no overnight guests in your place of residence.
4. Your ministry is limited to help out work only as directed and permitted by the Vicar for Clergy. Any other requests for ministry (e.g. cruise chaplaincy) must be cleared in advance by the Vicar for Clergy and the Chancery.
5. You will avoid all places and persons who have been sources or occasions of serious temptations to violate sexual morality. This includes functions on university and school campuses unless you have received permission from the Vicar for Clergy in advance of that function.
6. You will engage in regular spiritual direction with an individual approved by the Vicar for Clergy.
7. You will be obedient to the directives of the Archbishop regarding any further specifications which he might impose or request concerning your participation in treatment, ministry, and/or your personal life.
8. You will refrain from any retaliatory action against those who have reported on your prior behavior, their families, or those whose duty it is to impose accountability. This includes no contact whatsoever with the media.
9. You will refrain from conversation about the sexual orientation of other priests both publicly and privately.
10. You will cooperate with the monitor appointed by the Vicar for Clergy regarding oversight of compliance with these restrictions and conditions for ministry.
11. Review of these restriction will be at six month intervals or as directed by the Vicar for Clergy. It is your responsibility to cooperate with that review.

On Wednesday, June 2, 2004 at 11:20AM I met Fr. Becker at the Mug & Muffin Restaurant located in Oconomowoc.

Fr. Becker arrived in his new Toyota Camry XLE. He parked it at the far end of the parking lot where it wasn't by any other vehicles. I teased him about this. His response was now he had a poor man's car. He pointed this out to me several times before and after our meeting.

He asked if there was anything new about him at the archdiocese. I advised him that I was not aware of anything having come back from Rome as of yet. He is concerned about laicization.

I did tell him again that because of the budget deficit we would have to go "Dutch" and pay for our own lunches. He asked if there were any other cuts coming, such as to his monthly check. I said that I didn't know of anything else being cut that would affect him.

He said he had been feeling down. He said it was because he had to celebrate his 40th anniversary of ordination alone. He said he went to Fr. Charlie's (Whalen) 45th anniversary Mass on 5-30 and recalled his own ordination on the same day. Fr. Charlie had a big Mass at the parish. His picture was on the bulletin. The parish gave him a stole and a check for \$1,800.00. He, Fr. Becker, had nothing and received nothing. He was to have received his 40th anniversary stole from the archbishop at this year's spring assembly. He said he spoke to a couple of his classmate and they had received notes or cards of congratulations from Joe (Fr. Joseph Hornacek, Vicar for Clergy). He got nothing and couldn't even celebrate the anniversary of his first Mass on 5-31. Wester

He said that he hadn't heard anything more from California. He had turned over the request from California for access to his personnel records from Milwaukee and San Diego to his criminal attorney in Milwaukee. The attorney did nothing with them and in fact missed the deadline for a response. He called the attorney and had the paperwork faxed to Attorney pat Madden who lives in the area of Fr. Becker's residence. Attorney Madden looked over the papers and suggested that Fr. Becker write a letter to the authorities in California explaining he felt these issues were of a confidential nature and he wouldn't authorize their release.

Fr. Becker said he did write and send the letter apologizing for the delay stating he had moved and the papers didn't get to him in time.

He said Attorney Madden sent him a bill for \$76.00 for this service. He then reiterated that he had given his criminal attorney \$15,000.00 last year and the man didn't do anything. They did negotiate a break and Fr. Becker got \$3,000.00 back. But the point is that Fr. Becker doesn't know what will happen to him next and he can't afford to keep paying these attorney's fees. He wonders if the archdiocese shouldn't be paying some of the attorney's fees since they are involved in these matters also.

He brought up compensation several times. He said he heard the priests were getting a raise and that they weren't happy. I explained the 5% proposal and the reasoning for cutting it to 2 1/2%. I said with the 25 people being let go from the Cousins

Center we didn't even know if we would get any kind of a raise. He mused as to whether or not he would get some kind of cost-of-living raise after July 1.

He brought up retirement. He said that he will be 66 this July. He can't get social security until he is 70. He knows there are some priests that have been allowed to retire before they turned 68. He wonders if he would be allowed to retire and what would happen to his pension if he did so and was laicized. We discussed pensions, etc. and he asked me to make a few inquiries for him about these matters. He is afraid to do so himself.

He said he thought about looking for employment but just can't do so. He said he is under way too much anxiety at this time in his life. He mentioned California, attorney's fees, lack of income, loss of income via laicization and potential loss of all pension benefits. (It was apparent to me that he had more anxiety than usual).

He brought up health insurance costs. He said that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] his therapists, were working to get him some benefits from an out dated disability policy he used to have. He hopes for some income from it but doesn't think it will happen. He also said he is concerned about the weekly visits to [REDACTED] and how he would pay for them as his insurance coverage has about run out.

I asked him about his visits. He said he meets with [REDACTED] weekly and periodically with [REDACTED]. He said they just sit and talk as he and I do. He doesn't think he needs to see [REDACTED] once per week. He thinks once per month would be adequate.

I asked about his current stress and anxiety levels. I asked whether or not he felt he would benefit from being on some type of medication. He said he has never been on these kinds of medication and didn't really want to go on them. He also worries about the cost of these medications on his budget. He did say [REDACTED] gave him her home telephone number a long time ago and that she told him if he ever feels he needs some medication(s) he should just call her and she would prescribe something.

In discussing his visits with [REDACTED] I suggested he contact Fr. Joe (Hornacek) to determine whether or not he could reduce his visits to once per month.


Fr. Becker said he continues to monitor the priest sexual misconduct scandal on an almost daily basis via the computer. He checks what is going on in California and

Milwaukee. He believes that [REDACTED] his accuser in California, is a member of SNAP and a leader in the cry for justice. He worries that he will soon have to give a deposition and where that might occur. He worries whether it would be for the defense or the prosecution and who would pay.

I met Fr. Becker on Wednesday, April 28, 2004 at 11:30AM at the Mug & Muffin Restaurant located in Oconomowoc.

Fr. Becker said he had received a somewhat thick packet of legal materials from the State of California. He said that many of the victims of clergy abuse had joined together to file a class action suit against the diocese of San Diego. He mentioned that Attorney Jeffrey Anderson, who is representing some of the victims here in a suit against our archdiocese, is one of the attorneys' names within the paper work he received. He said that the materials asked for him to voluntarily send his personnel files to them for review.

He said that he didn't know what files they wanted. Did they want the files from California or Wisconsin or both? He said he didn't know whether or not he should comply with the request and send anything.

I asked him if he had spoken to an attorney and had the paperwork reviewed. He said he had called Attorney Smith, who had been representing him in the extradition hearing. He said he had done so because he felt they owed him some work since they charged him \$12,000.00 and really didn't have to do anything. Attorney Smith is looking over the paperwork.

He said he also contacted Attorney Pat Madden, a local attorney and someone he knows. Pat Madden told him confidentially that Smith had overcharged him as far as Madden was concerned. Madden also asked for a copy of the paperwork so he could review it for Fr. Becker.

Fr. Becker contacted Attorney Smith's office and they are forwarding a set to Attorney Madden for his review.

I told Fr. Becker he was right in having a lawyer review all of the documents that were sent by California. I would not send them anything back. I would wait until a court had ordered a subpoena and was specific in what it wanted in the way of "personnel files".

It was obvious that this has upset Fr. Becker and he is afraid he might have to return to California to stand trial or go to jail.

He was also upset that California would listen to [REDACTED] his accuser. [REDACTED] has a lot of problems and is just trying to get money. Fr. Becker said that he is mad that he has never been able to tell his side of the story.

He said [REDACTED] calls him regularly. [REDACTED] continues to lose weight. He also continues to drive to West Bend to a Wal-Mart store to buy food such as cucumbers. He does this because they are the best and Wal-Mart has the best price. We continue to laugh at this reasoning compared to the drive and cost of gasoline.

He said [REDACTED] continues to call [REDACTED] a woman who used to work at the parish he was at in Lomira. Fr. Becker wonders if he drives her a little nuts also. He said [REDACTED] checks the computer often to get copies of parish bulletins that he is interested in. Fr. Becker asked me if I knew that I could get a copy of every Sunday bulletin by going to the archdiocesan web site. I said I didn't know this.

Fr. Becker said some people at the archdiocese will be happy with him. He smiled and continued. He said he is turning in his Lexus for a new Camry at Jack Safto Toyota tomorrow. He was going to wait until December but he got a good deal coupled with a \$1,000.00 rebate. The car is the same color as the one he is driving now because he likes the tan. He said this should save him about \$150.00 per month. He is taking out a 4-year lease on the Camry.

He continues to be very worried about money. He wonders if the archdiocese will keep sending him a check. He recalled, as he does almost every time we meet, that Bishop Sklba once said to him, "Don't worry Franklyn. The Church will take care of you." He wonders what Bishop Sklba meant by this.

He said that he was chewing something recently and suddenly it didn't feel right. Upon checking he found it was part of one of his crowns. He went to the dentist. The dentist said the crown had been fixed once before and they should do a new one. The dentist removed the old one and gave Fr. Becker a temporary. Next week he goes back for the new crown. He is concerned that this will probably cost about \$700.00. He wondered how much insurance might cover.

I asked him about his trip to Omaha for his niece's wedding. He said he didn't go. He said he hadn't been feeling well. He didn't know if it was a virus or what but he just didn't want to spend the time in an airport, at the wedding, etc. not feeling good.

He said his brother was not happy with him because he didn't call him for about two-weeks. When they finally did talk his brother was all right.

He said he went to his doctor for his annual checkup. The doctor told him his cholesterol was higher than before and increased the dosage of Lipitor that Fr. Becker is on. He is not happy about this. He also said the doctor told him that his PSI level is slightly elevated and that the doctor will check it again in 3-months.


I asked him if he had started walking yet. He said that he had not but now with the nicer weather coming he was planning on doing so.

He stated that he was continuing to worry about money. He repeated that he can not go on social security until he is 70 years of age because he didn't join the program early enough.

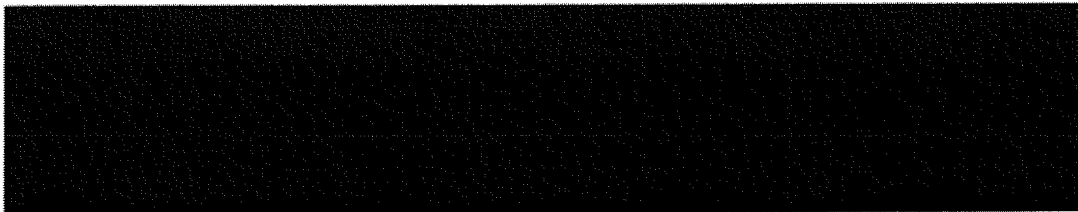
He continues to wonder whether or not his salary will continue and for how long. He wonders whether or not there will be a cost of living increase this year.

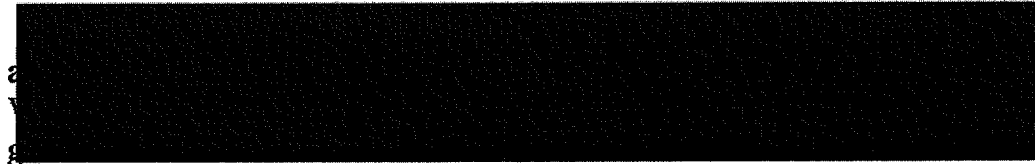

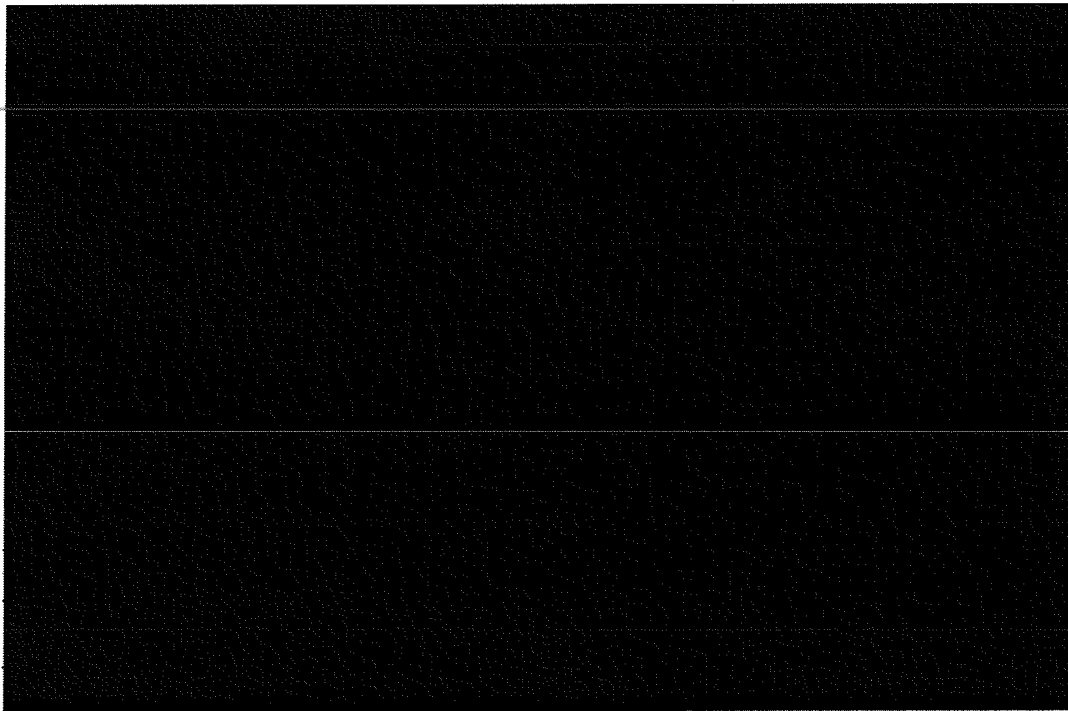

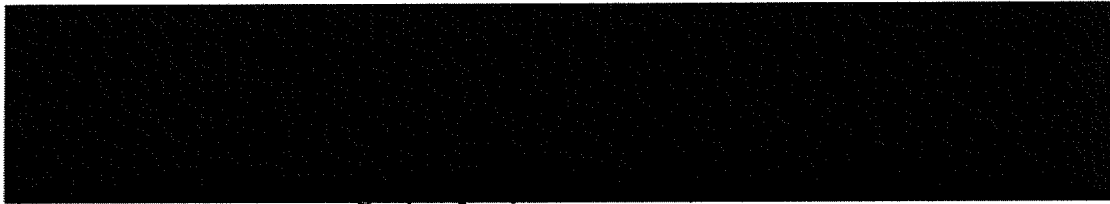

He said he continues to see his therapist. He recently asked her and her husband to fill out some paper work for his disability insurance carrier. He thinks he is eligible for some type of disability payout. He said the insurance company sent the wrong paperwork stating they sent papers asking for his physician's report. He had to call and spell out it was for psychiatric care. They sent the new forms and he is waiting for them to be completed and submitted.

He has not been exercising much because of the continued colder temperatures. He hopes to start walking more once the temperatures warm up. However, he is concerned about walking as he has been plagued by sciatic pain in his right leg for several months. He has been going to a chiropractor for sometime, seeing him several times per week. He said the man is not approved of by his insurance carrier so he submits the bills, gets the check and turns it over to the chiropractor.

We spoke about this treatment and I suggested that all of the "adjustings" might be the cause for continued sciatic pain. I recommended that it might be better for him to see his physician, obtain pain and muscle relaxing prescriptions and allow the sciatic nerve to heal. I shared my own bouts with lower back and sciatic nerve pain with him. He said he would think about it.

He said he got a number of cards from people he never would have expected and many of the people he thought he would hear from, he didn't. He said he got cards from brother priests as well as from Bishop Fliss, Bishop Bruskiwicz and Bishop Sklba. He was very appreciative of this support.

He did comment that he never heard a word from Fr. John Yockey. He thought this was strange. He wonders if Fr. Yockey is mad at him for some reason or something.

We talked about this and he said that he thought he would drive over to the rectory at St. Jerome's to see Fr. Yockey and ask him if something was wrong. He did admit that Fr. Yockey and he don't see each other that much since he can no longer be a help-out.

He said he does find himself getting ready to drive over to the nursing home about the same time every day as was his practice when his mother was alive and living there. He misses her but is happy she didn't have to suffer from long term memory loss like Alzheimer's patients do.

He said that he had recently gone to visit Fr. Ron Crewe at Sacred Heart Parish in Racine. He spent the night. He had never been to the parish before. They had a nice visit.

He said his brother's daughter had given birth to a baby girl since we last spoke. He said he is using some frequent flyer miles to go to Florida on February 2 for one week to visit the family. The niece has a home and Fr. Becker's brother and wife are staying with her. He was invited to stay there also but thinks it would be a little much with a new baby, parents and an uncle in the house. He called a retreat center he is aware of but they are booked the week he would be in Florida. He has two-nights stay booked at area hotels but is interested in checking out other retreat centers in the area. He is looking forward to seeing his family and enjoying the warmer weather.



He mentioned he continues to worry about money. People probably think he inherited money from his mother. Just the opposite; she had some insurance to cover her funeral but it cost more than she had. When he does get the insurance he and his brother will have to add to it to cover the costs.

He said he has about 1 year to go on his Lexus lease. He can't wait to get out of the monthly payment and get something cheaper. He doesn't know what it will be, but it will definitely be much less per month.

We spoke about employment and even just something part-time to give him a couple of extra dollars in his pocket. He said the same thing he has for some time, "What could he possibly do?" He has basically dismissed the idea of obtaining employment. Yet makes references to what he might do if he loses the income he currently gets from the archdiocese.

If and when the time comes that he is dropped from any monetary assistance by the archdiocese, he most likely will need close counseling and monitoring to prevent self-inflicted harm to himself.



Fr. Becker said he went to the Clergy Night Out sponsored by Marquette University. He said he saw a number of old priest friends. He said he had a good time.

He said his back continues to bother him. He is seeing a chiropractor twice a week. He also sees [REDACTED] his therapist, every Tuesday. He said his life seems to revolve around appointments.

Fr. Becker appeared to be doing all right and making adjustments since his mother's death.

On Wednesday, November 19, 2003 at 11:30 AM I met Fr. Becker at the Main Street Depot located in Oconomowoc.

After being seated at our table he asked, "Did you bring me any more bad news?" I said that I hadn't but then asked him what had happened. He asked me if I had heard anything about him. I said that I had not.

Fr. Becker then said that he had been contacted by Fr. Joe (Hornacek) a few days before. Fr. Joe told him that Rome had sent back his, Fr. Becker's, case. In doing so they asked Archbishop Dolan to contact Fr. Becker to see if he, Fr. Becker, would voluntarily apply for laicization. Fr. Joe then asked him if he would seek voluntary laicization. Fr. Becker replied that he would not do so.

Fr. Becker is very concerned about what would happen if he did seek voluntary laicization. He wonders what the archdiocese's responsibility would be toward him financially if he did this. Would it free up the archdiocese to just dump him? Would they continue to give him some kind of a salary? Would they continue to pay for health insurance? He stated he has been a priest for 40 years. The archdiocese owes him some kind of a living wage out of simple justice.

He said Fr. Joe asked him to write a letter to him stating that he would not seek voluntary laicization. He has since done so.

I asked if he had spoken to Pat Leggas, the canon lawyer, about this. He said that he had not. He doesn't really feel that Pat is representing him. He does have a friend from years ago who is also a canon lawyer. He called this friend and asked him what he should do and the friend advised him not to seek voluntary laicization. The friend indicated that the archdiocese must have a very weak case and that is why Rome responded as they did. Fr. Becker said he didn't know what kind of case they had since he was never given the names of all of the complainants or their specific complaints.

Fr. Becker then said he had also received a letter and call from Fr. Joe indicating that he and the other priests involved in clergy sexual abuse were not being listed in the Official Catholic directory (OCD). He said he was told that since they are not functioning it was thought best to leave them out of the OCD.

I suggested this might be good because that way reporters and alleged victims couldn't look him up and bother him. He somewhat agreed but felt it was one more way in which the archdiocese was slowly getting rid of the men.

He said he was not going to be involved in the group therapy for clergy involved in sexual abuse through [REDACTED]. He said [REDACTED] the husband of his therapist, had called Bishop Sklba [REDACTED] explained to the bishop that this type of therapy would not be good for Fr. Becker. Bishop Sklba had agreed. Fr. Becker seemed pleased about this.

Fr. Becker spoke about having to find some kind of employment if he were ultimately dumped by the archdiocese. He said that he is 67 and could retire at 68 but wouldn't have his quarters in for social security. He said he had heard that Fr. Mike Krejci had been applying for jobs. He wondered how he found out about them.

I said he should call Fr. Mike and ask him. I said I knew he was using certain computer job search companies. He said he would have to think about this as he is really too old to start looking for a job.

He wondered what some of the other priests were doing for support and whether or not the archdiocese was continuing to provide checks and other help. He mentioned that he had received a letter some time ago from Bishop Sklba telling him he would be cared for by the archdiocese. [REDACTED]

I told him I didn't know anything about this.

I asked him how he was doing in light of what he had told me. He said some mornings he wakes up and just wishes that the Lord had taken him in his sleep. He said he is not currently, nor has he recently, thought about committing suicide. He does get depressed at times.

I asked him what he was planning on doing for Thanksgiving. He said he would just go to the nursing home and eat with his mother. She seems to be holding her own.

His brother is planning on coming up to Wisconsin from Muncie some time before Christmas. Fr. Becker is looking forward to seeing his brother and spending some time with him.

Fr. Becker mused as to whether or not his brother could take him in. He decided he could not afford to do so. His brother is retired from the railroad, married with 3 children and 3 grandchildren, with a fourth on the way. He is not rich. He has his pension and that is about it. His brother is comfortable but that would be all.

I assured him I would continue to keep him in my prayers. I told him if he needed me he should feel free to call me at any time to talk or to get together if things started to pile up and he needed to talk or felt he couldn't cope.

He said he had gone on the computer last Thursday and had pulled up the San Diego newspaper. He read an article a reporter had written about [REDACTED] is the man who filed a complaint against Fr. Becker in regards to an incident(s) that occurred when Fr. Becker lived and worked in California. Fr. Becker is concerned that the State of California might still try to come after him. He is also afraid that [REDACTED] might bring a law suit against him.

I asked if [REDACTED] has contacted him since the last time and he said that he had not.

Fr. Becker said he was doing all right. He still isn't walking or exercising very much. Because of this he said he has put on a couple of pounds.

I asked about his mother. He stated that she is going down hill. Currently it isn't her physical health but her mental health that is failing. She is becoming more and more forgetful. He saw her on Monday. Every Monday she plays bingo. When he asked her about the bingo game she couldn't remember even having played. She routinely forgets things that he has told her several times.

He spoke to his brother from Muncie recently and his brother told Fr. Becker that their mother didn't know what or whom he was talking about when he told her about her grandchildren.

Fr. Becker fears that one day she will just pass away. It might be best for her but it will be very hard on him.



He said he had spoken to a friend who is a canon lawyer. The man recently attended the canon law convention in Spokane. I met Fr. Becker at Spinnaker's Restaurant located in Oconomowoc on Wednesday, September 24, 2003 at 11:25 AM.

I asked him how his trip to Door County had been. He stated he had a great time but that he wished it could have been longer.

I recalled he said he was going with a man named Ron. Therefore I asked him if Ron was the same man/priest who had come with him to the Cousins Center to look at the suites for retired priests. He said it was not. Ron is Fr. Ron Crewe, the pastor at Sacred Heart Parish in Racine, WI.

He said they went out to eat several times. He said Ron loves to go to antique stores and so they drove all over Door County looking at antiques. He said Ron is always looking for old postcards from Germany.

I asked what else they did. He said he could have stayed in Door County but that Door County is too quiet for Ron. They drove to Sturgeon Bay and hit some antique shops there. They also ate out there one evening.

Fr. Becker mentioned that he had parked his car at a parish in Kohler, WI. The parish secretary said he could leave the car in her garage at the parish. When he got back and backed out of the garage he hit the left rear quarter panel on the side of the garage entrance. He subsequently went to the Lexus dealer and they were able to rub out the damage with rubbing compound.


He said he has one year left on the car's lease and can't wait for it to be up so he can get something less expensive.

He spoke of money again. He is very concerned about money. He said he had gotten a letter from Fr. Alan Jurkus, the head of the priests' St. Michael's Fund. In the past the Fund has given him money to help pay for prescriptions. The letter suggested he try to get some Mass stipend money to help him pay for the prescriptions in the future.

He said he had been told by the vicar that he couldn't get Mass stipends. He wrote to Fr. Jurkus and suggested that he, Fr. Jurkus, contact the vicar for him.

He said he also got several bills for medical expenses. He questioned his insurance company, Blue Cross-Blue Shield, and was told that his deductible had been raised to \$500.00. He questioned this and I shared that I had WPS and my deductible had also gone up a substantial amount the last few years. He again said he didn't know how he would keep paying for things with his decrease in income.

He wondered if he were to be laicized would the archdiocese still be responsible for a portion of his health insurance, and what about his pension. I said that I thought the pension would be covered by Federal Law. However, I said I didn't know anything about the insurance coverage. I suggested he call Wayne Schneider at the Cousins Center.



Fr. Becker said he continues to worry everyday about his future. He is concerned about money. He can't sleep at night like he used to because he is so afraid of a knock on the door and the police being there to take him back to jail. He said he can never forget that experience and lives with it everyday and night.

Fr. Becker is deathly afraid that someone is going to come forward and make a complaint against him that will fall within the statute of limitations.

He brought up the fact that the legislature was still exploring a law similar to the one if California that granted a 1 year time period for anyone abused by a priest to come forward. I said California's law had been found unconstitutional and I firmly believed if passed it would be found unconstitutional here also. The legislature can't grandfather in penalties greater than already in the law at the time of an offense. I said this was politicians placating their constituents.

He asked if I had heard anything more about his having to move to the Cousins Center. I said I believed that was a dead issue at this time.

He asked if the group therapy idea had died. I said that it hadn't but had been put on hold for a while because the vicar had been too busy with other matters to get a letter out to all of the affected priests.

I asked what he is doing to help take his mind off of his worrying and/or problems. He said he continues to see [REDACTED] his therapist.

He said he also checks the Internet daily to keep up on the latest issues concerning clergy sexual abuse. He mentioned some priest in another state who had recently been named in a story.

I asked him if he was walking. He said he wasn't. I tried to encourage him to do so on a daily basis since the weather was no longer as hot and humid as it had been.

He mentioned he had a bike in a closet in his apartment. But went on to say he never rides it. It is just too hard to get it out and take it outside. He doesn't have a helmet and doesn't like to wear them any way.

He asked if I had heard anything more about his case. I said I had not. The latest I had heard was that the archbishop was waiting to hear something from Rome. To date he hasn't heard anything about anyone's case.

Fr. Becker mentioned that the archbishop had called him a couple of weeks ago. He said it was about 4:30 in the afternoon. His telephone rang. He answered it and the voice on the other end said he was Archbishop Dolan. He said the archbishop asked him how he was. He told him that he, the archbishop, is his pastor as well as the pastor of everyone else in the archdiocese.

Fr. Becker said he tried to ask the archbishop something about his case. The archbishop said he was not able to discuss Fr. Becker's case with him. He, the archbishop, was just checking on Fr. Becker's state of mind and health, etc.

Fr. Becker asked about several of the other priests, i.e., Frs. Flynt and O'Brien. [REDACTED]

We talked about the priests gathering at St. Mathias. He said he hadn't heard too much about the meeting. He expected Fr. Charles Wester would tell the district all about it when they next meet.

Father Carrol Straub telephoned as per my request. We discussed the concerns raised by Father Becker on 6-11-96 when we discussed the restrictions. The following were clarified by Father Carrol.

1. If altar servers are present for his masses, it will be OK.
2. The vacation cruise Father is planning does not violate the restrictions.
3. Doing funerals upon request are OK.
4. Father Laurin Wenig as his spiritual advisor is OK.
5. Father Wenig as one of the on-site monitors is OK.
6. Father Charles Wester, dean as one of the on-site monitors is OK.

I briefly advised Father Carrol of my meeting with Father Becker.

Called Father Becker at his home. He suggested Father Charles Wester be the second on-site person for the monitoring process. I advised him that I would contact Father Wester. Father Becker was very pleased with the fast response to his concerns and very pleased with the process thus far.

Dear David,

I am writing to you because I no longer know where to turn. I am in a state of depression and desperation and you know where that can lead. My letter to the archbishop goes unanswered as do those of Fr. Pat Lagyes. I received a copy of [redacted] letter to Fr. Curt Frederick indicating a recommendation for ongoing therapy which I cannot afford.

I have sent out job resumes, but am not optimistic because in my present state of mind I do not feel I can function in the job world.

The decision rendered on Dec. 6th has left me in a state of shock and bewilderment. While the Church has continued to support men like [redacted] for years, they feel it necessary to cut me out of health benefits when I need them most. If accepted into Medicare it will cost \$450 a month plus the \$250.00 I pay for medications since my Blue Cross has been terminated. All of this weighs heavily on me and I can barely perform the basic tasks of life. I make frequent trips to the bathroom due to an acute prostate problem. How can I get a job with these problems, physical as well as psychological? It's hard to "put on a happy face" and pretend all is well, when it's not.

all was going well from 1992 to 2002 when I was allowed to perform the ministry for which I was trained. But all of that has ceased. The loss of my mother, the loss of my priestly status has weighed heavily on me. I am no longer resilient & able to bounce back. I don't know what the Church expects, more than one priest has taken the suicide route, the latest being [redacted] [redacted] I can well understand the pressures that motivate such actions.

You may convey my sentiments to Fr. Lent Br. Hathless, & the Archbishop. I've had enough of Br. Hathless's flippancy remarks. When did she become a judge?

It would be unfortunate if I were forced to go to the Parliament with the story of continued cover-up in the Church. There are still many skeletons that remain buried, including those of our former Archbishop and a certain Monsignor.

I apologize for my lateness, but I needed to put this in writing.

I hope you & your family are well.

Here is my effort at a translation. I did make some of the suggested changes proposed by Pat Lagges. I do not see them as being as big a deal as he does.



Your Eminence:

In accord with the norms of *Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela*, I am re-submitting for your consideration the case of a priest of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Reverend Franklyn Becker has been accused of multiple acts of sexual abuse of minors. The summary of these allegations was previously forwarded. Father Becker has admitted that a number of these acts of sexual assault occurred.

We have been asked by Archbishop Amato of the Congregation to approach Father Becker with a request that he seek voluntary laicization as a sign of repentance. Although our Vicar for Clergy had previously made this request of him, he was approached once again. As you can see from the enclosed letter, he is refusing once again to take the requested action.

While he attempts to present a defense based on cooperation and need for sustenance, in interviews with him, there is little display of repentance. His sorrow is not over what effect his immoral and abusive behaviors had on others, so much as it is remorse that he has lost a sense of status. The sustenance issues he raises are irrelevant. The Archdiocese understands its obligation to provide support if he is unable even though he may be dismissed. We are prepared to provide that support until such time as he is eligible for our pension which will be in less than three years.

Given the scope of his abusive actions, and the ongoing potential for criminal action against him in the state of California, I concur with the judgement of Archbishop Amato that the matter should be referred to the Holy Father for a *dismissio ex officio e statu clericali una cum dispensatione ab omnibus oneribus sacerdotalibus*.

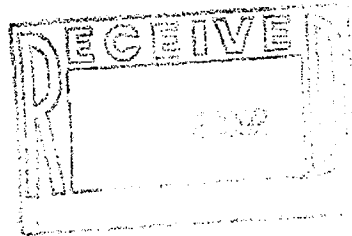

Pastoral Letter from Archbishop Dolan

My brothers and sisters in Christ:
~~Dear Friends,~~

During the past ^{five} years, there has been an ^{avalanche} abundance of news regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests — both in this archdiocese and across the nation.

Since my arrival, I have promised to be open and ^{trying best} ~~honest~~ ^{could} with you, the faithful Catholics of the Church in southeastern Wisconsin. Part of that openness has been my commitment to share news with you — even when it's bad.

For example, you'll remember in summer of 2006, I ^{told} shared with you ^{about} the news of lawsuits facing the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for sexual abuse cases involving former priest Siegfried Widera, and the pending financial consequences of those lawsuits. Those nine cases in California were settled in a multi-million dollar agreement, *all of which I must publicize*

In July of this year, the Wisconsin Supreme Court handed down a decision directing that cases alleging sexual abuse against two offending priests of the archdiocese could proceed, even though the ~~age of the~~ events were 20-to-40-years old.

Those cases have now been returned to the trial judges to go forward through normal court procedures. In addition, since July 2007, two other cases have been

brought against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, alleging sexual abuse in Wisconsin by a different priest, named Bruce MacArthur. MacArthur was a priest of the ~~Sioux Falls Diocese~~, but ~~served within the boundaries of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee~~ ^{here} for several years.

During the next months, the records of the three offenders will be part of the court proceedings. Thus, I am sending you this newsletter to let you know of the information that will be forthcoming. *As you're often told me, "Archbishop, when there's bad news coming, we'd prefer to hear it from you first." Well, There are three priests accused of wrongdoing. None of these three accused individuals are serving as priests within the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, nor have they done so for many years.* *as you see, this news is naming*

The accused are Siegfried Widera, Bruce MacArthur and Franklyn Becker. Widera is dead; MacArthur is under the direction of the Diocese of Sioux Falls and residing in a controlled nursing home; and Becker, who lives in southeastern Wisconsin, was laicized in 2003 and is no longer a priest. Information about all three men are included in this newsletter.

However, I want to talk specifically about the case involving Franklyn Becker. As I said, Becker was laicized in 200x. Although there could be various

explanations for all the decisions that were made or not made, at the end of the day, you will see a particularly ugly example of how the Church made mistakes in its handling of these cases. *The information about this priest is rehearsing.*

Some might argue that since both doctors and civil officials made the same mistakes by recommending reassignments, transfers or "fresh starts," that the Church should not be held accountable for the decisions made 20 or 30 years ago. Some would say that the Church was simply doing what it felt best, considering the circumstances, the body of knowledge available to us, ^{then} at the time, and the expert recommendations that were presented *claiming these offenders could be re-assigned.*

All true, but I need to say that our faith tells us that our Church must stand up ^{acknowledge} for any decisions that were made, regardless of how these decisions were reached. *and decisions about Becker were bad.*

So what do we do next? Do we hide under the bed while the scab of this mess is once again picked open? No! The good work of Jesus Christ and His Church continues, ~~Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow~~ despite this mess and despite any of us. The mistakes of the past do not change the needs of our people today, the needs of today's community or the needs of our world.

Nor, let me remind you, do these things diminish the good work that has been done over the past five-plus years as we have ardently worked with victims-survivors to bring healing and resolution. In the past, people can point and say the Catholic Church is a shining example of what NOT to do, Now, however, even outside objective observers say the Catholic Church is an example of what TO do.

That is why we insist upon safe environment programs in all of our parishes and schools. That's why all staff and volunteers who work with children take safe environment training as a way of recognizing the signs of abuse. That's why we have a full-time victims-assistance coordinator to work with victims-survivors, and I meet regularly with a community advisory board made up of survivors, advocates and experts in the area of sexual abuse. It's also why I directed the names of offending priests to be published on our archdiocesan website back in 200x.

That's why now no priest who has a minor can ever serve as a priest again.

Some of you might ask, "why?" Why are you telling us this; why can't you just let this be over and move on?" Part of me would like nothing more, but, I know, that this crisis will never be over. Practically, too, I know that you are better hearing this news from me, all at once.

So that's why I share it with you now. May I ask that you please pray for people who have been victims-survivors of sexual abuse, especially for those whose abuse came at the hands of clergy?

May I also ask that you pray for our Church, especially our Church in southeastern Wisconsin, that the Holy Spirit continue to guide us and give us strength to ~~do God's will~~, and that ~~His will be done through the generous spirit of those who proclaim, teach, and live the Gospel.~~

Siegfried Widera. Little needs to be added about Siegfried Widera. He was the priest who (died) in 200x, while on the run in Mexico after being criminally indicted on multiple counts of child sexual abuse. He last served as a priest in the Diocese of Orange, California, and both the Diocese of Orange and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee settled lawsuits in 2006 with nine California victims because of the harm he caused. The lawsuits were settled for \$16.65 million, with more than half of the amount paid by archdiocesan insurance companies, to the nine California victims, as well as one California victim of Franklyn Becker. All files of the archdiocese involving Siegfried Widera were disclosed and provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of the suit.

Bruce MacArthur. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee was named in a lawsuit in South Dakota several years ago as a result of abuse that Bruce MacArthur committed when he served as a chaplain for a hospital in the Beaver Dam, Wis., area. In that lawsuit, MacArthur admitted his abuse of the victim-survivors, *where was it!* MacArthur served in the archdiocese from 19xx to 19xx.

A little unclear. We must be clear he did not abuse here.

MacArthur was ordained in Sioux Falls, South Dakota and served there both before and after serving in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. His years in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee were limited and, during the time, no incidents or of abuse were reported.

The earlier case involving MacArthur was brought in South Dakota and was settled, jointly with the Diocese of Sioux Falls, in 200X. All files of the archdiocese involving Bruce MacArthur were provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of that lawsuit.

Since the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision in July of this year, allowing ~~20 to 40-year-old~~ allegations to proceed under a fraud claim, three additional persons have sued the archdiocese and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, alleging abuse by MacArthur. *We do not know their names.*

Franklyn Becker. Franklyn Becker attended Saint Francis de Sales Seminary and was ordained to the priesthood by Archbishop William E. Cousins in 1964. He was laicized in 2003, and is no longer a priest. His laicization was ~~directed~~ *ordered* by the Holy See upon the request of Archbishop Dolan.

Although the archdiocese had earlier been ~~sued~~ *renewed* in one case in California for the actions of Franklyn Becker, that case was ~~settled~~, along with the nine California lawsuits involving Siegfried Widera. Franklyn Becker's records were not yet processed in the lawsuit by the time that suit was settled. But as the current

Wisconsin lawsuits now go forward. Becker's records will be processed and delivered to the plaintiffs' lawyers. Those documents will show the following:

- Fall 1970: The first report of trouble came to the archdiocese in fall of 1970, when a telephone report was made about a problem between a parishioner's son and Becker. No known follow up was done.
- November 1974: Pastor complains ^{that} ~~about~~ Becker's ^{does not} ~~lack of~~ work ethic at St. William parish.
- August to October 1976: Becker accepts position as campus minister at St. Louis University. Becker was forced to resign after 2 months. The University advises the archdiocese that part of the reason for the forced resignation was Becker's relationship to homosexuals and his encouragement of practicing homosexuals to attend services at the University. Also noted is that Becker is "difficult to work with."
- 1977: Archbishop Cousins releases Becker to work outside the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Becker works in the Diocese of San Diego.
- 1978: Becker advises now-Milwaukee Archbishop Rembert Weakland of his decision to return to Milwaukee. Bishop of San Diego tells Archbishop Weakland that Becker was relieved of his duties and believes Becker "has psychological problems he must solve."
- 1979: Becker is assigned to St. Margaret Mary Parish, Milwaukee.
- February 1980: Two parishioners are aware of an "unfortunate incident" with a boy. This is reported to ___(vicar??)_____. After meeting with ___(vicar??)_____, Becker promises treatment and not to do it again. He requests transfer from the parish (St. Margaret Mary).
- February 1980: A few days later, Becker writes to Archbishop Weakland apologizing for becoming involved with a boy, but blames the boy for sharing the incident and says he has been "cast in a bad light" and "the decision that he leave the parish (St. Margaret Mary) seems to be a prudent one." Becker's letter also states: "With my orientation, the frequent presence of teenage boys in the house (rectory) at night was tantalizing to say the least."

- February 1980: Recommendation by archdiocese that Becker consult with psychologist, which he does. After five sessions, Becker reports that no further counseling is needed and requests to stay at St. Margaret Mary.
 - February 1980: Members of St. Margaret Mary Parish, aware of an incident of an inappropriate act with a teenage boy, asks for leniency and understanding, and requests Becker be allowed to say in the parish.
 - June 1980: Becker appointed temporary administrator of St. Joseph Parish, Lyons.
 - August to October 1980: Becker ^(for clergy) requests assignment at St. Eugene, Fox Point. Pastor objects. Vicar assures pastor that Becker is willing to settle down and "needs one more chance." Vicar also acknowledges that it is time to tell Becker that no priest wants to work with him.
 - October 1980: Becker writes Archbishop Weakland complimenting the Archbishop's (Catholic Herald) column on homosexuality and the Church. Becker brings up his desire to return to California and whether there may be a "benevolent bishop" in California where he might serve.

- December 1980: Personnel Board recommends six-year assignment to St. John Parish, South Milwaukee.
 - January 1981: Pastor (Hefferner?) informs Vicar of incident with Becker and a young boy who Becker touched improperly during a swimming session. Becker denies events. Pastor does not tell parents of Becker's prior history. Parents believe Becker and apologize to him for accusing him of this.
 - March 1981: letter to Vicar (Fr. Janicki) tells of Becker "pursuing" boy and his friend because they have "common interests." Also talks of Becker's "living the good life."
 - June to August 1982: Review by Personnel Board. Becker says he prefers working in a parish or with high school and college age young people. Becker writes Personnel Board requesting campus ministry assignment and complains about not receiving one in the past. Complains about two other priests being possible candidates when those priests are equally "not above reproach."
 - December 1982: Pastor (Heffernan?) reports to Vicar that Becker took a minor on a Caribbean cruise. Boy's mother supports Becker. Vicar

confronts Becker. Becker admits using "bad judgment," but denies any physical contact with boy. Becker ordered to see doctor for immediate therapy.

Advises to restrict from ministry for five years and if no other complaints are received, then, perhaps, give him another chance.
- March 1983: Becker's friend writes again reporting that, contrary to earlier belief, Becker has continued involvement with the boy (from the cruise).
- April 1983: After Becker writes Archbishop Weakland about future assignment, Archbishop Weakland refers him to the Priest Personnel Board saying he does not want to become too much involved at this point with Becker's assignments.
- May 1983: Mother of boy Becker took on cruise sends letter declaring nothing happened and defending Becker.
- May 1983: Another doctor advises archdiocese that Becker is ego-centric, a homosexual, and a pedophile, and has no mechanism to stop once he develops the urge to act out. Doctor says parish ministry is "out of the question" and recommends an all-girl college or high school, or a geriatric nursing home or hospital setting.

- August 1983: Becker assigned to St. Joseph Hospital. Weakland cautions Becker in assignment letter about the possibility of permanent removal from ministry.
- Fall 1983: Becker complains about hospital work, saying he does not wish to continue, that it is causing him stress, and he is not suited to the work. Requests to be placed on sick leave. Request is granted in November 1983.
- March 1984: After learning from the Director of Pastoral Care at the VA Center that Becker would not be accepted as chaplain because of his background and past history, Vicar calls asking why the director would not give a person, who was trying to start over, a chance.
- June 1984: Another doctor ^{clinical psychologist} recommends to archdiocese that Becker could serve as associate pastor, under the proper conditions, but Vicar informs doctor that parish ministry is not possible.
- October 1984: Becker appointed as Chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital. Term is six years. Member of Personnel Board ^{name} expresses concern but is assured by Vicar that Becker is getting treatment. (Board member (Esser) expresses relief and concurs that Becker needs to have a chance at re-establishing his reputation.)
- April 1985: Archdiocese becomes aware that Becker served as Confirmation sponsor for young man being confirmed.
- June 1985: Because West Allis Memorial Hospital wants all its chaplains to be certified, Becker requests letter of recommendation from Archbishop Weakland. Archbishop Weakland writes to National Association of Catholic Chaplains supporting Becker's certification and stating that Becker "is a priest in good standing..."
- July 1990: Complaint received by Vicar about Becker's insensitive pastoral care to her son (at hospital) and alleges Becker was riding through the family's neighborhood. Mother is concerned that Becker is calling her son.
- September 1990: Becker's term as chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital is renewed for an additional 6 years.
- August 1991: The parishes served by West Allis Memorial Hospital decide to replace Becker as chaplain.

- August 1992: Bishop Sklba give approval for Becker to provide weekend "help out" at St. Mary Parish in Cascade.
- September 1992: Member of St. Mary's parish, Cascade request Personnel Board to allow Becker to remain at parish.
- December 1992: Becker begins working temporarily at St. Mary's Cascade.
- July 1993: Becker unassigned with restricted ministry.
- January 1994: Becker wants to serve as temporary chaplain on a cruise, but needs a certificate of good standing from archdiocese. Archbishop Weakland is consulted because of Becker's restricted ministry. Certificate is issued.
- December 1994: Individual who sent letters in early 1983 as Becker's "friend," now notifies Archbishop Weakland that her own children were abused by Becker in the 1970s.
- February 1996: Becker sent for evaluation to the St. Louis Consultation Center. Report issued states that in absence of intervention, it is likely that patterns of problematic sexual acting out by Becker will recur. Treatment should be considered in a long-term residential facility specializing in treatment of sexual disorders.
- March 1996: Becker is referred to the Phoenix Clinic for treatment. An assessment report is issued in January 1997.
- April 1996: Becker requests permission to serve as chaplain on a cruise. No notation whether permission is granted.
- July 1996: Psychologist treating Becker advises archdiocese that Becker remains at risk to act out and questions whether he could be allowed on cruises. Archdiocesan staff (Piasecki) questions whether the treatment should shift to counseling Becker out of priesthood. Archbishop Weakland agrees that would be the best approach.
- November 1996: Becker writes Archbishop Weakland that "my greatest desire is for reconciliation with you and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee."
- January 1997: Phoenix Clinic advises archdiocese that without Becker in treatment, he remains a potential risk to act out against children.

- January 1997: Vicar informs Becker that he will have someone regularly check in on Becker to ensure Becker is maintaining his therapy and adhering to ministry restrictions.
 - April 1997: New doctor treating Becker advises archdiocese that Becker is not cooperative and is, in fact, not treatable.
 - July 1997: Becker continues to "help out" at parishes on an "as needed" basis.
 - August 1999: Vicar reviews ministry restrictions with Becker, including approval for parish "help out" work, but restrictions against any other ministry, prohibiting contact with minors, and continuing therapy.
 - January 2002: Becker requests approval to retain help out position at the Tri-Parishes of Rubicon, Neosho and Woodland. Vicar reminds Becker he is not eligible for assignment, but is permitted to help out on weekends.
 - April 2002: Becker restricted from all public ministry, including weekend help out.

- April 2002: Archbishop Weakland issues a Church order (precept) against Becker, which states Becker is to cease all public ministry, all pastoral counseling, may not hear confessions, must not contact any minors or vulnerable adults, to avoid places that have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality.
 - April 2002: The Archdiocese of Milwaukee receives word from the Diocese of San Diego that a individual in California contacted them about Franklyn Becker and wants to be assured others are not at risk.
 - May 2002: Becker is arrested for childhood sexual abuse.
 - July 2002: Becker is advised that his name will be published by the archdiocese, along with five other priests who were not fully restricted from ministry because of sexual abuse allegations.
 - August 2002: The existing prohibitions against Becker are made permanent by now-Archbishop Timothy Dolan. Vicar tells Becker, most likely, he will not be allowed to do any public ministry ever again.

- December 2002: Archdiocese receives allegation of childhood sexual abuse against Becker and refers it to the Milwaukee County District Attorney.
 - May 2003: Becker arrested on sexual assault charges in California.
 - May 2003: Archbishop Dolan petitions the Holy See, asking that Becker be removed from the clerical state.

Questions and Answers

Q: Why share this information?

A: The information will be part of a lawsuit filed against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and will be released to the plaintiff's attorneys. It has been a practice of Archbishop Dolan to share important news with the people of the archdiocese, even when the news is bad.

Q: Is this the worst of the records?

A: This is a summary of more than 800 pages of records. There are always phrases and parts of documents that can be used - in or out of context - that make something sound new or different or worse than reported in this newsletter. Nonetheless, we believe this is a fair portrayal of the incidents reported in the files. We do not make judgments on what is "better" or "worse." Any instance of sexual misconduct and sexual abuse of a minor is evil.

Q: What can we expect from the news media about these documents?

A: We would expect news media to treat this information as they would any other type of information considered "news." By providing a chronology of events in our records, our hope is to give readers a more comprehensive view

than they may be able to maintain from the news media or, because of limited space and time, the news media may be able to provide.

Q: What is the financial impact of these lawsuits?

A: The first concern of the Church is one of pastoral and spiritual care for all people of the archdiocese, including, especially in these matters, victim-survivors. At the same time, part of our care has to be a healthy concern for all the other equally-important constituents of the Church, and the Church's financial obligation to practice sound stewardship.

It is too early to tell what, if any, financial impact these lawsuits will have. Certainly, simply by paying for legal representation, the lawsuits cost money. Each year, a complete financial accounting of the financial impact of the sexual abuse crisis is prepared and that information is available at www.archmil.org. In addition, annually, the archdiocese has an outside, independent financial audit and the audit results are reviewed by the archdiocesan finance council and published on our web site. Context

Q: What about Legislation to open the statute of limitations

A: As much as we support helping victims of sexual abuse find healing, we cannot support a proposal that selectively repeals the statute of limitations , (against the Catholic Church or other religious institutions, but not, equally, all other public and private institutions.)

The statute of limitations exists for very good reasons. Finding the truth becomes more difficult as time passes. Key physical evidence is lost and personal recollections fade. Equally problematic, the accused or key witnesses die. Thus, there is a long history in our legal system regarding the importance of the statute of limitations in the American legal system. It is good law and its removal, even temporary, raises serious constitutional questions among legal scholars.

Pastoral

Perhaps, most importantly, the costs of defending lawsuits and of any damages that might ensue from them is born by innocent third parties, in this case Catholic parishioners, who are in no way responsible for mistakes made by other individuals decades ago.

of government entities to \$50,000 per claim. Thus a child abused by a teacher in a Catholic school could be awarded millions by a jury, while a child abused by a public school employee could collect only \$50,000.

This is not speculation. Research reports the number of incidents of sexual abuse of children in the larger public school system(s) dwarfs the number of incidents in parochial schools.

Finally, the Church has not ignored victims whose claims are barred by the statute of limitations. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has voluntarily mediated settlements with over 160 survivors of abuse by clergy for whose claims were barred by the statute of limitations.

We think justice is better served learning from past mistakes and using our knowledge to secure better prevention, prompt reporting of abuse and strict accountability for offenders.

Q: Recently you announced a capital campaign - how does this affect that campaign?

A: The Faith In Our Future Capital Campaign is moving forward, with pilot parishes already in "campaign mode" at 15 sites. The *Faith in Our Future Trust* has been legally established to make sure the intent and conditions of donors are followed and respected. This *trust* is separate from the archdiocese, has obligations of its own, and can only be used for Catholic education and faith formation, not for debts of the archdiocese, the past or present expenses of the abuse crisis, or ~~paper clips~~ at the Cousins Center.

operating costs

Q: If you know that priests are guilty, why are you defending lawsuits? Why don't you just settle with the victims?

A: Resolution *has* been reached with nearly 160 individuals - the majority through the independent mediation system. Recognizing the need for a process outside the Church structure to address claims of sexual abuse of a minor by diocesan clergy, an independent, voluntary mediation systems was introduced in January 2004.

Q: That's great, but why defend lawsuits?

A: For people who have chosen to sue, that is a decision they have made. Once the matter is in the legal system, the processing of those claims is up to the courts. As part of that process, the archdiocese hopes the courts require the parties to investigate out-of-court settlements as a way to reach resolution. If resolution is not reached, the archdiocese has no option but to proceed as directed by the courts to resolve the matter.

Q: I thought victims-survivors could not sue the Church in Wisconsin.

A: That has been a myth for some time. Victims-survivors have always had the right to sue the Church. However, just like with any civil action, the window for suing the Church has been governed by a statute of limitations.

Q. What about Becker? Is he still "at large"?

A. Yes. He has been laicized, so he can never again function as or represent himself as a priest; his name and crimes have been published, released to the press, and is permanently listed on the archdiocesan web-site; local law enforcement officials have been advised of his presence and his history, as have local parishes; and any new allegations against him are immediately turned over to the police (as is archdiocesan policy with all such matters).

As you were previously informed by Archbishop Dolan, Franklyn Becker has been dismissed from the clerical state and can no longer exercise any ministry, public or private. These are always difficult cases and are not attended to lightly. It is only after extensive discussion, and in the most serious cases, that this action is taken.

Franklyn resides in a geographical locale that is reasonably near you, so I wanted to reiterate to you his status. Because of the laicization, we no longer have any authority to monitor him and his actions. Local civil officials have been notified of his presence in the community as well. If you receive any information that he is presenting himself as a priest or doing anything that would appear to be "ministry" or that there are questions about his behavior, please advise me immediately so that I may make the necessary report to local civil officials. If you feel that you need to notify the civil officials for some reason, you are free and encouraged to do so.

Let us continue to support one another in prayer. I pray daily for you and for all our brother priests, those that struggle as well as those who go quietly about the work in the Lord's vineyard.

Thank you for the good work you do.

Pastoral Letter from Archbishop Dolan

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As you are painfully aware^e, during the past ^{five} years, there has been a lot of news regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests -- both in this archdiocese and across the nation. ^{much}

Since my arrival^{as your archbishop}, I have promised to try my best to be open and candid with you, the faithful Catholics of the Church in southeastern Wisconsin. Part of that openness has been my commitment to share news with you -- even when it's bad.

For example, you'll remember in summer of 2006, I told you about lawsuits facing the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for sexual abuse cases involving former priest^{and Franklyn Becker} Siegfried Widera, and the pending financial consequences of those lawsuits. Those ten cases in California were settled in a multi-million dollar agreement, all of which I made public.

In July of this year, the Wisconsin Supreme Court handed down a decision directing that cases alleging sexual abuse ^{fraud by the Archd. about} against two offending priests of the archdiocese could proceed, even though the events were 20-to-40-years old.

Those cases have now been returned to the trial judges to go forward through normal court procedures. In addition, since July 2007, two other cases have been

brought against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, alleging sexual abuse in Wisconsin by a different priest, ~~named~~ Bruce MacArthur. MacArthur was not a priest of our Archdiocese of Milwaukee, but did serve here for several years.

During the next months, the records of the three offenders will be part of the court proceedings. Thus, I am sending you this newsletter to let you know of the information that will be forthcoming. As you have often told me: "Archbishop, when there is bad news coming, we'd prefer to hear it from you." Well, as you will see, this news is nauseating.

There are three priests accused of wrongdoing. None of these three accused individuals are serving as priests within the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, nor have they done so for many years.

The accused are Siegfried Widera, Bruce MacArthur and Franklyn Becker. Widera is dead; MacArthur is under the direction of the Diocese of Sioux Falls and residing in a controlled nursing home; and Becker, who lives in Dodge County, was laicized in 2004 ~~and is no longer a priest~~. Information about all three men is included in this newsletter.

However, I want to talk specifically about the case involving Franklyn Becker. As I said, Becker was laicized in 2004. Although there could be various explanations for all the decisions that were made or not made, at the end of the day, you will see, I have to admit, a particularly ugly example of how the Church made dreadful mistakes in its handling of these cases. The information about this ex-priest is sickening.

Some might argue that since both doctors and civil officials made the same mistakes by recommending reassignments, transfers or "fresh starts," that the Church should not be held accountable for the decisions made 20 or 30 years ago. Some would say that the Church was simply following the "praxis" of the time, considering the circumstances, the body of knowledge then available to us, and the recommendations that were presented, suggesting offenders could be moved and reassigned.

This might all be true, but I need to say that our faith tells us that our Church must acknowledge that poor decisions were made, regardless of how these decisions were reached. And, the decisions about Becker were bad.

So what do we do next? Do we hide under the bed while the scab of this mess is once again picked open? No! The good work of Jesus Christ and His Church continues, despite this mess and despite any of us. The mistakes of the past do

not change the needs of our people today, the needs of today's community, or the needs of our world.

Nor, let me remind you, do these things diminish the good work that has been done over the past five-plus years as we have ardently worked with victims/survivors and the wider community to bring healing and resolution. Nothing changes our commitment to continue to work together to ensure that we do everything in our power to protect our children and young people.

In the past, people ^{could} point and say the Catholic Church is a shining example of what NOT to do, as some of this data will show. Now, however, even outside, objective observers say the Catholic Church is an example of what TO do.

That is why we insist upon safe environment programs in all of our ^{parishes and} schools. That's why all staff and volunteers who work with children ^{take safe} environment training as a way of recognizing the signs of abuse. That's why we have a full-time victims-assistance coordinator to work with victims/survivors, and I meet regularly with a community advisory board made ~~up~~ of survivors, advocates and experts in the area of sexual abuse. That's why now, no one who has ever abused a minor can ever serve as a priest again. It's also why I directed the names of offending priests to be published on our archdiocesan website back in 200x.

Some of you might ask, "why?" Why are you telling us this; why can't you just let this be over and move on?" Part of me would like nothing more, but, I know, that this crisis will never be over. Practically, too, I know that you are better hearing this news from me, all at once.

So that's ^{why} I share it with you now. May I ask that you please pray for people who ^{have} been victims/survivors of sexual abuse, especially for those whose abuse came ^{at the hands of} clergy?

May I also ask that you pray for our Church, especially our Church in southeastern Wisconsin, that the Holy Spirit continue to guide us and give us strength to get through this, and that His Church be cleansed, purified and renewed by the agony of this scandal, sin and suffering.

2002 There has been much written about Siegfried Widera over the last year or so several in Calif & Wisc.

Siegfried Widera. Little needs to be added about Siegfried Widera. He was the priest who died in 200x while on the run in Mexico after being criminally indicted on multiple counts of child sexual abuse. He last served as a priest in the Diocese of Orange, California, and both the Diocese of Orange and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee settled lawsuits in 2006 with nine California victims because of the harm he caused. The lawsuits were settled for \$16.65 million, with more than half of the amount paid by archdiocesan insurance companies, to the nine California victims, as well as one California victim of Franklyn Becker. All files of the archdiocese involving Siegfried Widera were disclosed and provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of the suit.

Bruce MacArthur. MacArthur was ordained in Sioux Falls, South Dakota and served there both before and after serving in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. His years in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee were limited, from 19xx to 19xx, and, during that time (no incidents or of abuse were reported) However, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee was named in a lawsuit in South Dakota several years ago as a result of abuse that Bruce MacArthur committed when he served as a

there is no record of reports of abuse

chaplain for a hospital in the Beaver Dam, Wis., area. In that lawsuit, MacArthur admitted his abuse.

The earlier case involving MacArthur was brought in South Dakota and was settled, jointly with the Diocese of Sioux Falls, in 200X. All files of the archdiocese involving Bruce MacArthur were provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of that lawsuit.

Since the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision in July of this year, allowing decades-old allegations to proceed under a fraud claim, three additional persons have sued the archdiocese and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, alleging abuse by MacArthur.

Franklyn Becker. Franklyn Becker attended Saint Francis de Sales Seminary and was ordained to the priesthood by Archbishop William E. Cousins in 1964. He was laicized in 2003 and is no longer a priest. His laicization was ordered by the Holy See upon the request of Archbishop Dolan.

Although the archdiocese had earlier been sued in one case in California for the actions of Franklyn Becker, that case was resolved, along with the nine California lawsuits involving Siegfried Widera. Franklyn Becker's records were

not yet processed in the lawsuit by the time that suit was settled. But as the current Wisconsin lawsuits now go forward, Becker's records will be processed and delivered to the plaintiffs' lawyers. Those documents will show the following:

- Fall 1970: The first report of trouble came to the archdiocese in fall of 1970, when a telephone report was made about a problem between a parishioner's son and Becker. ^{There is} No known follow up ~~was done~~ _{on record.}
- November 1974: Pastor complains that Becker does no work at St. William parish.
- August to October 1976: Becker accepts position as ^{two} campus minister at St. Louis University. Becker was forced to resign after 2 months. The University advises the archdiocese that part of the reason for the forced resignation was Becker's relationship to homosexuals and his encouragement of practicing homosexuals to attend services at the University. Also noted is that Becker is "difficult to work with."
- 1977: Archbishop Cousins releases Becker to work outside the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Becker works in the Diocese of San Diego.
- 1978: Becker advises ^{then} ~~now~~-Milwaukee Archbishop Rembert Weakland of his decision to return to Milwaukee. Bishop of San Diego tells Archbishop Weakland that Becker was relieved of his duties and believes Becker "has psychological problems he must solve."
- 1979: Becker is assigned to St. Margaret Mary Parish, Milwaukee.
- February 1980: Two parishioners are aware ^{who} of an "unfortunate incident" with a boy. This is reported to ___ (vicar??) ___. After meeting with ___ (vicar??) ___, Becker promises treatment and ~~not to do it~~ _{to discontinue behavior} again. He requests transfer from the parish (St. Margaret Mary).
- February 1980: A few days later, Becker writes to Archbishop Weakland apologizing for becoming involved with a boy, but blames the boy for sharing the incident and says he has been "cast in a bad light" and "the decision that he leave the parish (St. Margaret Mary) seems to be a prudent one." Becker's letter also states: "With my orientation, the frequent presence of teenage boys in the house (rectory) at night was tantalizing to say the least."

- February 1980: Recommendation by ^{the} archdiocese that Becker consult with psychologist, which he does. After five sessions, Becker reports that no further counseling is needed and requests to stay at St. Margaret Mary.
- February 1980: Members of St. Margaret Mary Parish, aware of an incident of an inappropriate act with a teenage boy, asks for leniency and understanding, and requests Becker be allowed to stay in the parish.
- June 1980: Becker appointed temporary administrator of St. Joseph Parish, Lyons.
- August to October 1980: Becker ^{name} requests assignment at St. Eugene, Fox Point. Pastor objects. Vicar for Clergy assures pastor that Becker is willing to settle down and "needs one more chance." Vicar also acknowledges that it is time to tell Becker that no priest wants to work with him. ^{Parish}
- October 1980: Becker writes Archbishop Weakland complimenting the Archbishop's (Catholic Herald) column on homosexuality and the Church. Becker brings up his desire to return to California and whether there may be a "benevolent bishop" in California where he might serve.
- December 1980: Personnel Board recommends six-year assignment to St. John Parish, South Milwaukee.
- January 1981: Pastor (^{Heffron} Hefferner?) informs Vicar ^{name} of incident with Becker and a young boy who Becker touched improperly during a swimming session. Becker denies events. Pastor does not tell parents of Becker's prior history. Parents believe Becker and apologize to him for accusing him of this. ^{inappropriately}
- March 1981: ^{from who?} Letter to Vicar (Fr. Janicki) tells of Becker "pursuing" boy and his friend because they have "common interests." Also talks of Becker's "living the good life."
- June to August 1982: Review by Personnel Board. Becker says he prefers working in a parish or with high school and college-age young people. Becker writes Personnel Board requesting campus ministry assignment and complains about not receiving one in the past. Complains about two other priests being possible candidates when those priests are equally "not above reproach."

- December 1982: Pastor (^{Heffernan}Heffernan?) reports to Vicar that Becker took a minor on a Caribbean cruise. Boy's mother supports Becker. Vicar confronts Becker. Becker admits using "bad judgment," but denies any physical contact with boy. Becker ordered to see doctor for immediate therapy. L psychologist?
- December 1982: New pastor of St. ^{John}_____ does not want to work with Becker. Becker removed from St. John's and ordered to be sent for a holistic evaluation.
- January 1983: Friend writes vicar on Becker's behalf. Friend "aware of his problems, including those with young boys..."
- February 1983: Psychology report sent to archdiocese reports Becker with pedophilia. "Possibility of sexual acting out with male minor children is high." Report recommends Becker's reassignment preclude involvement with youths. diagnosed
- March 1983: Vicar consults with Milwaukee County District Attorney's office without using names. District Attorney advises that any such priest given adequate warnings should not be assigned where he could come in contact with youngsters. Advises to restrict from ministry for five years and if no other complaints are received, then, perhaps, give him another chance.
- March 1983: Becker's friend writes again reporting that, contrary to earlier belief, Becker has continued involvement with the boy (from the cruise).
- April 1983: After Becker writes Archbishop Weakland about future assignment, Archbishop Weakland refers him to the Priest Personnel Board saying he does not want to become too much involved at this point with Becker's assignments.
- May 1983: Mother of boy Becker took on cruise sends letter declaring nothing happened and defending Becker.
- May 1983: Another doctor advises archdiocese that Becker is ego-centric, a homosexual, and a pedophile, and has no mechanism to stop once he develops the urge to act out. Doctor says parish ministry is "out of the question" and recommends an all-girl college or high school, or a geriatric nursing home or hospital setting.

- Milwaukee*
- August 1983: Becker assigned to St. Joseph Hospital. Weakland cautions Becker in assignment letter about the possibility of permanent removal from ministry.
 - Fall 1983: Becker complains about hospital work, saying he does not wish to continue, that it is causing him stress, and he is not suited to the work. Requests to be placed on sick leave. Request is granted in November 1983.
 - March 1984: After learning from the Director of Pastoral Care at the VA Center that Becker would not be accepted as chaplain because of his background and past history, Vicar calls asking why the director would not give a person, who was trying to start over, a chance.
 - June 1984: Another doctor, a (clinical psychologist? _____) recommends to archdiocese that Becker could serve as associate pastor, under the proper conditions, but Vicar informs doctor that parish ministry is not possible.
 - October 1984: Becker appointed as Chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital. Term is six years. Member of Personnel Board, (Fr. Paul Esser), expresses concern but is assured by Vicar that Becker is getting treatment.
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 - July 1990: Complaint received by Vicar about Becker's insensitive pastoral care to her son (at hospital) and alleges Becker was riding through the family's neighborhood. Mother is concerned that Becker is calling her son.
 - September 1990: Becker's term as chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital is renewed for an additional 6 years.
 - August 1991: The parishes served by West Allis Memorial Hospital decide to replace Becker as chaplain.

- August 1992: Bishop Sklba give ⁵ approval for Becker to provide weekend "help out" at St. Mary Parish in Cascade.
- September 1992: Member of St. Mary's ^{SP} parish, Cascade, request Personnel Board to allow Becker to remain at parish.
- December 1992: Becker begins working temporarily at St. Mary's ^{SP} Parish, Cascade.
- July 1993: Becker unassigned with ^{and} restricted ^{from} ministry.
- January 1994: Becker wants to serve as temporary chaplain on a cruise, but needs a certificate of good standing from archdiocese. Archbishop Weakland is consulted because of Becker's restricted ministry. Certificate is issued.
- December 1994: Individual who sent letters in early 1983 as Becker's "friend," now notifies Archbishop Weakland that her own children were abused by Becker in the 1970s.
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- March 1996: Becker is referred to the Phoenix Clinic for treatment. An assessment report is issued in January 1997. ^{where?}
- April 1996: Becker requests permission to serve as chaplain on a cruise. No notation whether permission is granted.
- June 1996: Vicar for Clergy assigns a ~~Deacon~~ with professional law enforcement experience to check on Becker on regular basis.
- July 1996: Psychologist treating Becker advises archdiocese that Becker remains at risk to act out and questions whether he could be allowed on cruises. Archdiocesan staff (Piasecki) questions whether the treatment should shift to counseling Becker out of priesthood. Archbishop Weakland agrees that would be the best approach.
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- July 1997: Becker continues to "help out" at parishes on an "as needed" basis.
- August 1999: Vicar reviews ministry restrictions with Becker, including approval for parish "help out" work, but restrictions against any other ministry, prohibiting contact with minors, and continuing therapy.
- January 2002: Becker requests approval to retain help out position at the Tri-Parishes of Rubicon, Neosho and Woodland. Vicar reminds Becker he is not eligible for assignment, but is permitted to help out on weekends.
- April 2002: Becker restricted from all public ministry, including weekend help out.
- April 2002: Archbishop Weakland issues a Church order (precept) against Becker, which states Becker is to cease all public ministry, all pastoral counseling, may not hear confessions, must not contact any minors or vulnerable adults, to avoid places that have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality.
- April 2002: The Archdiocese of Milwaukee receives word from the Diocese of San Diego that a individual in California contacted them about Franklyn Becker and wants to be assured others are not at risk.
- May 2002: Becker is arrested for ~~childhood~~ ^{assault} sexual abuse ^{of a minor}.
- July 2002: Becker is advised that his name will be published by the archdiocese, along with five other priests who were not fully restricted from ministry because of sexual abuse allegations.

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- August 2002: The existing prohibitions against Becker are made permanent by ~~now~~-Archbishop Timothy Dolan. Vicar tells Becker, most likely, he will not be allowed to do any public ministry ever again.
- December 2002: Archdiocese receives allegation of childhood sexual ~~abuse~~ *assault* against Becker and refers it to the Milwaukee County District Attorney.
- May 2003: Becker arrested on sexual assault charges in California.
- May 2003: Archbishop Dolan petitions the Holy See, asking that Becker be removed from the clerical state.
- November 2004: Becker is removed from the clerical state. Archbishop Dolan authorizes payment of \$10,000, since Becker's insurance coverage as a priest has stopped, to subsidize emergency medical insurance until Becker is eligible for Medicare.
- December 2004: Vicar for Clergy notifies *Dodge County* Sherriff, of ~~the~~ county where Becker resides, that Becker is living in area and has substantiated cases of sexual abuse involving children.
- January 2006: Vicar for Clergy notifies pastor of neighboring parishes where Becker resides that Becker is living in area and is no longer a priest.

The above listing is a summary of the more than 800 pages of documents related to Franklyn Becker.

Questions and Answers

Q: Why share this information?

A: The information will be part of a lawsuit filed against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and will be released to the plaintiff's attorneys. It has been a practice

plaintiffs'

of Archbishop Dolan to share important news with the people of the archdiocese, even when the news is bad.

Q: So, are you sharing this now only because of these lawsuits?

A: Information has been shared in town hall meetings throughout this summer and fall when Archbishop Dolan met with priests and parish leaders regarding the *Faith In Our Future Capital Campaign*. The information is being shared directly now, because we believe it will become public through these lawsuits and want people to receive the information directly from the archdiocese.

Q: Is this the worst of the records?

A: This is a summary of more than 800 pages of records. There are always phrases and parts of documents that can be used - in or out of context - that make something sound new or different or worse than reported in this newsletter. Nonetheless, we believe this is a fair portrayal of the incidents reported in the files. We do not make judgments on what is "better" or "worse." Any instance of sexual misconduct and sexual abuse of a minor is evil.

First time this is made public - need advance notice to clergy

Q: What about releasing the same information on all other suspected abusers?

A: The information from the files of diocesan priests with any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor were released and reviewed by civil authorities in 2002 and 2003. Any new allegations are immediately referred to civil authorities if the abuser is still alive.

In addition, an outside, forensic audit of all ^{clergy} diocesan priest files was conducted to ensure any incident of possible abuse by a diocesan priest was uncovered.

The names of all diocesan priests with substantiated incidents of sexual abuse of a minor are posted on the archdiocesan web site.

However, we do not believe that the ugly details of each individual case need to be released publicly. This serves no purpose, but to sensationalize the incidents and re-victimize those who have suffered abuse.

There is also the issue of an individual's right to privacy when it comes to personnel files. No business or organization would release information in the private, personnel files of someone in their organization. And, there should be

some principle upheld that assures people – whether a priest, deacon or lay person – that they can approach their bishop, in confidence, to discuss a private concern.

Q: What can we expect from the news media about these documents?

A: We would expect news media to treat this information as they would any other type of information considered “news.” By providing a chronology of events in our records, our hope is to give readers a more comprehensive view than they may be able to maintain from the news media or, because of limited space and time, the news media may be able to provide.

Q: What is the financial impact of these lawsuits?

A: The first concern of the Church is one of pastoral and spiritual care for all people of the archdiocese, including, especially in these matters, victim-³ survivors. At the same time, part of our care has to be a healthy concern for all the other equally-important constituents of the Church, and the Church’s financial obligation to practice sound stewardship.

It is too early to tell what, if any, financial impact these lawsuits will have. Certainly, simply by paying for legal representation, the lawsuits cost money. Each year, a complete financial accounting of the financial impact of the sexual abuse crisis is prepared and that latest information is available at www.archmil.org. In addition, annually, the archdiocese has an outside, independent financial audit and the audit results are reviewed by the archdiocesan finance council and published on our web site. Q: What about Legislation to open the statute of limitations

A: As much as we support helping victims of sexual abuse find healing, we cannot support a proposal that selectively repeals the statute of limitations.

The statute of limitations exists for very good reasons. Finding the truth becomes more difficult as time passes. Pivotal physical evidence is lost and personal recollections fade. Equally problematic, the accused or key witnesses die. Thus, there is a long history regarding the importance of the statute of limitations in the American legal system. It is good law and its removal, even temporary, raises serious constitutional questions among legal scholars.

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How does his statement fit w/ our consistent claim that we don't use parishioners' \$ for damages?

Perhaps, most importantly, the costs of defending lawsuits and of any damages that might ensue from them is born by innocent third parties, in this case Catholic parishioners, who are in no way responsible for mistakes made by others decades ago. Why should the innocent Catholics of southeastern Wisconsin, who abhor what happened, be penalized because of the actions of others.

Discussed legislation would permit lawsuits against any defendant, but it does not offer equal justice to every victims or survivor. State law limits the liability of government entities to \$50,000 per claim. Thus a child abused by a teacher in a Catholic school could be awarded millions by a jury, while a child abused by a public school employee could collect only \$50,000.

This is not speculation. Research reports the number of incidents of sexual abuse of children in the larger public school system(s) dwarfs the number of incidents in parochial schools.

Finally, the Church has not ignored victims whose claims are barred by the statute of limitations. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has voluntarily mediated settlements with over 160 survivors of abuse by clergy for whose claims were barred by the statute of limitations.

We think justice is better served learning from past mistakes and using our knowledge to secure better prevention, prompt reporting of abuse, and strict accountability for offenders.

Q: Why aren't people like Becker in jail?

A: The statutes of limitations on the criminal actions have expired. In 2003, the files on all diocesan priests with allegations of sexual abuse of a minor were reviewed by the Milwaukee County District Attorney to see if any criminal charges could be brought.

Although there has been ^{much} talk about opening a legislative window allowing victims/survivors to file civil lawsuits and collect financial damages, there has been no discussion about opening a window that would allow the criminal charges to go forward. Wouldn't that be a better approach to ensuring that the people who are guilty for perpetrating the abuse are the ones who are held accountable?

That was found unconstitutional by US Supreme Ct re. CA legislation

Q: Recently you announced a capital campaign - how does this affect that campaign?

A: The *Faith In Our Future* Capital Campaign is moving forward, with pilot parishes already in "campaign mode" at 15 sites. The *Faith in Our Future Trust* has been legally established to ^{ensure} make sure the intent and conditions of donors are followed and respected. This trust is separate from the archdiocese, has obligations of its own, and can only be used for Catholic education and faith formation, not for debts of the archdiocese, the past or present expenses of the abuse crisis, or operating costs ^{of the archdiocesan central offices} at the Cousins Center. ^{administrative/}

Q: If you know that priests are guilty, why are you defending lawsuits? Why don't you just settle with the victims?

A: Resolution *has* been reached with ^{more than 150 parishes of} nearly 160 individuals - the majority through the independent mediation system. Recognizing the need for a process outside the Church structure to address claims of sexual abuse of a minor by diocesan clergy, an independent, voluntary mediation systems was introduced in January 2004.

Q: That's great, but why defend lawsuits?

A: For people who have chosen to sue, that is a decision they have made. Once the matter is in the legal system, the processing of those claims is up to the courts. As part of that process, the archdiocese hopes the courts require the parties to investigate out-of-court settlements as a way to reach resolution. If resolution is not reached, the archdiocese has no option but to proceed as directed by the courts to resolve the matter.

Q: I thought victims/survivors could not sue the Church in Wisconsin.

A: That has been a myth for some time. Victims/survivors have always had the right to sue the Church. However, just like with any civil action, the window for suing the Church has been governed by a statute of limitations.

Q: What about Becker? Is he still "at large?"

A: Becker has been laicized, so he can never again function as or represent himself as a priest. His name and crimes have been released to the media and his

name is permanently listed on the archdiocesan web site. Local law enforcement officials have been advised of his presence and his history, as have local parishes in the area where Becker lives. Any new allegations against Becker are turned over to the police, as is archdiocesan policy with all allegations received against men that are still alive. Since Becker is laicized, the archdiocese has no influence over where Becker lives as an independent citizen.

Pastoral Letter from Archbishop Dolan

Dear Friends,

During the past 5 years, there has been an abundance of news regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests - both in this archdiocese and across the nation.

Since my arrival, I have promised to be open and honest with you, the faithful Catholics of the Church in southeastern Wisconsin. Part of that openness has been my commitment to share news with you - even when it's bad.

For example, you'll remember in summer of 2006, I shared with you the news of lawsuits facing the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for sexual abuse cases involving former priest Siegfried Widera, and the pending financial consequences of those lawsuits. Those nine cases in California were settled in a multi-million dollar agreement.

In July of this year, the Wisconsin Supreme Court handed down a decision directing that cases alleging sexual abuse against two offending priests of the archdiocese could proceed even though the age of the events were 20-to-40-years old.

Those cases have now been returned to the trial judges to go forward through normal court procedures. In addition, since July 2007, two other cases have been

brought against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, alleging sexual abuse in Wisconsin by a different priest, named Bruce MacArthur. MacArthur was a priest of the Sioux Falls Diocese, but served within the boundaries of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for several years.

During the next months, the records of the three offenders will be part of the court proceedings. Thus, I am sending you this newsletter to let you know of the information that will be forthcoming.

There are three priests accused of wrongdoing. None of these three accused individuals are serving as priests within the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, nor have they done so for many years.

The accused are Siegfried Widera, Bruce MacArthur and Franklyn Becker. Widera is dead; MacArthur is under the direction of the Diocese of Sioux Falls and residing in a controlled nursing home; and Becker, who lives in southeastern Wisconsin was laicized in 200x and is no longer a priest. Information about all three men are included in this newsletter.

However, I want to talk specifically about the case involving Franklyn Becker. As I said, Becker was laicized in 200x. Although there could be various explanations for all the decisions that were made or not made, at the end of the day, you will see a particularly ugly example of how the Church made mistakes in its handling of these cases.

Some might argue that since both doctors and civil officials made the same mistakes by recommending reassignments, transfers or "fresh starts," that the Church should not be held accountable for the decisions made 20 or 30 years ago. Some would say that the Church was simply doing what it felt best, considering the circumstances, the body of knowledge available to us at the time, and the expert recommendations that were presented.

All true, but I need to say that our faith tells us that our Church must stand up for any decisions that were made, regardless of how these decisions were reached.

So what do we do next? Do we hide under the bed while the scab of this mess is once again picked open? No! The good work of Jesus Christ and His Church continues - Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow - despite this mess and despite any of us. The mistakes of the past do not change the needs of our people today, the needs of today's community or the needs of our world.

Nor, let me remind you, do these things diminish the good work that has been done over the past five-plus years as we have ardently worked with victims-survivors to bring healing and resolution. Nothing changes our commitment to continue to work with victims-survivors and together ensure that we do everything in our power to protect our children and young people.

In the past, people can point and say the Catholic Church is a shining example of what NOT to do. Now, however, even outside objective observers say the Catholic Church is an example of what TO do.

That is why we insist upon safe environment programs in all of our parishes and schools. That's why all staff and volunteers who work with children take safe environment training as a way of recognizing the signs of abuse. That's why we have a full-time victims-assistance coordinator to work with victims-survivors, and I meet regularly with a community advisory board made up of survivors, advocates and experts in the area of sexual abuse. It's also why I directed the names of offending priests to be published on our archdiocesan website back in 200x.

Some of you might ask, "why?" Why are you telling us this; why can't you just let this be over and move on?" Part of me would like nothing more, but, I know, that this crisis will never be over. Practically, too, I know that you are better hearing this news from me, all at once.

So that's why I share it with you now. May I ask that you please pray for people who have been victims-survivors of sexual abuse, especially for those whose abuse came at the hands of clergy?

May I also ask that you pray for our Church, especially our Church in southeastern Wisconsin, that the Holy Spirit continue to guide us and give us strength to do God's will, and that His will be done through the generous spirit of those who proclaim, teach, and live the Gospel.

Siegfried Widera. Little needs to be added about Siegfried Widera. He was the priest who died in 200x, while on the run in Mexico after being criminally indicted on multiple counts of child sexual abuse. He last served as a priest in the Diocese of Orange, California, and both the Diocese of Orange and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee settled lawsuits in 2006 with nine California victims because of the harm he caused. The lawsuits were settled for \$16.65 million, with more than half of the amount paid by archdiocesan insurance companies, to the nine California victims, as well as one California victim of Franklyn Becker. All files of the archdiocese involving Siegfried Widera were disclosed and provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of the suit.

Bruce MacArthur. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee was named in a lawsuit in South Dakota several years ago as a result of abuse that Bruce MacArthur committed when he served as a chaplain for a hospital in the Beaver Dam, Wis., area. In that lawsuit, MacArthur admitted his abuse of the victim-survivor. MacArthur served in the archdiocese from 19xx to 19xx.

MacArthur was ordained in Sioux Falls, South Dakota and served there both before and after serving in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. His years in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee were limited and, during the time, no incidents or of abuse were reported.

The earlier case involving MacArthur was brought in South Dakota and was settled, jointly with the Diocese of Sioux Falls, in 200X. All files of the archdiocese involving Bruce MacArthur were provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of that lawsuit.

Since the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision in July of this year, allowing 20 to 40-year-old allegations to proceed under a fraud claim, three additional persons have sued the archdiocese and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, alleging abuse by MacArthur.

Franklyn Becker. Franklyn Becker attended Saint Francis de Sales Seminary and was ordained to the priesthood by Archbishop William E. Cousins in 1964. He was laicized in 2003, and is no longer a priest. His laicization was directed by the Holy See upon the request of Archbishop Dolan.

Although the archdiocese had earlier been sued in one case in California for the actions of Franklyn Becker, that case was settled, along with the nine California lawsuits involving Siegfried Widera. Franklyn Becker's records were not yet processed in the lawsuit by the time that suit was settled. But as the current

Wisconsin lawsuits now go forward, Becker's records will be processed and delivered to the plaintiffs' lawyers. Those documents will show the following:

- Fall 1970: The first report of trouble came to the archdiocese in fall of 1970, when a telephone report was made about a problem between a parishioner's son and Becker. No known follow up was done.
- November 1974: Pastor complains about Becker's lack of work ethic at St. William parish.
- August to October 1976: Becker accepts position as campus minister at St. Louis University. Becker was forced to resign after 2 months. The University advises the archdiocese that part of the reason for the forced resignation was Becker's relationship to homosexuals and his encouragement of practicing homosexuals to attend services at the University. Also noted is that Becker is "difficult to work with."
- 1977: Archbishop Cousins releases Becker to work outside the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Becker works in the Diocese of San Diego.
- 1978: Becker advises now-Milwaukee Archbishop Rembert Weakland of his decision to return to Milwaukee. Bishop of San Diego tells Archbishop Weakland that Becker was relieved of his duties and believes Becker "has psychological problems he must solve."
- 1979: Becker is assigned to St. Margaret Mary Parish, Milwaukee.
- February 1980: Two parishioners are aware of an "unfortunate incident" with a boy. This is reported to ___(vicar??)_____. After meeting with ___(vicar??)_____, Becker promises treatment and not to do it again. He requests transfer from the parish (St. Margaret Mary).
- February 1980: A few days later, Becker writes to Archbishop Weakland apologizing for becoming involved with a boy, but blames the boy for sharing the incident and says he has been "cast in a bad light" and "the decision that he leave the parish (St. Margaret Mary) seems to be a prudent one." Becker's letter also states: "With my orientation, the frequent presence of teenage boys in the house (rectory) at night was tantalizing to say the least."

- February 1980: Recommendation by archdiocese that Becker consult with psychologist, which he does. After five sessions, Becker reports that no further counseling is needed and requests to stay at St. Margaret Mary.

- December 1980: Personnel Board recommends six-year assignment to St. John Parish, South Milwaukee.
- January 1981: Pastor (Hefferner?) informs Vicar of incident with Becker and a young boy who Becker touched improperly during a swimming session. Becker denies events. Pastor does not tell parents of Becker's prior history. Parents believe Becker and apologize to him for accusing him of this.
- March 1981: letter to Vicar (Fr. Janicki) tells of Becker "pursuing" boy and his friend because they have "common interests." Also talks of Becker's "living the good life."
- June to August 1982: Review by Personnel Board. Becker says he prefers working in a parish or with high school and college age young people. Becker writes Personnel Board requesting campus ministry assignment and complains about not receiving one in the past. Complains about two other priests being possible candidates when those priests are equally "not above reproach."
- December 1982: Pastor (Heffernan?) reports to Vicar that Becker took a minor on a Caribbean cruise. Boy's mother supports Becker. Vicar

confronts Becker. Becker admits using "bad judgment," but denies any physical contact with boy. Becker ordered to see doctor for immediate therapy.

- December 1982: New pastor of St. _____ does not want to work with Becker. Becker removed from St. John's and ordered to be sent for a holistic evaluation.
- January 1983: Friend writes vicar on Becker's behalf. Friend "aware of his problems, including those with young boys..."
- February 1983: Psychology report sent to archdiocese reports Becker with pedophilia. "Possibility of sexual acting out with male minor children is high." Report recommends Becker's reassignment preclude involvement with youths.
- March 1983: Vicar consults with Milwaukee County District Attorney's office without using names. District Attorney advises that any such priest given adequate warnings would not be assigned where he could come in contact with youngsters. Advises to restrict from ministry for five years and if no other complaints are received, then, perhaps, give him another chance.
- March 1983: Becker's friend writes again reporting that, contrary to earlier belief, Becker has continued involvement with the boy (from the cruise).
- April 1983: After Becker writes Archbishop Weakland about future assignment, Archbishop Weakland refers him to the Priest Personnel Board saying he does not want to become too much involved at this point with Becker's assignments.
- May 1983: Mother of boy Becker took on cruise sends letter declaring nothing happened and defending Becker.
- May 1983: Another doctor advises archdiocese that Becker is ego-centric, a homosexual, and a pedophile, and has no mechanism to stop once he develops the urge to act out. Doctor says parish ministry is "out of the question" and recommends an all-girl college or high school, or a geriatric nursing home or hospital setting.

- August 1983: Becker assigned to St. Joseph Hospital. Weakland cautions Becker in assignment letter about the possibility of permanent removal from ministry.
- Fall 1983: Becker complains about hospital work, saying he does not wish to continue, that it is causing him stress, and he is not suited to the work. Requests to be placed on sick leave. Request is granted in November 1983.
- March 1984: After learning from the Director of Pastoral Care at the VA Center that Becker would not be accepted as chaplain because of his background and past history, Vicar calls asking why the director would not give a person, who was trying to start over, a chance.
- June 1984: Another doctor recommends to archdiocese that Becker could serve as associate pastor, under the proper conditions, but Vicar informs doctor that parish ministry is not possible.
- October 1984: Becker appointed as Chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital. Term is six years. Member of Personnel Board expresses concern but is assured by Vicar that Becker is getting treatment. Board member (Esser) expresses relief and concurs that Becker needs to have a chance at re-establishing his reputation.
- April 1985: Archdiocese becomes aware that Becker served as Confirmation sponsor for young man being confirmed.
- June 1985: Because West Allis Memorial Hospital wants all its chaplains to be certified, Becker requests letter of recommendation from Archbishop Weakland. Archbishop Weakland writes to National Association of Catholic Chaplains supporting Becker's certification and stating that Becker "is a priest in good standing..."
- July 1990: Complaint received by Vicar about Becker's insensitive pastoral care to her son (at hospital) and alleges Becker was riding through the family's neighborhood. Mother is concerned that Becker is calling her son.
- September 1990: Becker's term as chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital is renewed for an additional 6 years.
- August 1991: The parishes served by West Allis Memorial Hospital decide to replace Becker as chaplain.

- August 1992: Bishop Sklba give approval for Becker to provide weekend "help out" at St. Mary Parish in Cascade.
- September 1992: Member of St. Mary's parish, Cascade request Personnel Board to allow Becker to remain at parish.
- December 1992: Becker begins working temporarily at St. Mary's Cascade.
- July 1993: Becker unassigned with restricted ministry.
- January 1994: Becker wants to serve as temporary chaplain on a cruise, but needs a certificate of good standing from archdiocese. Archbishop Weakland is consulted because of Becker's restricted ministry. Certificate is issued.
- December 1994: Individual who sent letters in early 1983 as Becker's "friend," now notifies Archbishop Weakland that her own children were abused by Becker in the 1970s.
- February 1996: Becker sent for evaluation to the St. Louis Consultation Center. Report issued states that in absence of intervention, it is likely that patterns of problematic sexual acting out by Becker will recur. Treatment should be considered in a long-term residential facility specializing in treatment of sexual disorders.
- March 1996: Becker is referred to the Phoenix Clinic for treatment. An assessment report is issued in January 1997.
- April 1996: Becker requests permission to serve as chaplain on a cruise. No notation whether permission is granted.
- July 1996: Psychologist treating Becker advises archdiocese that Becker remains at risk to act out and questions whether he should be allowed on cruises. Archdiocesan staff (Piasecki) questions whether the treatment should shift to counseling Becker out of priesthood. Archbishop Weakland agrees that would be the best approach.
- November 1996: Becker writes Archbishop Weakland that "my greatest desire is for reconciliation with you and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee."
- January 1997: Phoenix Clinic advises archdiocese that without Becker in treatment, he remains a potential risk to act out against children.

- January 1997: Vicar informs Becker that he will have someone regularly check in on Becker to ensure Becker is maintaining his therapy and adhering to ministry restrictions.
- April 1997: New doctor treating Becker advises archdiocese that Becker is not cooperative and is, in fact, not treatable.
- July 1997: Becker continues to “help out” at parishes on an “as needed” basis.
- August 1999: Vicar reviews ministry restrictions with Becker, including approval for parish “help out” work, but restrictions against any other ministry, prohibiting contact with minors, and continuing therapy.
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- December 2002: Archdiocese receives allegation of childhood sexual abuse against Becker and refers it to the Milwaukee County District Attorney.
- May 2003: Becker arrested on sexual assault charges in California.
- May 2003: Archbishop Dolan petitions the Holy See, asking that Becker be removed from the clerical state.
- Xxxxx: Becker is removed from the clerical state. Archbishop Dolan authorizes payment of \$10,000 to Becker for transition to lay status, to pay for medical insurance.

The above listing is not complete, but a summary of the more than 800 pages of documents related to Franklyn Becker.

Questions and Answers

Q: Why share this information?

A: The information will be part of a lawsuit filed against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and will be released to the plaintiff's attorneys. It has been a practice of Archbishop Dolan to share important news with the people of the archdiocese, even when the news is bad.

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than they may be able to maintain from the news media or, because of limited space and time, the news media may be able to provide.

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A: The first concern of the Church is one of pastoral and spiritual care for all people of the archdiocese, including, especially in these matters, victim-survivors. At the same time, part of our care has to be a healthy concern for all the other equally-important constituents of the Church, and the Church's financial obligation to practice sound stewardship.

It is too early to tell what, if any, financial impact these lawsuits will have. Certainly, simply by paying for legal representation, the lawsuits cost money. Each year, a complete financial accounting of the financial impact of the sexual abuse crisis is prepared and that information is available at www.archmil.org. In addition, annually, the archdiocese has an outside, independent financial audit and the audit results are reviewed by the archdiocesan finance council and published on our web site. Q: What about Legislation to open the statute of limitations

A: As much as we support helping victims of sexual abuse find healing, we cannot support a proposal that selectively repeals the statute of limitations against the Catholic Church or other religious institutions, but not, equally, all other public and private institutions.

The statute of limitations exists for very good reasons. Finding the truth becomes more difficult as time passes. Key physical evidence is lost and personal recollections fade. Equally problematic, the accused or key witnesses die. Thus, there is a long history in our legal system regarding the importance of the statute of limitations in the American legal system. It is good law and its removal, even temporary, raises serious constitutional questions among legal scholars.

Perhaps, most importantly, the costs of defending lawsuits and of any damages that might ensue from them is born by innocent third parties, in this case Catholic parishioners, who are in no way responsible for mistakes made by other individuals decades ago.

Discussed legislation would permit lawsuits against any defendant but it does not offer equal justice to every victims or survivor. State law limits the liability

of government entities to \$50,000 per claim. Thus a child abused by a teacher in a Catholic school could be awarded millions by a jury, while a child abused by a public school employee could collect only \$50,000.

This is not speculation. Research reports the number of incidents of sexual abuse of children in the larger public school system(s) dwarfs the number of incidents in parochial schools.

Finally, the Church has not ignored victims whose claims are barred by the statute of limitations. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has voluntarily mediated settlements with over 150 survivors of abuse by clergy for whose claims were barred by the statute of limitations.

We think justice is better served learning from past mistakes and using our knowledge to secure better prevention, prompt reporting of abuse and strict accountability for offenders.

Q: Recently you announced a capital campaign - how does this affect that campaign?

A: The Faith In Our Future Capital Campaign is moving forward, with pilot parishes already in "campaign mode" at 15 sites. The *Faith in Our Future Trust* has been legally established to make sure the intent and conditions of donors are followed and respected. This *trust* is separate from the archdiocese, has obligations of its own, and can only be used for Catholic education and faith formation, not for debts of the archdiocese, the past or present expenses of the abuse crisis, or paper clips at the Cousins Center.

Q: If you know that priests are guilty, why are you defending lawsuits? Why don't you just settle with the victims?

A: Resolution *has* been reached with nearly 160 individuals - the majority through the independent mediation system. Recognizing the need for a process outside the Church structure to address claims of sexual abuse of a minor by diocesan clergy, an independent, voluntary mediation systems was introduced in January 2004.

Q: That's great, but why defend lawsuits?

A: For people who have chosen to sue, that is a decision they have made. Once the matter is in the legal system, the processing of those claims is up to the courts. As part of that process, the archdiocese hopes the courts require the parties to investigate out-of-court settlements as a way to reach resolution. If resolution is not reached, the archdiocese has no option but to proceed as directed by the courts to resolve the matter.

Q: I thought victims-survivors could not sue the Church in Wisconsin.

A: That has been a myth for some time. Victims-survivors have always had the right to sue the Church. However, just like with any civil action, the window for suing the Church has been governed by a statute of limitations.

Pastoral Letter from Archbishop Dolan

Dear Friends,

During the past 5 years, there has been an abundance of news regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests – both in this archdiocese and across the nation.

Since my arrival, I have promised to be open and honest with you, the faithful Catholics of the Church in southeastern Wisconsin. Part of that openness has been my commitment to share news with you – even when it's bad.

For example, you'll remember in summer of 2006, I shared with you the news of lawsuits facing the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for sexual abuse cases involving former priest Siegfried Widera, and the pending financial consequences of those lawsuits. Those nine cases in California were settled in a multi-million dollar agreement.

In July of this year, the Wisconsin Supreme Court handed down a decision directing that cases alleging sexual abuse against two offending priests of the archdiocese could proceed even though the age of the events were 20-to-40-years old.

Those cases have now been returned to the trial judges to go forward through normal court procedures. In addition, since July 2007, two other cases have been

①

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brought against the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and the Diocese of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, alleging sexual abuse in Wisconsin by a different priest, named Bruce MacArthur. MacArthur was a priest of the Sioux Falls Diocese, but served within the boundaries of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for several years.

During the next months, the records of the three offenders will be part of the court proceedings. Thus, I am sending you this newsletter to let you know of the information that will be forthcoming.

There are three priests accused of wrongdoing. None of these three accused individuals are serving as priests within the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, nor have they done so for many years.

The accused are Siegfried Widera, Bruce MacArthur and Franklyn Becker. Widera is dead; MacArthur is under the direction of the Diocese of Sioux Falls and is incapacitated (is this true?); and Becker, who lives within the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, was laicized in 200x and is no longer a priest. Information about all three men are included in this newsletter.

However, I want to talk specifically about the case involving Franklyn Becker. As I said, Becker was laicized in 200x. Nonetheless, you will see in the accompanying story that this is a particularly ugly case. Although there could be various explanations for all the decisions that were made or not made, at the end of the day, you will see a good example of how the Church made mistakes in its handling of these cases. *a particularly ugly about the Archd*

Some might argue that since both doctors and civil officials made the same mistakes by recommending reassignments, transfers or "fresh starts," that the Church should not be held accountable for the decisions made 20 or 30 years ago. So what do we do next? Do we hide under the bed while the scab of this mess is once again picked open? No! The good work of Jesus Christ and His Church continues - Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow - despite this mess and despite any of us. Nor, let me remind you, do these things diminish the good work that has been done over the past five-plus years as we have ardently worked with victims-survivors to bring healing and resolution. Nothing changes our commitment to continue to work with victims-survivors and together ensure that we do everything in our power to protect our children and young people.

In the past, people can point and say the Catholic Church is a shining example of what NOT to do. Now, however, even outside, objective observers say, the Catholic Church is an example of what TO do. ^e

That is why we ^{insist upon} ~~have~~ safe environment programs in all of our parishes and schools. That's why all staff and volunteers who work with children take safe environment training as a way of recognizing the signs of abuse. That's why we have a full-time victims-assistance coordinator to work with victims-survivors, and I meet regularly with a community advisory board made up of survivors, advocates and experts in the area of sexual abuse. It's also why I ~~published~~ ^{to be published} the names of offending priests on our archdiocesan website back in 200x. ~~the~~ ^{directed}

Some of you might ask, "why?" Why are you telling us this; why can't you just let this be over and move on?"

~~Part of me would like nothing more, but, I know, that this crisis will never be over. Part of me knows that deep down, maybe this is part of our penance as a Church.~~

~~Practically, too, I know that you are better hearing this news from me, all at once, than reading about it in the newspaper over and over for the next six months as part of some legal strategy.~~

So that's why I share it with you now. May I ask that you please pray for people who have been victims-survivors of sexual abuse, especially for those whose abuse came at the hands of clergy?

May I also ask that you pray for our Church, especially our Church in southeastern Wisconsin, that the Holy Spirit continue to guide us and give us strength to do God's will, and that His will be done through the generous spirit of those who proclaim, teach, and live the Gospel.

Siegfried Widera. Little needs to be added about Siegfried Widera. He was the priest who died in 200x, while on the run in Mexico after being criminally indicted on multiple counts of child sexual abuse. He last served as a priest in the Diocese of Orange, California, and both the Diocese of Orange and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee settled lawsuits in 2006 with nine California victims because of the harm he caused. The lawsuits were settled for \$16.65 million, with more than half of the amount paid by archdiocesan insurance companies, to the nine California victims, as well as one California victim of Franklyn Becker. All files of the archdiocese involving Siegfried Widera were disclosed and provided to the attorneys representing victims as part of the suit.

He served here for a limited time and there were no reports of problems while he was here. Only decades later, did incidents arise. One of these cases was settled, jointly with the Sioux Falls diocese, in 200x.

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In that lawsuit, Bruce MacArthur admitted his abuse of ~~the~~ ^{the} victim.

- April 1983: After Becker writes Archbishop Weakland about future assignment, Archbishop Weakland refers him to the Priest Personnel Board saying he does want to become ^{5 let} ~~too~~ too much involved at this point with Becker's assignments. ~~that particular~~
- May 1983: Mother of boy Becker took on cruise sends letter declaring nothing happened and defending Becker.

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Archdiocese representative

- May 1983: Another doctor (Zimmerman) advises ~~Vicar~~ that Becker is egocentric, a homosexual, and a pedophile, and has no mechanism to stop once he develops the urge to act out. Doctor says parish ministry is "out of the question" and recommends an all-girl college or high school, or a geriatric nursing home or hospital setting.
- August 1983: Becker assigned to St. Joseph Hospital. Weakland cautions Becker in assignment letter about the possibility of permanent removal from ministry.
- Fall 1983: Becker complains about hospital work, saying he does not wish to continue, that it is causing him stress, and he is not suited to the work. Requests to be placed on sick leave. Request is granted in November 1983. ?
- March 1984: After learning from the Director of Pastoral Care at the VA Center that Becker would not be accepted as chaplain because of his background and past history, Vicar calls asking why the director would not give a person, who was trying to start over, a chance.
- June 1984: Doctor (Durst) recommends *to Archdiocese that* Becker could serve as associate pastor, under the proper conditions, but Vicar informs doctor that parish ministry is not possible.
- October 1984: Becker appointed as Chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital. Term is six years. Member of Personnel Board expresses concern but is assured by Vicar that Becker is getting treatment. Board member (Esser) expresses relief and concurs that Becker needs to have a chance at re-establishing his reputation.
- April 1985: Archdiocese becomes aware that Becker served as Confirmation sponsor for young man being confirmed.
- June 1985: Because West Allis Memorial Hospital wants all its chaplains to be certified, Becker requests letter of recommendation from Archbishop Weakland. Archbishop Weakland writes to National Association of Catholic Chaplains supporting Becker's certification and stating that Becker "is a priest in good standing..." ?
- July 1990: Complaint received by Vicar about Becker's insensitive pastoral care to her son (at hospital) and alleges Becker was riding through the family's neighborhood. Mother is concerned that Becker is calling her son.

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- September 1990: Becker's term as chaplain at West Allis Memorial Hospital is renewed for an additional 6 years.
- August 1991: The parishes served by West Allis Memorial Hospital decide to replace Becker as chaplain.
- August 1992: Bishop Sklba give approval for Becker to provide weekend "help out" at St. Mary Parish in Cascade.
- September 1992: Member of St. Mary's parish, Cascade request Personnel Board to allow Becker to remain at parish.
- December 1992: Becker begins working temporarily at St. Mary's Cascade.
- July 1993: Becker unassigned with restricted ministry.
- January 1994: Becker wants to serve as temporary chaplain on a cruise, but needs a certificate of good standing from archdiocese. Archbishop Weakland is consulted because of Becker's restricted ministry. Certificate is issued.
- December 1994: Individual who sent letters in early 1983 as Becker's "friend," now notifies Archbishop Weakland that her own children were abused by Becker in the 1970s.
- February 1996: Becker sent for evaluation to the St. Louis Consultation Center. Report issued states that in absence of intervention, it is likely that patterns of problematic sexual acting out by Becker will recur. Treatment should be considered in a long-term residential facility specializing in treatment of sexual disorders.
- March 1996: Becker is referred to the Phoenix Clinic for treatment. An assessment report is issued in January 1997.
- April 1996: Becker requests permission to serve as chaplain on a cruise. No notation whether permission is granted.
- July 1996: Psychologist (Trachsel) treating Becker advises that Becker remains at risk to act out and questions whether he could be allowed on cruises. Archdiocesan staff (Piasecki) questions whether the treatment ~~is~~ ^{skt.}

- August 1999: Vicar reviews ministry restrictions with Becker, including approval for parish "help out" work, but restrictions against any other ministry, prohibiting contact with minors, and continuing therapy.
- July 2001: A claim of sexual abuse is received by Project Benjamin.
- January 6, 2002: First story about clergy sexual abuse of minors runs in the Boston Globe.
- January 2002: Becker requests approval to retain help out position at the Tri-Parishes of Rubicon, Neosho and Woodland. Vicar reminds Becker he is not eligible for assignment, but is permitted to help out on weekends.
- April 2002: Becker restricted from all public ministry, including weekend help out.
- April 2002: Allegations of sexual abuse by Franklyn Becker begin coming into the archdiocese.
- April 2002: Archbishop Weakland issues a Church *order (precept)* against Becker, which states Becker is to cease all public ministry, all pastoral counseling, may not hear confessions, must not contact any minors or vulnerable adults, to avoid places that have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality.

- April 2002: The Archdiocese of Milwaukee receives word from the Diocese of San Diego that a individual in California contacted them about Franklyn Becker and wants to be assured others are not at risk.
- May 2002: Becker is arrested by _____ for childhood sexual abuse.
- July 2002: Becker is advised that his name will be published by the archdiocese, along with five other priests who were not fully restricted from ministry because of sexual abuse allegations.
- August 2002: The ^{already existing} prohibitions against Becker are made permanent by now-Archbishop Timothy Dolan. Vicar tells Becker, most likely, he will not be allowed to do any public ministry ever again.
- December 2002: Archdiocese receives allegation of childhood sexual abuse against Becker and refers it to the Milwaukee County District Attorney.
- May 2003: Becker arrested on sexual assault charges in California.
- May 2003: Archbishop Dolan petitions the Holy See, asking that Becker be ~~dismissed~~ removed from the clerical state.
- Xxxx: Becker is ~~dismissed~~ removed from the clerical state. Archbishop Dolan authorizes payment of \$10,000 to Becker for transition ^{to lay status.}

The above listing is not complete, but a summary of the more than ⁸900 pages of documents related to Franklyn Becker.

Q: Why share this information?

A: This is a summary of more than 800 pages of records. There are always phrases and parts of documents that can be used - in our out of context - that make something sound new or different or worse than what has been shared in this newsletter. Nonetheless, we believe this is an accurate portrayal of the incidents in the files. We do not make judgments on what is "better" or "worse." Any instance of sexual misconduct and sexual abuse of a minor is bad.

Q: What can we expect from the news media about this documents?

A: We would expect news media to treat this information as they would any other type of information considered "news." By providing a ~~full~~ chronology of events in our records, our hope is to give readers a more comprehensive view than they may be able to maintain from the news media or, because of limited space and time, the news media may be able to provide.

Q: What is the financial impact of these lawsuits

A: The ~~main~~ ^{first} concern of the Church is one of pastoral and spiritual care for the people of the archdiocese. ~~Still~~, part of our care ~~needs to be~~ a healthy concern for the financial standing of the archdiocese. It is too early to tell what, if any, financial impact these lawsuits will have. Certainly, simply by paying for legal representation, the lawsuits cost money. Each year, a complete financial accounting of the financial impact of the sexual abuse crisis is prepared and that information is available at www.archmil.org. In addition, annually, the archdiocese has an outside, independent financial audit and the audit results are reviewed by the archdiocesan finance council and published on our web site. For more information, contact John Marek, CFO, at 414-769-3300.

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Q: What about Legislation to open the statute of limitations

A: As much as we support helping victims of sexual abuse find healing, we cannot support a proposal that repeals the statute of limitations ~~in this area~~. The statute of limitations exists for very good reasons. Finding the truth becomes more difficult as time passes. Key physical evidence can be lost and personal recollections fade. Sometimes the accused or key witnesses are ~~dead~~. Thus, there is a long history in our legal system ~~the long history of a statute of~~ ^{regarding} limitations and its importance in the American legal system. It is good law and the removal, even temporary, raises serious questions among legal scholars.

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Further, the costs of defending lawsuits and of any damages that might ensue from them ~~is~~ be born by innocent third parties, in this case Catholic parishioners, who are in no way responsible for mistakes made decades ago.

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Available research reports that the ~~number~~ number of incidents of sexual abuse of children in the far larger public school system dwarfs the number of any ~~other~~ incidents involving parochial schools.

Finally, the Church has not ignored victims whose claims are barred by the statute of limitations. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has ~~reached~~ mediated settlements with over 150 survivors of abuse by clergy for whose claims were barred by the statute of limitations.

We think justice is better served learning from past mistakes and using our knowledge to secure better prevention, prompt reporting of abuse and strict accountability for offenders.

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A: The Faith In Our Future Capital Campaign is moving forward, with pilot parishes already in "campaign mode" at 15 sites. The Faith in Our Future Trust has been legally established to make sure the intent and conditions of ~~you as~~ donors is respected. This trust is separate from the archdiocese, has obligations of its own, and can only be used for Catholic education and faith formation, not for debts of the archdiocese, the past or present expenses of the abuse crisis, or paper clips at the Cousins Center.

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Q: If you know that priests are guilty, why are you defending lawsuits? Why don't you just settle with the victims?

A: Resolution has been reached with nearly 160 individuals – the majority through the independent mediation system. Recognizing the need for a process outside the Church structure to address claims of sexual abuse of a minor by diocesan clergy, an independent, voluntary mediation systems was introduced in January 2004.

Q: That's great, but why defend lawsuits?

the persons who have chosen to sue, that is a decision they have made.

A: For ~~some~~ victims-survivors, the choice of litigation is one they have made. The offer of the independent mediation system, for whatever reason, is not seen as the best way for them to achieve resolution. No one is arguing what has happened to them as individual victims-survivors of clergy sexual abuse as minors. However, what is a just resolution for the incidents is what the victims-survivors have asked a court to decide.

Q: I thought victims-survivors could not sue the Church in Wisconsin.

A: That has been a myth for some time. Victims-survivors have always had the right to sue the Church. However, just like with any civil action, the window for suing the Church has been governed by a statute of limitations.

Dear Father Janicki,

In your last conversation with me a week or so ago, you were concerned about Lyn Becker's continued involvement with the boy from Fox Point. At that time I told you I was certain Lyn had not made any effort to contact him and I really thought that particular door was closed. I was wrong. As a result I decided to drop you a note to give you an update. Over the week-end I talked to the mother and she informed me that her son had received another letter from Lyn last week, ostensibly to congratulate him on his performance in his school's class play. If it had stopped at that, I'm sure the mother would not have objected. What irritated her was the fact that the letter was mostly a recitation of the 'good life' he is leading---Le Club, trip to Chicago to see 42nd Street, dinner invitations, etc. What most upset her, however, was that he expressed a real desire to get this boy together with his roommate and himself, as they all (to quote Lyn) share common interests. This mother (a [REDACTED] is trying desperately to get this son's value system straightened out through the help of the priests at Marquette High and through professional counseling. She does not feel that she, her son, or the rest of her family need any further contact with Lyn and/or [REDACTED] his roommate, at this point.

I decided to write you as I think this latest effort on Lyn's part to re-establish contact with this boy is most disturbing. It is just one more indication of his continued persistence in thumbing his nose at anyone who is going to get in his way at this point. Past history shows that, as his options become less and less and his maneuvering space smaller and smaller, he becomes more and more capable of some pretty devious, irrational acts. I hope it doesn't happen this time around.

In a brief conversation I had with him over the week-end, he said he was going to see a Dr. [REDACTED] this week. He did not indicate to me any resentment or resistance to the idea. That's one optimistic note.

I would like to reiterate my concern for Lyn as a person and as a priest. There is much good there if it can ever be channeled properly. However, I, like you, am beginning to feel somewhat pessimistic over his future. There does not appear to be the faintest glimmer of any self-awareness of the position he's in right now. This is depressing. I wish there were some magic answers.

On Tuesday, February 8, 2005 at 8:10 PM I called Franklyn Becker at his residence.

I told him I was calling as promised to relay some information that he had requested I check into. I stated I didn't have good news to offer.

First, I said that the \$10,000.00 check that we, Fr. Curt Frederick and I, had given him was in fact income and that he would be receiving a form 1099 shortly. He said that he had gotten it in the mail. I further advised him that no income taxes, either state or federal, had been withheld. He would have to claim the income and pay the taxes.

He said that he figured this when he got the 1099 form. But he was hoping there was some way to get a break on claiming it.

Secondly, I advised him that the archbishop was not going to pay for his health insurance, either directly or by making some kind of financial arrangement. I explained that this decision was based on a very recent case stemming out of Nashville. A former priest, now laicized committed another offense of sexual misconduct. The victim filed a lawsuit against the diocese. The diocese claimed that they had no responsibility since the man had been laicized. However, the court ruled against the diocese because the diocese continued to pay for the man's health insurance even after he was laicized.

Mr. Becker was not aware of the case. He was not happy and made a comment about the archbishop just getting rid of him and not caring for or about him.

He also made one of his statements about contacting the press or somebody because of all he knows.

I said he knew he wasn't going to do this. What purpose would it serve? The press wasn't going to give him insurance nor would they even give him much of a check for the information for a story.

He admitted he knew this but feels so abandoned.

He asked about [REDACTED] saying that he heard that he was the next one to be laicized.

I asked him where he heard this and he couldn't or wouldn't give an answer indicating it was just something he heard. I said this was just a rumor as I had heard it also. I told him not to believe everything he hears from the "grapevine".


Thirdly, I asked him if someone had contacted him from Catholic Charities?

He said that he had. He is working with a man from there but the man basically told him there didn't appear to be much he could do at this time because Franklyn had looked into almost everything that is out there. He might have to liquidate the meager assets that he has to qualify for some type of welfare health benefits. The man, name unknown, is doing some more checking and said he would get back to Franklyn.

Franklyn is hoping that there is something out there so he can get insurance or he may just have to exist without any insurance. He is not very hopeful that the man will find anything.

I said that I would keep in touch and if I heard of anything would certainly call him.

On Wednesday, February 2, 2005 at 11: 25 AM I met Mr. Franklyn Becker at Spinnaker's Restaurant located in Oconomowoc.

We discussed a number of issues during our time together.

He is extremely concerned about not having any health insurance. He said that he had called someone in State government. He asked about applying for a disability and was told he didn't qualify. He asked about some type of welfare or governmental health insurance and was told that he didn't qualify either because he was too young, too old, or had too high an income.

I asked if he had spoken to anyone in Catholic Charities. He previously mentioned he was going to call the Fond-du-Lac office. He said that since he lives in Dodge County he had to call the Beaver Dam office. He said he had done so and had spoken to someone, name unknown, who had taken some information. He has not heard back from this person. He didn't remember exactly how long ago he had called.

I said that I had spoken to Diane Knight the Executive Director of Catholic Charities about his situation. She was quite sure he would qualify for some type of health coverage under some type of assistance program. I said I would contact her and let her know that he had called someone at the Beaver Dam office. I would ask her to call and assign someone who knows the system inside and out to his case. I would ask that the person call him in the morning before 10:30 AM or in the latter afternoon or evening. I would further ask that this person be instructed to call Diane and/or myself back to let us know what, if anything was done for him.

He said he had called his dentist recently to ascertain how much a routine visit would cost since he has no dental insurance. He was told \$60.00 for a cleaning and \$91.00 if he saw the dentist. He scheduled an appointment with the hygienist for a cleaning.

He is still trying to find someone to buy his car or to assume his lease payments. He spoke to the car dealer where he got the car to see if he could get out of the lease and was told that he could not.

He asked if there had been any change with his compensation. I said that I tried to see the archbishop after receiving his letter dated January 21 but found out he was in Miami on vacation. I said that I would have an answer for him by Monday or Tuesday next week at the latest.

He said that he had applied for several jobs. He had gone to a state job facility to seek assistance. He never saw a person. He was directed to a computer and told to enter his information. He was then told he should go to a library or use his home computer, he doesn't have one, to access the system each day to see if there are any jobs he wanted to send his resume to. He can't believe they wouldn't have people to help you.

He has checked the computer for several days but hasn't found anything. He questions his applying for any position anyway because of his age, 67 years, and his past history. An employer can go on line and find out about his past. It probably even says that he has been laicized.

I told him I knew the archdiocese wasn't advertising that he had been laicized and unless he told people I didn't believe it was out there on the internet.

He said he would really like to work in a library but because of his involvement with kids that will probably never happen. He has applied at several grocery stores and other places but hasn't heard back as of yet. He is not hopeful.

He said that he had started to get things ready to take his taxes in. He asked whether or not he had to claim the \$10,000.00 settlement Fr. Curt (Frederick) and I had given him when we met with him? Is this income or a settlement like insurance or what? I said that I thought he was

going to have to claim it. He asked if taxes had been withheld from the \$10,000.00. I said that I didn't now but would check and let him know the answers to the above questions.

I asked what his days looked like. He said that he gets up and leaves the house around 10:45 AM to go to the library to check the jobs postings. Then he submits resumes. He is usually home in the afternoon after lunch. He goes to a senior meal program for his big meal, lunch, almost everyday. He has to sign up ahead of time. They only ask for a donation. Currently they are asking for \$2.20 per day. For breakfast he has a piece of fruit and for dinner he has a can of Slim-Fast and a few crackers. He said he should be losing weight but doesn't even eat that small amount. But he said he is satisfied. He never was a real big eater.

He said when he was in Florida in December and January he saw several priests. One was Don Peters. He said they went to Epcot at Disney World. He said Don and his sister love it there. She plays the organ there for Mass sometimes. He said Don is having trouble doing a lot of walking and rented an electric scooter. Don said that when he gets back to Wisconsin he will have to look into getting one because of the difficulty he has walking.

Mr. Becker asked numerous times why one priest got laicized and another didn't? Who made the decision? What was the reasoning for one to get laicized and one not to.

I said I wasn't privy to these decisions but thought they might have been based on age, health and individual cases. He bemoaned the fact that the archbishop never once sat down with him and told him anything, nor did he answer any of his questions. He was never given a chance to defend himself. His case was just sent over to Rome.

He asked about several other cases. I was non-committal. He did know I had met with [REDACTED] and wondered why he had been laicized and if [REDACTED] would be laicized.

I asked about his brother in Muncie. He said they speak on the telephone periodically. His brother and sister-in-law are doing some housework and then are going on a cruise for their 40th wedding anniversary.

He said he missed going on cruises but brought up some priest from California that used to schedule priests for cruises stating he was arrested and taken off a cruise liner during a cruise because of an allegation. That coupled with all the sickness that has been reported lately on cruises, he doesn't know if he would want to go on one again. This California priest was the same one that he used to book cruises through.

I asked if he had been walking or exercising. He said that he had not. I told him that we both needed to do so.

On Wednesday, February 2 at 1:05 PM I called Diane Knight and left a detailed message on her answering machine regarding Mr. Becker and the assignment of someone knowledgeable to his case. I will also follow-up regarding his tax question.

I am writing in response to your letter dated February 15, 2004 (actually 2005) in which you request paperwork in advance of your 68th birthday in July 2005 for the Archdiocesan Pension you will be eligible to receive effective on July 31, 2005.

Enclosed are: the Pension application, the Notice of Withholding form, and the Application for Direct Deposit which need to be completed by you prior to July 31, 2005. Regarding the application for Direct Deposit (ETF) –complete the top portion of the form and ask your bank to complete the bottom portion before you return the form to me. Please return the completed items to me.

PENSION

The first pension check is issued at the end of the month FOLLOWING the last day of the month of your eligibility. Therefore your first check should be expected August 31, 2005. Direct deposit begins the month after you receive your first check.

It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to send notification of any future changes of your address to the Pension Department.

Effective January 1, 1997 the Archdiocese of Milwaukee Priests' Pension Plan (VI 6.4) was amended to provide that up to 100% of your pension benefit may be designated as rental or housing allowance and therefore not taxable. Please be advised, however, that the amount you exclude from income may not exceed the amount actually used to rent or provide a home. For example, if your annual pension totaled \$15,000 but your actual rent or cost of providing housing was only \$8,700, then only \$8,700 would be excluded from taxable income. The balance of \$6,300 would be included in income on your Federal form 1040. Wisconsin Statute 71.05, which lists modifications to Federal adjusted income, also allows this tax treatment.



Please allow me to continue to update you about developments that may concern you.

On February 27, 2004 the findings of the "John Jay Study" will be released. This study was commissioned by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops at their Dallas meeting in June, 2002. John Jay College of Criminal Justice conducted a survey, and this report will include cumulative numbers from dioceses across the United States who reported on their individual numbers since 1950.

Naturally you will be interested in this news story because of its personal dimensions for you, but many victim/survivors have also let me know how extensive media coverage of clergy sexual abuse causes intense personal disruption and setbacks. In addition to a "heads up" about the turmoil you may face, let me make a few suggestions about how you might manage this time period.

- Be in charge of your media doses, rather than let it control you. Choose when and where and how much exposure you want. Turn off the TV or radio and put away the newspaper, as needed. Let people know if you don't want to talk about it now.
- Turn to people who offer you genuine caring and support. Distinguish these from the people who have another interest or purpose in talking to you about your personal relationship to the topic. Remember that you have choices about whether you publicly identify yourself as a victim. Talk with people with whom you feel "safe."
- Consider making an appointment with your therapist if you don't already have one. If you have not taken advantage of our offer to assist financially with psychotherapy, but would like to do so, please contact me. There are also support groups that focus on the healing needs of sexual abuse survivors, for which I can provide information. You are welcome to turn to me as a support person as well.


Previously we informed you that a new mediation program, independent of the Archdiocese, was forthcoming. The Clergy Sexual Abuse Mediation System is designed to resolve disputes for those who have been sexually abused by Catholic clergy, with the goal of healing, restoration and closure. If you are not already registered to participate in mediation, you may do so by calling 414-302-9215 or 1-866-302-9215. The last date for requesting mediation if you choose to seek resolution.

I pray and hope that your journey as a survivor of clergy sexual abuse starts to become easier. For the Catholic Church it is a necessary time of public accountability in order to be responsible for what happened in the past, to change the culture and ways of operating in the present, and to practice prevention in the future. As we have said before, no words or actions erase the burden you have borne as a result of this issue.

I write to you because you have experienced, firsthand, the pain caused by sexual abuse within the Church, and you courageously reported the abuse to the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. No words can apologize sufficiently for your experience, but I will continue to try by saying again how sorry I am. Knowing that no remedies can adequately address the harm done, I still want to make you aware of a variety of services available to you and intended to assist in your healing.

Dispute resolution services to address your unique needs for recovery will become available in mid-January. Eva Soeka, a nationally known expert in dispute resolution systems, is creating a process independent of the Church that will make use of the best mediators in the area. I continue to believe that this initiative represents the best way for us to meet together about your situation and provide assistance. More details and information about how to enter into this process will be available in mid-January. At this time, I ask you to start considering if this might be the right next step for you.

Catholic Charities is also offering a new support group in Milwaukee for adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse. This group will offer a faith-based perspective, and is meant to supplement other support groups available in the area. A flyer is enclosed.

Financial assistance with psychotherapy also remains available. To access this, or for other questions about our services, please contact Dr. Barbara Reinke in our office for Sexual Abuse Prevention and Response Services (414-769-3436 or reinkeb@archmil.org). Also enclosed is a brochure about our policies and procedures when a report is made.

I continue to meet privately with those victim-survivors who find that helpful. Please contact me at 414-769-3496 if you would like to arrange such a meeting. We have also arranged for several priests, sisters and lay ministers, who are professionally-trained in providing spiritual direction, to be available. If you would like to speak with one of them, please contact Barbara Anne Cusack, my delegate for sexual abuse issues, at 414-769-3341.


It is also important for me to communicate with you about our efforts to prevent clergy sexual abuse in the future. Our *Code of Ethics* makes it clear that no such behavior is to be tolerated within ministry. Our *Mandatory Reporting Responsibility* policy specifies that any employee or volunteer working in our parishes and schools must report any suspicion of abuse. In addition, all adult staff, and volunteers who work with children are required to participate in training to enhance awareness of childhood sexual abuse.

One final thing: if you would prefer not to have further contact from me or from any Church representative, please let us know using the enclosed return letter and pre-stamped envelope.

Much more remains to be done, and we welcome your suggestions. You can use the enclosed response letter and envelope for that purpose as well.

Please know that I am concerned about you and I pray for you. I apologize for the past misdeeds and wish to restore your wholeness as best we can.

Dear Archbishop Dolan,

My name is [REDACTED] I am one of "Becker's Boys". I graduated from Holy Assumption Grade school in 1963. The abuse that I was a victim of began before I graduated. I was 13. It started in the confessional. I was a good Catholic boy, then. I was always confessing masturbation in fear of the fire and brimstone the nuns taught us in Holy Assumption.

I was in the confessional and confessing my sins to Becker. He asked if I would feel better if he told me he masturbated too. I was 13. I didn't give a thought to what the priests did sexually. Or anyone for that matter. I was shocked. He(Becker), said I should come to his personal quarters at the rectory to discuss the "problem" I was having. We set up a time and date.

I have areas of time that I am missing during the three years that man abused me. Three years of my life. Years he was not in titled to have. I felt that no one would listen to a kid's word against a priest's. I was the youngest of [REDACTED] Mom and Dad were busy and very involved in the church. They were trilled that "Father" took an interest in their son and took him on trips. We did a trip [REDACTED] and to his cousins in Steven's point. No one thought twice about Father and the boy sleeping together. I couldn't believe they were not stopping him. Toward the beginning of all this, he was to be a counselor at a camp and took me along. Of course the cabin had only one bed! He danced slow with me and told me their were bars where guys danced together. Next scene is on the bed. He had already ejaculated when were dancing. I only knew because he had told me. I remember being on the bed and him playing with my penis. I remember saying to him that if I didn't have one of these (penis) that he would not even be around. There are plenty of stories I remember. There are also areas where there is no memory at all. That is a first for me.

[REDACTED] and a recovering Catholic. My older sister sent me news clippings of what was going on with Becker. I debated, for many years, as to what to do. I finally saw all these guys coming forward and I had to speak up. I felt that the numbers had to be shown, for the church to realize the damage this man has done.

I am going to be in Milwaukee the first weekend in August. I would like an opportunity to speak with you about this matter. I will not hold all this inside anymore. It is always there. Just around the corner from my other thoughts-but there just the same. I was told that the psychiatrist we were all sent to had a job to do. His job was to convince us that it was our fault. Do you know, I carried that feeling around up until two years ago. I am now [REDACTED] years old. That is [REDACTED] years-I'll do the math for you. My childhood ended abruptly because of Becker. My adolescence was horrific. Counselor after counselor I have been to. Why was he allowed to continue? How could the church let this happen? So many boy's lives ruined. You can bet that those of us that come forward are only the tip of Becker's ice burg. And may he live a long, long life.

He came to my parent's home. He told them of similar activities happening with myself and another priest. The other priest seemed to be the lesser of two evils. I told my parents, while he(Becker) was there, that he was in their home for one reason. He is jealous. He has been doing the same thing for three years. I went to my room and would not talk about it to them. I never did. They knew enough from Becker to go to the archbishop. They were not granted an audience! Mom was involved in Christian Mothers, she worked in the church office with out pay, and Dad in Holy Name. I was a reader at the church. My parents kept their faith in the church until they died. I am glad they did. I could not. If I never see the inside of a confessional it will be too soon.

This is only part of my story. It is still, after [REDACTED] years a very tough one to write or talk about. I have been talking to a few close friends about it, to be able to speak clearly to you about all of this. I do hope you will grant me an audience. If that Monday, August 4th is available I would appreciate you saving me an extra trip to Milwaukee.

One last thing. [REDACTED] She was in her final days. Becker had the nerve to go into her room and ask my Dad if he could give her his blessing. My Dad said, "I am not your judge. We need all the help we can get." Becker told my Dad to have me call him when I come into town. The man is unreal! I saw him at the hospital but he did not see me. I wanted to chase after him and tell him to stay away from my family. I began to do just that. Then I stopped. This time wasn't his. It was my Mom's. I would only have caused more turmoil than they needed. How dare he!

I will stop now. I am enclosing my home number and my cell number.

I believe the records of Becker's behavior are incomplete and I suspect I know why. I was abused by Becker, beginning the spring of 1963 at Holy Assumption Parish, West Allis ,WI. It continued for three years, off and on. My parents found out, by Becker's admission, that I was being abused by him. (Long story).

[REDACTED] What the church said was, well gospel at our house. After they were made aware of the situation, they went either to the Bishop or Archbishop. They would not be granted an audience. The man's secretary kept them at bay, knowing why they were there. Therefore no report. Do you think I felt I would have an ear, bringing this up to the bishop, or even the nuns at school. I was a kid-13 years old. Who will take my word, if they won't even talk to my parents

Therefore, when I read how Becker's abuse started in 1970, I am appalled. So what was I? Just some kid he was practicing on; therefore I didn't count.

I hope you all sleep well tonight. I have many sleepless nights over this-over the years. And now I still will, since there is no record that, maybe Fr. Rose could've fill out. Hardly.



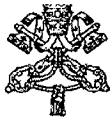

I write with regard to the case of the **Reverend Franklyn William BECKER**, a priest of your Archdiocese, who has been accused of multiple acts of sexual abuse of minors and concerning whom Your Excellency has requested dismissal from the clerical state *ex officio et in poenam*.

This Dicastery, on receipt of notification that the cleric has refused to seek voluntary laicization as suggested by this Congregation as a sign of repentance, has decided to support Your Excellency's request that the above-mentioned priest be dismissed *ex officio et in poenam* from the clerical state.

In an audience granted to His Eminence Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, Prefect of this Dicastery, on 15 October 2004 the Supreme Pontiff decreed that the Reverend Franklin William Becker is dismissed *ex officio et in poenam* from the clerical state, and is, moreover, released from all obligations of the Sacred Priesthood, including that of celibacy. Any censures, under which he may be labouring, are remitted by this decree.

Your Excellency is asked kindly to inform Fr. Becker of this grave decision according to paragraph 7 of the enclosed decree. A signed and notarized copy of the decree should be returned to this Dicastery at your earliest convenience.

LAICIZATION RESCRIPT - UNOFFICIAL TRANSLATION
Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith

The Supreme Pontiff Pope John Paul, II

having heard the opinion of his Eminence the Cardinal Prefect of this Congregation concerning the serious actions of the above named presbyter of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee (Milwaukee, USA), with the proper documentation having been sent and finding this final decision to be beyond appeal and not subject to recourse,

has decreed

that the penalty of dismissal from the presbyterate be imposed.

This same presbyter is also granted a dispensation from all of the obligations connected with sacred Orders in accord with the following consideration:

1. The dismissal and dispensation take effect at the very moment of the decision of the Roman Pontiff.
2. The decree of dismissal and dispensation are to be communicated to the presbyter by the competent Ordinary and no one has the right to separate those two elements. Indeed, further, it carries with it, insofar as it is necessary, absolution from censures.
3. Notice of the granting of the dismissal and dispensation is to be inscribed in the baptismal register of the aforementioned presbyter's parish.
4. With regard to the celebration of a canonical marriage, the norms set down in The Code of Canon Law must be applied. The Ordinary, however, should take care that the matter be discreetly handled without pomp or external display.
5. The ecclesiastical authority, to whom it belongs to notify the priest, should earnestly exhort him to take part in the life of the People of God, in a manner consonant with his new mode of living, to give edification, and thus to show himself a most loving son of the Church. At the same time, however, he should be informed of the following points:
 - a) the dismissed presbyter automatically loses the rights proper to the clerical state, as well as ecclesiastical dignities and offices; he is no longer bound by the other obligations connected with the clerical state;
 - b) he remains excluded from the exercise of the sacred ministry, with the exception of those functions mentioned in canons 976 and 986, §2, and, as a result, he may not give a homily nor is he able to hold a directive office in the pastoral field nor to exercise the function of parochial administrator;

- c) similarly, he may not discharge any function in seminaries and in equivalent institutions. In other institutions of higher studies, which are in any way whatever dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not exercise a directive function;
- d) in those institutions of higher studies which are not dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not teach any discipline which is properly theological or closely connected with the same;
- e) in institutions of lower studies, which are dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not exercise the function of teaching a discipline which is properly theological. A dismissed and dispensed presbyter is held by the same rule in teaching Religion in an institution of the same kind not dependent upon ecclesiastical authority.
6. The Ordinary of the dismissed presbyter, in keeping with required prudence, must care that scandal not be given to the faithful. This pastoral care of the Ordinary is most important if a danger of even a minor abuse, although remote, is at hand.
7. Notification of the dismissal and dispensation can be made either personally or through an ecclesiastical notary or through registered mail. The dismissed priest ought to retain a copy sign his receptions and acceptance of this dismissal and dispensation and also its regulations, but if he does not it does not impede the effect of this decree.
8. At an opportune time, the Ordinary is to send a brief report to the Congregation on his completion of the notification, and, if there is any wonderment on the part of the faithful he is to provide a prudent explanation.

All things to the contrary notwithstanding.

I am writing to inform you that Mr. Franklyn William Becker (W/M 7-15-37 of [REDACTED], Mayville, WI 53050) is a former priest of the Roman Catholic Church, Archdiocese of Milwaukee. I was notified on Friday, November 19, 2004 that he was laicized, (returned to the lay state from the clerical state). He was notified on Monday, December 6, 2004 of his new status.

Mr. Becker has substantiated cases of sexual misconduct involving children. Criminal charges were never brought against Mr. Becker. When they did come to light they were outside of the statute of limitations. He does have a case pending in California stemming from an incident(s) in the 1970's. I don't know the current status of this case but know that the case had been dismissed because California's 1 year exemption from the State's statute of limitations was appealed to the State Supreme Court.

Mr. Becker has been monitored closely since the allegations first came to the attention of the archdiocese. He has complied completely with any and all directives imposed upon him by the archbishop(s). He will not be monitored by members of the archdiocese now that he is no longer a cleric.

I do not anticipate that he would commit any further criminal acts but feel I must notify you of his new status as well as his presence in the community. If you have any questions feel free to contact me at (414)-769-3490.



I am in receipt of your letter of inquiry about insurance coverage for Franklyn Becker to whom you are providing canonical advice. Thank you for your willingness to offer him counsel.

As you are aware, a monetary arrangement has been provided to Franklyn to assist him in transition expenses. In addition, we have tried to assist him in finding health insurance coverage which he could purchase, using some of these funds should he choose to do so. We have been unsuccessful thus far in locating any such coverage. If you are aware of a program that your archdiocese uses, we would be interested in hearing of it.

There may have been some years when, at ordination time, men were told to consider their options regarding signing up for Social Security. However, for at least the past twenty-five years, there have been multiple announcements, every time there was an open enrollment made available, encouraging priests to take advantage of that opportunity. Franklyn apparently ignored that encouragement until very recently. Over the years, therefore, when others were making their self-employed Social Security payments, Franklyn had this additional money available for his own investment for his future needs. Moreover, during the years that Franklyn was unassigned and the archdiocese was paying his salary, he also received the "Retirement Savings Supplement." This is an annual amount calculated to match what priests would be paying for Social Security. It is provided regardless of whether or not the priest is actually enrolled in Social Security. Again, we would have anticipated that Franklyn would have invested these funds for his own future needs.

All of us live with the consequences of the decisions we have made, for good and for bad. What Franklyn is facing now is the result of a series of his own decisions. Were a lay employee to be terminated, there would be no assistance at the level Franklyn has experienced. Our financial situation at present does not allow us to consider additional charity on his behalf especially as we face the potential for multi-million dollar settlements in California, some of which will be the direct results of Franklyn's actions.

Franklyn Becker was informed that Pope John Paul II had laicized him, or returned him to the lay state from the clerical state, in December 2004. Upon Becker's notification, Archdiocese of Milwaukee officials contacted Dodge County Sheriff Todd M. Nehls with information regarding Becker's return to the lay state, his past history, and his residence in Dodge County.

The laicization of Franklyn Becker upholds the assurances given by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in the "Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People" that states "Diocesan/eparchial policy will provide that for even a single act of sexual abuse of a minor—past, present, or future—the offending priest or deacon will be permanently removed from ministry, not excluding dismissal from the clerical state, if the case so warrants." The laicization affirms the words of Pope John Paul II that, "There is no place in the priesthood or religious life for those who would harm the young." In 2002 victims advocates groups were insistent that clerics with substantiated reports of sexual abuse of minors be removed from the priesthood.

The Archdiocese of Milwaukee placed full restrictions on Becker in April 2002. These restrictions became permanent in July 2002.

The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has been candid about Becker and there has been substantial media attention about his situation, including:

- In 2002, when he was permanently fully restricted from ministry;
- In 2003, when he was arrested and charged with sexual assault by California law enforcement authorities;
- In July 2004, when the Archdiocese of Milwaukee published a list of diocesan priests, including Becker, who have been restricted from all priestly ministry. This information was distributed to all archdiocesan, parish and school personnel and received widespread media coverage. This list remains available on the Archdiocese of Milwaukee web site (www.archmil.org) and is updated when there are changes to an individual's status. Becker's status on this list was updated following his Vatican-imposed laicization.

The Archdiocese of Milwaukee has kept its promises and remains committed to working proactively toward resolution of any issues brought to us by victims/survivors of sexual abuse as a minor by diocesan clergy. There is no clergy member with a substantiated report of sexual abuse of a minor in ministry in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Milwaukee Archbishop Timothy M. Dolan is always open to hearing from victims/survivors and others regarding any concern or issue they may have regarding how the Archdiocese of Milwaukee works with victims/survivors of sexual abuse as a minor by diocesan clergy.

Thank you for your input on the translation of the decree of dismissal for Franklyn Becker.

It was precisely in order to exercise my pastoral solicitude for all the people entrusted to my care and to do what could be done to repair the grave scandal his actions caused, that I made the decision to request the dismissal *ex officio et poenam*. I disagree with your interpretation that the decree states that the Archdiocese has a continuing responsibility for his actions. We have taken the steps that are possible to ensure that no harm will come to minors by notification of civil law enforcement and by listing him publicly as an offender. I do not disagree that, as a member of the Christian faithful, Franklyn continues to have a relationship with me. So does every other member of the Catholic Church committed to my care. He does not, however, have the same relationship as a cleric for then dismissal from the clerical state would be an empty act. I have consulted with civil and canonical counsel within and outside the Archdiocese in arriving at these conclusions which vary greatly from yours.

I reiterate my appreciation for your canonical assistance to our priests.





AGREEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE

This Agreement and Mutual Release (hereafter "Agreement") is made by and between [REDACTED] (hereafter "[REDACTED]") and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Milwaukee, and all of its affiliated entities, schools, and parishes (hereafter "Archdiocese").

[REDACTED] has brought to the attention of the Archdiocese that he was sexually abused by Franklyn Becker (hereafter "Becker"), a priest of the Archdiocese, when [REDACTED] was a minor.

[REDACTED] and the Archdiocese entered into mediation to achieve reconciliation and restoration, to help repair the harm to [REDACTED] to address issues of concern to [REDACTED] about prevention of sexual abuse of minors in the future and reformation of Church practices in this regard, and to otherwise resolve and settle all disputes between them.

Accordingly, the parties to this Agreement wish to resolve and satisfy all claims of any nature that [REDACTED] has against the Archdiocese, and all of the Archdiocese's employees, agents, officers, directors, affiliates, insurers, and assigns, including, without limitation, all members of the Roman Catholic clergy and all parishes, schools, and religious orders, and any person or entity affiliated with the Roman Catholic Church in the territory of the Archdiocese, arising from the sexual abuse of [REDACTED] by Becker without the necessity of further proceedings or expense of any nature, and all parties wish to generally release one another from all liability for any claims that may exist to the date of the signing of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, any claims for sexual abuse of [REDACTED] by Becker.

So, in consideration of the mutual promises made here, and other valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties to this Agreement agree as follows:

1. The Archdiocese agrees to provide [REDACTED] with \$50,000. These funds shall be used at [REDACTED] own discretion.

2. The Archdiocese agrees to provide payment for the professional services of a counselor, psychologist, psychiatrist and/or other mental health provider as deemed necessary and appropriate for [REDACTED] and his immediate family members. The Archdiocese shall make payments to the counselor for reasonable costs, billed at the counselor's usual and customary rate. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement, the Archdiocese's therapy payments owed under this provision shall be based upon treatment plans submitted by the counselor. This payment and reimbursement is limited to medication and therapy expenses relating to injuries suffered as a result of the sexual abuse of [REDACTED] by Becker.

3. The Archdiocese agrees to arrange a meeting between [REDACTED] and Archbishop Timothy Dolan at a mutually agreeable time and place.

4. [REDACTED] and the Archdiocese will each bear their own costs and any attorney's fees associated with the Agreement, and there will be no payment to [REDACTED] other than that specifically enumerated above.

5. In return for the payment set out above, and for the mutual promises contained herein, [REDACTED] releases and forever discharges the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Milwaukee, and all of the Archdiocese's employees, agents, officers, directors, affiliates, insurers, and assigns, including, without limitation, all members of the Roman Catholic clergy, and all parishes, schools, and religious orders, and any person or entity affiliated with the Roman Catholic Church in the territory of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee from, and covenants not to sue them for, all claims, causes of action, charges, and demands, whether in

tort, contract, or otherwise, of any nature that he may have had at any time up to and including the date of signing of this Agreement, including, without limitation, any claim of any nature arising from the assault, injury, whether physical or mental, or any other activity by Becker.

6. The Archdiocese hereby releases and forever discharges [REDACTED] from all claims, demands, and causes of action of any nature that were in existence up to and including the date of the signing of this Agreement.

7. This Agreement supersedes all prior understandings and agreements between the parties, and constitutes the full agreement of the parties. No change to this Agreement shall be enforced against any party unless it is in writing signed by both parties.

8. The undersigned represent and warrant that each has read the foregoing Agreement; had an opportunity to discuss it with a lawyer; and fully understands its terms; voluntarily, freely, and without coercion signs the Agreement; and that Dr. Barbara Anne Cusack is an authorized representative of the Archdiocese and is duly authorized to execute this Agreement and Mutual Release.

Select Becker Sexual Abuse Intake Reports

- 7/9/05 Sexual Abuse Intake Report documenting report of abuse by Becker when individual was 8-9 years old in 1965-1966 while a member at Holy Family Parish in Whitefish Bay, WI. Uncertain how many times the abuse occurred. Becker would take the youth camping and fishing. Becker would have him get naked and check him all over, including his genitals, for ticks. Becker also touched his rectum and something was inserted, possibly a finger. Becker also made the youth check him for ticks.
- 4/25/02 Sexual Abuse Intake Report documenting report of abuse by Becker when individual was 12 years old at Becker's parents' home in 1966. Becker pushed his bed up against the individual's and put his arm around him. Becker tried to fondle the individual.
- 4/22/10 Sexual Abuse Intake Report documenting report of abuse by Becker when individual was at Holy Family grade school in Whitefish Bay in 1972-1973. Becker took the victim to a hotel and fondled him and on another occasion, the victim was forced to swim naked.
- 5/14/08 Sexual Abuse Intake Report documenting report of abuse by Becker when individual was 10-11 years old in 1967-1968 at Holy Assumption Parish in West Allis, WI and at Becker's mother's residence. Abuse occurred at least 3 to 4 times and included kissing and Becker touching the individual's genitals.
